Yom Hazikaron and Yom Haatzmaut: Yirmiyahu's Words come to Life by Rabbi Michael Laitner, Assistant Rabbi Finchley United Synagogue, London

One of the best-known Biblical prophecies is that of Yirmiyahu Jeremiah, perhaps most familiar from the sheva berachot wedding blessings of 'kol sason ve'kol simcha', the voice of joy and happiness, based on Yirmiyahu 33:10-11, in which the prophet talks of how one day the hills of Judea and the courtyards of Jerusalem will resonate with joyful sounds of celebration. How different is that scene from the one in which Yirmiyahu actually spoke these words of prophecy! He was in a Jerusalem heading towards the destruction of the First Temple era.

As the start of that chapter notes, he was prophesizing whilst imprisoned by those who had refused to listen to his impassioned pleas about how to avert disaster. Despite this, Yirmiyahu, inspired by G-d, was still able to prophesize visions so uplifting that we say them as wedding blessings!

Looking out onto the Jerusalem landscape, where I am fortunate to be writing this article, I wonder what Yirmiyahu, prophesizing when and where he did, would have made of the Land and State of Israel today, a rebuilt Jerusalem and a modern country, where Judaism flourishes and which has recently been ranked by the World Economic Forum as the third most innovative country in the world.

Sitting in that prison, Yirmiyahu expressed one of our oldest truths, dating back to Avraham and the covenants G-d made with him, that the connection between the Jewish people and the Land of Israel is unbreakable. Wherever our history takes us, one day we will have the opportunity to come to our national home and to live out the prophecies of the Bible. It is a dream which has sustained us for thousands of years, even as we know that those prophecies have not yet been completed.

Our Talmudic Rabbis knew it well and put it into the sheva berachot, perhaps to remind us every time we celebrate a marriage, that the joy of our return to the Land of Israel would also take place.

We are privileged to experience some of these prophecies today. At the same time, we always must remain mindful that the situation of the Jewish people in the Land of Israel has and does not come without cost, at times a very dear one, through too many people making the ultimate sacrifice, as we remember on Yom Hazikaron.

Rabbi Meir Leibush, a 19th century scholar known as 'The Malbim', explains that the 'voice' Yirmiyahu refers to is also one through which we praise G-d in unison. Let us do that on Yom Haatzmaut, bearing Yirmiyahu's lessons in mind.

I wish you a reflective Yom Hazikaron and an uplifting Yom Haatzmaut.
