Fight BDS with a Simple Click: Visit www.boycott-israel.net

After Shabbat, Google the phrase 'boycott Israel' and see what results pop up. Not happy with the results of the search? Neither were four Israeli students and they decided to do something about it. They created a "rogue" website that *appears* to support the boycott against Israel, but in fact provides pro-Israel content. The website, **boycott-israel.net**, seeks to reach anyone who tries to search Google for "boycott Israel," expecting to find websites *against* the Jewish state. But those readers will be disappointed, as instead of articles calling to boycott Israel, they will find content presenting the complexity of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Of course, they will also learn that the situation is not as simple as calling Israel an apartheid state.

Here is what you can do to help: Book mark and visit this web site frequently. Share it with your friends. The content of the web site is updated daily and it is a great source of information for all of us. **The more people visit this site, the more often it will show up when people Google "boycott Israel."** And that would be a very good thing.

The title of the *parsha* alludes to an action of *aliyah*, when Aaron raises up the lights to the *menorah*. He was to light them all. We are reminded that the *menorah* is hammered from one unified piece of gold with a single central wick in its stem, to which all of the wicks of the branches point.

There is a tradition of identifying each of the lights of the *menorah* with different branches of knowledge, each pointing toward the central source of knowledge, the *Torah*, represented by the central wick. Alternatively, the branches represent the factions within Judaism which, no matter how much they flicker with our differences and conflicts, are raised up by Aharon to burn toward the central flame representing unity and coexistence. The way this will come about is not always clear to us; remember that the clarity of the light was always diffused by the cloud of the *ketoret*, the spices which were burned each time the menorah was lit.

The *amud anan*, the cloud that protected us in the desert, is described later in the *parsha*. G-d guides Bnei *Yisrael* toward *Eretz Yisrael* and controls their movements by means of a cloud that covered the camp when it rested. *Vena'ala he'anan venasau*, when *Bnei Yisrael* was to move to the next step toward its destiny in *Eretz Yisrael*, the cloud rose up. Again language of the same root is used, just as in today's *Aliyah*.

The artistic designs of the *klei kodesh* of the temple are powerful symbols and their influence crosses generations and millennia. It is no accident that the form of the *menorah* is described in such exact detail in the Torah; that the *menorah* on the arch of Titus is the salient icon of the destruction and exile; and that it was taken as the symbol of the reigniting of our nationhood in the State of Israel.

With the birth of Zionism over 100 years ago, the menorah had a great influence on Theodore Hertzl. An assimi-

lated Jew, he wrote an essay in Die Welt, in 1897 called "The Menorah." In it he describes an artist's realization that the solution to his angst as a Jew subject to anti-semitism was to return his children to Judaism – he felt he and his generation were too far gone – and so he crafted for them a *chanukiya* in the traditional branched form of the menorah of the Mishkan. He watched their amazement at the lighting of one candle after another, and saw in them the re-creation of an entire nation: different streams returning to Jewish awareness and identity, wick by wick, flame by flame, pushing away the darkness. "The young and the poor are the first to see the light, then all those who love justice, truth, liberty, progress, humanity, and beauty." And, in Herzl's vision, none was more blessed than the shamash; Herzl saw himself and his peers as the shamash, server of light in the rekindling of the Jewish nation. He saw in this *menorah* the oneness of all Jews that was essential to their survival. Herzl lived a surprisingly short life, dying at age 44 in 1904. All of his works on the Zionist dream were accomplished in a short 10 years from 1894 until his untimely death. Rav Avraham Yitzchak Hacohen Kook was called upon to eulogize Herzl shortly after his own Aliyah and appointment as Chief Rabbi of Jaffa. In his famous eulogy for Herzl, "The Lamentation in Jerusalem," he didn't mention Herzl by name. Instead, the lamentation consisted of an involved analysis of the distinctions between *Moshiach ben Joseph*, the restorer of our practical nationhood among the nations of the world, and *Moshiach ben David*, the restorer of our spiritual uniqueness. Although there is a conflict between these two values, Rav Kook described the need to live with the tension and to appreciate both forces, in our time of chevlei Moshiach. He described the wicks of the menorah as representing the joining of various groups whose values are "the Torah, prophesy, wisdom, justice, heroism, joy, compassion, and love." And that "The most essential blessing is the blessing of peace, and peace will come in the future when it will become clear that all of the different lights share a common root and are really one single light."
