IN MEMORY OF TUVIA YANAI WEISSMAN



IDF Sgt. Tuvia Yanai Weissman, a 21-year-old Nahal Brigade member and married father of a baby girl, succumbed to wounds inflicted in a stabbing attack in the Rami Levy supermarket in Sha'ar Binyamin last Thursday. He leaves behind his parents and three brothers.

Weissman, a resident of Ma'aleh Michmash, was off-duty and unarmed at the time of the attack and was shopping along with his wife, Yael, and four-month old baby daughter, Neta.

During his funeral, Weissman's father eulogized his son saying, "You loved your daughter, Neta, so much. You took her to see the flowers in the Negev the day before you were murdered. No hate and no enemy will ever stop that."

Weissman was educated in Jerusalem and took a preparatory military course in Kfar Eldad before enlisting to Nahal. He was married during his military service. Rabbi Nathanson, the head of the preparatory program eulogized:

"Your wife informed me yesterday that you all had been in a different aisle in the supermarket, you heard screams, and she bent over to cover Neta and you disappeared. You couldn't listen to screaming and stand back, you were like that - you did not have a weapon because you were off-duty. You fought with your fists, your body, your whole heart."

Weissman's young widow, Yael, cried, "You were always full of endless giving. If you hadn't run there (to stop the terrorists) you wouldn't be the Yanai that I know and fell in love with. If only you could have been with Neta more, how many dreams we had," "Yanai, you are a true hero of all the nation of Israel," she stated. "You knew that you had no weapon and nevertheless you ran. I want to thank you, I merited to learn from a talented and special man. Thank you for our Neta."

May his memory be a blessing.

IN MEMORY OF ELIAV GELMAN



IDF Reserves Captain Eliav Gelman, 30 years old, was killed by gunfire targeting a terrorist who at-tempted a stabbing attack at the Gush Etzion Junction. He was a resident of Karmei Tzur, grew up in Kiryat Arba and had studied at the Mekor Haim yeshiva. He was the father of two boys, Yoav (aged 2) and Yair (5). His wife Rinat is

seven months pregnant.

His brother, Eyal eulogized him. "He was loved, loving, connected to the Jewish People, the land of Israel, and the Torah of Israel. He was dedicated to the Torah. Every day when he woke up, regardless of what happened at night, wherever and whenever, even in the army, he would study daily Talmud portion and the Torah."

"My brother fell in a battle that we have known for a long time. The people of Israel have experienced many battles and pogroms. My brother, too – my dear brother – you entered this circle, the same silver tray that for 150 years this people, this revival generation continues to redeem the land of Israel and build the State of Israel. God have given and God has taken away, may the name of the Hashem be blessed".

If you ask almost any Hebrew Day School graduate what is the first comment in the Torah by the foremost biblical commentator, Rashi, (Rabbi Shlomo Yitzchaki 1040-1105) he will give you an almost immediate answer. Rashi says by right the Torah should have started with the first mitzvah addressed to the nation, that of designating the New Moon. So why was it bequn with the story of creation? The answer that will be given is that when the nations of the world will accuse the Jewish people of stealing the Land of Israel from the indigenous population (and this timely reasoning was written 1000 years ago), they will be answered that the earth was created by the Almighty and He has the absolute right to apportion the land to whomever He feels should receive it. But then if you ask the same student the question of what was Rashi's last comment in the Torah, in Parshat Vezot Haberachah which we read on Simchat Torah, it will take the exceptional student (or Rabbi for that matter) to give you the correct answer. The verse in Deuteronomy reads: "And in all that mighty hand, and in all the awesome power which Moses showed in the sight of all Israel." (34:12) And what act does Rashi choose to show the greatness of Moses that was there for all to see? One of the 10 plagues? The splitting of the Sea of Reeds? Hitting the rock which then brought forth streams of water? No, none of these. Instead Rashi chooses an unlikely incident from today's Torah reading. As Moses descends from the top of Mount Sinai carrying the two Tablets, he is confronted with the Israelites dancing around the Golden Calf. In anger, he throws the Tablets down at the foot of the mountain and shatters them. Rashi quoting from the Talmud (Shabbat 87A), tells us that God congratulates Moses for this act of destruction. Rashi's last words are, "Yeyasher Kochacha Sheshibarta". "Yasher Koach, congratulations that you shattered them" (the Tablets). Would you have expected that Rashi would have completed his exegesis of the Bible with the incident of the breaking of the Tablets of the Covenant? Usually we complete books of Scripture or the Oral Law with an uplifting story or message. This is a real downer. Why did Rashi choose to end his commentary in this way?

I would like to try and answer this question with a personal story. I was a seven year old second grader at the Ramaz Academy (that's what the Ramaz School was called then). We started each day with the Shacharit morning prayers. Our Hebrew teacher was a new addition to the staff. Mr. Gottlieb was a middle aged man, a recent immigrant from Germany. He spoke with a very distinctive heavy German accent. We were not the best behaved students during the service, and talking, passing notes and other such inappropriate behavior was all too common. Mr. Gottlieb t on an almost daily basis explained that proper decorum was expected of us. We were talking to the Almighty and were not being respectful. As the weeks went by with little improvement Mr. Gottlieb went from trying to reason with us, to ultimately raising his voice, sending individuals out of the room and other such actions in attempting to have us do the right thing. Then one day something happened that became etched in my memory. How many things do any of us remember from our early elementary school years? Well this one did.

The day began as all others with Shacharit. The buzzing started again and got louder and louder with Mr. Gottlieb's face getting increasingly red. Suddenly Mr. Gottlieb took his siddur, his prayer book, and flung it on the floor across to the other side of the room. A large gasp was heard coming from all of the class. Hands went up to our mouths. We were all shocked and stunned. The teacher deliberately throwing his siddur, a book that we kissed if we accidently dropped it? There was a deafening silence in the room. Mr. Gottlieb then explained that if we could not respect the prayer service, then the book in which we prayed had also been disrespected. He then said he would give us one more chance. Each of us began to pray and there was not a hint of any further disturbance or distraction. This decorum continued day after day and almost all of us began to concentrate on the prayers. And to this day, that incident has remained with me. As for Mr. Gottlieb? He was fired soon thereafter for the action taken that day that was unbecoming for a teacher, despite our protestations.

At least for me, I understand why Rashi chose to complete his commentary on the Torah with the Almighty congratulating Moses for breaking the Tablets in the heat of anger. Tablets on which God Himself had written the Ten Commandments.

And Mr. Gottlieb, wherever you are, I just want you know that you had a life-long effect at least on one little boy in your class. Yasher Koach!
