### Security Committee Update – June 22, 2103

#### What to Do If You Spot Suspicious Terrorist Activity.

Be on the lookout for people who just "don't belong" or their behavior is out of place.

Outside the shul if you see suspicious behavior please alert one of the shul security volunteers. Do not confront the individuals involved. Become familiar with this outline. Take note of the details: Remember: S.A.L.U.T.E

- **S Size** (Remember the number of people, gender, ages, and physical descriptions)
- A Activity (Describe exactly what they are doing)
- L Location (Provide exact location)
- **U Uniform** (Describe what they are wearing, including shoes)
- T Time (Provide date, time, and duration of activity)
- E Equipment (Describe vehicle, make, color etc., license plate, camera, guns, etc)

Suspicious activity is often recalled after an event. We must train ourselves to be on the lookout for things that are out of the ordinary and arouse suspicions.

## d'var echod b'lev echod

Insights into the weekly Parsha and other matters at the heart of the LSS community

Balak the Moabite read Sonnet 43 penned by Elizabeth Barrett Browning, but actually misread what she wrote. Her sonnet asked *How do I love thee? Let me count the ways...*.Balak looked at the Jews, perceived them as a threat, and substituted the word hate for love. Some would say the substitution was the word *fear*. (Was he aware of the difference?) *Balak* can be viewed as simple or one rich with many themes on the macro, mezzo, and micro levels. On the micro level, *Balak* revolves around a deficiency of awareness of intra and inter-personal motivations. On the macro level, Jews need to be aware that this story re-surfaces throughout history with different sets of characters. Awareness, then, is the overall theme. The parsha also has ironic twists which may be lost in a cursory reading - pun intended.

Everyone knows the narrative. Balak was determined to destroy the Jewish people before they could destroy him and his people. Counting the ways he hated them would prove insufficient for his goal. He called upon his cousin, the pagan prophet Balaam, descendant of Lavan, to curse them. After all, since Balaam was also a nephew of Avraham and a prophet, he was the right one to curse the Jewish people on Balak's behalf. Balak failed to realize, or was unaware, that his cousin answers to a higher power. Balak's wish was that Balaam's curse would destroy *the people who came out of Egypt* (22:5), since words from the prophet alone would be sufficient for destruction. Instead, Balaam praises the Jewish people in accordance with Hashem's will. At the end of the parsha, the cousins go their separate ways.

Rashi cites the Midrash which states that Balaam wanted to curse the Jewish people, but felt helpless. He saw them as strongly connected to HaShem, their roots, and to each other; only internal strife would destroy them. Too bad he exited the parsha prior to its end when such strife occurred with disastrous results. The curse Balaam did not give B'nai Israel, they gave to themselves.

Parsha Balak is a psychological study of impulse and emotions, and a wish to utilize the power of cursing words, somebody else's in this case. Balak was sufficiently aware that words have power, but he did not realize that words of power do not apply in all cases. Ask Rabbi Joseph Telushkin, author of Words That Hurt, Words That Heal, about the power of words. Sometimes words are the tools of strength, and sometimes the tools of a coward. When action is needed, cowards hide behind rhetoric, and yet words can be very powerful. They can be perceived as reflections of strength when manipulated by skillful, shallow orators or utilized to motivate for the good.

If Balak had assessed he could physically defeat the Jewish people, he would have tried. If he felt he could communicate well, he would have negotiated. He was empty and employed the alleged ability of somebody else, and was rightfully betrayed. Sound familiar? Are we aware that that same story is currently in the news with print media complementing speech? The world is aware of our blessings, our strength as a people, and our talents, so that naturally we have to be destroyed. There are people today who do not read newspapers and rely on weekly parshas to inform about current events. The Jewish people today are still misperceived as the enemy. Words are still employed to curse us. Balaam knew his curses would not succeed and offered praise instead of curses. Why don't others see our goodly tents?

We have to be aware of external events. It is no coincidence that *Balak* is situated between the outstanding events of *Chukat*, (the deaths of Aaron and Miriam and Moshe's rock hitting episode), and the intensity of events in forthcoming parshas, we could use a break. Parsha *Balak* gives us reason to pause, but it is not comic relief. While connected to the chain of events outlined in *Bamidbar*, this parsha can be lifted from the Torah and serve as an independent story, and yet it is very inter-connected. The parsha begins with chapter 2 and concludes with the start of the Pinchas saga, reinforcing that the series of events is embedded in our history after Egypt, not separate from it. While the Jewish people were complaining about food, Balak wants them destroyed. Did they know? While we complain about the food quality at our local markets, are we oblivious to security all around?

B'nai Israel cannot afford insularity. We need to be aware of and have insights into current political and social climates since history is repetitive (sorry, that's true). Simultaneously, each person needs awareness of the emotions and motivations of self. There are levels and nuances of awareness to provide information for appropriate planning, knowledge of consequences, to see the big picture, etc. Awareness translates to moving from self to gain broader perspectives.

In 22:6 Balak says that whomever you (Balaam) bless is blessed and whomever you curse is accursed; language symmetry which will be used again in 24:9 by Balaam using HaShem's words against Balak, the latter still being unaware that Balaam's curses will not work. This language pattern would be echoed by another Moabite, Ruth, who said to her mother-in-law that wherever she goes, I (Ruth) will go...and your G-d will be my G-d (Ruth 1:16), but her purposes were different and she had historical awareness. We should be aware that the Mashiach will have Moabite blood. Implications? Unfortunately, I am unaware of what they are.

We need awareness of self, current events, and the relevance of parshas in our own life. Writing sonnets heightens awareness. ... By the way, what time is it? Just checking to see if you are aware!
