YOUTH DVAR TORAH

This weeks Parsha, Parshat Tzav, we learn three very important lessons regarding our connection to the Mitzvot.

אִם אֶת־אֶהְרֹן וְאֶת־בְּנָיו לֹא־מֵרַחֵם תִּהְיֶה עֲלֵהֶם הָעֹלָה הַזֶּה עַל־הַמִּזְבֵּחַ כֹּל־הַיּוֹמָה עַד־הַבֹּקֶר וְאִשׁ הַמִּזְבֵּחַ תִּקְדֶּה בּוֹ:

Command Aaron and his sons thus: This is the ritual of the burnt offering: The burnt offering itself shall remain where it is burned upon the altar all night until morning, while the fire on the altar is kept going on it.

Rashi comments on the word Tzav and says the following: The expression "Command ...!" always implies urging on to carry out a command, implying too, that it comes into force at once, and is binding upon future generations.

The three things that we learn are as follows:

- 1 - Urgent - When something is urgent, it means we care, it means we are connected. The Torah here is commanding us to have a sense of urgency and passion when we perform Mitzvot.
- 2 - Comes into force at once - The Torah commands us not to wait around, if we have an opportunity to do a good deed, do it right away. The habit of pushing things off and not taking advantage of the moment are bad habits that need never to be implemented in our lives.
- 3 - Binding upon future generations - The Torah and Mitzvot are eternal. The idea that the commandments that were given to us thousands of years ago are and will continue to be the light on our path towards righteousness is something difficult to understand but very important.

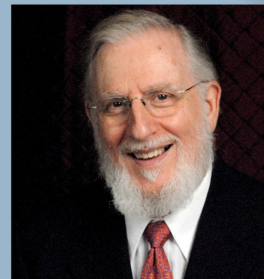

DVAR TORAH

Parshat Tzav

Kohanic Garb: The Essential Ensemble

Look, up in the sky! It's a bird, it's a plane...it's Superman!

Superheroes like Superman, Batman & Spiderman rely on their protective clothing to effect positive change in Society. Many of the creators of Superheroes were Jewish and while they created fictional characters, their lessons are clearly derived from our Torah Tradition, which is rich with insights into the significance of protective clothing and its effects.

This year of 5782 is a Jewish Leap Year, with Parshat Tzav read close to Purim. Queen Esther, the heroine of the Purim Megillah, is our own female Superhero. Warned by Mordechai of the decree against the Jews, she clothed in Royalty (Esther 5:1) to protect herself from the wrath of seeing King Achashverosh without a proper Invitation.

She fasted for three days with prayer and the Gemara in Megillah 14b infers that "clothed in royalty" means that she clothed herself with a divine spirit of inspiration, "Ruach Hakodesh."

Can wardrobe effect change in modern times? President Volodymyr Zelenskyy spoke to the US Congress on Ta'anit Esther, pleading for the People of Ukraine. He adopted a change of clothes and swapped a business suit for wartime khakis to reflect his changing role from statesman to warrior.

According to Rabbi Yitzchak Hutner z"l commenting on the Vilna Gaon, "Purim is the mirror image of Yom Kippur," known as Yom Ha-KiPurim, where "each holiday provides the missing half that the other lacks." Each holiday's respective connection includes Purim and Queen Esther's royal clothing & Yom Kippur's "re-enactment" of the majesty of the Kohen Gadol performing the Yom Kippur service in his Kohanic Garb (Mareh Kohen).

References to clothing first appear in Bereishit, when Adam & Eve cover their nakedness after their sins, and G-d provides the clothing that is essential for them to live outside the Garden of Eden. Yaakov Avinu produces Joseph's coat (tunic) of many colors, which leads to the Jewish presence in Egypt and ultimately, the Exodus and Matan Torah.

Although the Kohanic sacrificial service is introduced earlier in the Torah, in Parshat Tzav we learn that Sacrifices are not optional but are commanded by G-d through Moshe Rabbeinu. Tzav has the same root as "mitzvah" and "tzivanu." The Taryag (613) Mitzvot are commandments and we say "v'tzivanu" in our brachot (blessings). Rabbi Berel Wein says that the strength of the word Tzav is not a matter of negotiation, suggestion, or persuasion. It is simply a command that must be heeded and fulfilled.

For the Sacrificial service, Aaron & his sons, the Kohanim, dress in their essential ensemble of holy garments to bring atonement (Yoma VII: 8) for the sins of the Jewish people (Avodat HaKorbanot). The Kohen Gadol (High Priest) wore eight garments, and the other Kohanim four garments.

It was all or nothing for the priestly garments, showing that you cannot serve G-d halfway, regardless of your "opinion" as to the importance of any particular component of the service. Each unit became an integral part of the Kohen's identify. Rabbi Shimshon Rafael Hirsch said that nothing was to come between the body of the Kohen and the clothing he wore. The garments of "Honor & Glory" were to become the very being of the skin of the Kohen.

Each of the garments had its own importance.

According to the Midrash Rabbah, the four elements of the priestly garb included the tunic, which atoned for the prohibition of mixing wool & linen (shatnez); the breeches, for lack of chastity; the mitre, for arrogance; and the girdle, for the crooked of heart or for thievery. The additional four items of clothing for a total of eight for the Kohen Gadol were; the breastplate for those that perverted justice; the ephod for idol worshippers; the forehead plate for the shameless and blasphemers; and the bells of the robe for evil speech and some say, for unintentional killing. Some say that only the death of the Kohen Gadol could atone for unintentional killing.

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks z"l said that the laws of sacrifices are among the hardest in the Torah to relate to.

Without the Mishkan or Temple, we perform sacrifices differently, sacrificing our time and money to build Torah institutions as exemplified by visionaries like Rabbi Dr. Bernard Lander z'l of Touro University. In the former Soviet Union, Refusenik Natan Sharansky sacrificed to keep Judaism alive.

My childhood rabbi, Dr. Joseph Singer z"l of Manhattan Beach, Brooklyn, whose yahrzeit is 12 Adar, said that Sacrifice & Torah are both known as Lechem (food) and that we need both for our physical & spiritual sustenance.

At Purim, we remember the sacrifices of Queen Esther, who gave up her Jewish life with Mordechai so that the Jews of Persia and the world could be saved. Rabbi YY Jacobson vividly reminds us that Mordechai told Queen Esther that her placement in the King's foreign kingdom was necessary for Jewish survival.

We wish success to all the Jews and good people of the Ukraine, who are sacrificing daily in their quest for survival. In the Ukraine during WWII, thousands died al kiddush Hashem during the Holocaust.

Let us pray that in today's world, the brave people of Ukraine and their allies across the world can turn the present darkness into light, as Queen Esther did in her time.
