d'var echod b'lev echod

Insights into the weekly Parsha and other matters at the heart of the LSS community

Take heart, all you men who don't follow driving directions: G-d Himself sometimes ignores His G.P.S.! Here's *Exodus* 13:17: It happened when Pharaoh sent out the people that G-d did not lead them by way of the land of the Philistines, because it was near....

The land of the Philistines, or Philistia, bordered Egypt, "near" in the Torah's words. The verse's plain meaning is that G-d avoided the direct route. But we can tease out a radically different meaning by turning to Chapter 10 in this week's *parashah* (Torah portion).

Genesis Ch. 10 sets out the genealogy of the Earth's 70 nations. (The genealogy opens with the phrase, "these are the lineages [toldot]" The significance of "toldot" is explored in "The Revolution of Terah and Avraham," R' Zvi Grumet, Conversations, Winter 2013/5773, R' Hayyim J. Angel, ed., Inst. for Jewish Ideas & Ideals.) Modern scholarship would arrange the Table of Nations, as this genealogy is called, differently from the Torah's arrangement. Modern classification, E. A. Speiser explains, "... is strictly linguistic, whereas the Bible employs several criteria ...," Anchor Bible, Genesis, p. 71, including geography and ethnography.

Speiser was an Orientalist at U. of P. He lectured from the podium not the *shtender*. Yet, as we'll see, Speiser's insight that ethnography determines kinships in the Table of Nations dovetails with how *Exodus* 13:17 is interpreted by two lions of the Tradition.

Genesis 10:13-14 records the kinship between the Egyptians and the Philistines, the two peoples linked in Exodus 13:17. That latter verse spotlights the geographic linkage evoked by Speiser. But where are these peoples linked by Speiser's ethnographic criterion? Actually, the ethnographic link is hiding in plain sight in the very same verse that shows the geographic connection. But the link is visible only in the Hebrew. "By way of the land of the Philistines" is the translation of "derech eretz Plishitim." Beyond its literal meaning of a land route, derech eretz also has multiple idiomatic meanings. It's a euphemism for copulation (Passover Haggadah: "He saw our torment' refers to the cutting off [of husbands and wives] from derech eretz; "likewise, Eruvin 100b: "But for the Torah we would learn derech eretz from the rooster.") It can mean a worldly occupation (Mishnah Avot, 2(2): "It is good to combine Torah study with derech eretz"). Last, derech eretz can mean adherence to social norms (Kabak household circa 1950s: "Bernard! Show some derech eretz!").

Derech eretz as meaning social norms opens Exodus 13:17 to a new reading. The Israelites had never set foot in Philistia. Yet, because the land's social mores and practices--in Speiser's vocabulary, the Philistine ethnography--was congruent with Egypt's, the Israelites would have perceived Philistia not as foreign but as familiar. Or, in the Hebrew of Exodus 13:17, karov. Having removed the Israelites from the idolatrous culture of Egypt, G-d would not lead them through a land similar in its social norms--karov in its derech eretz--on the path to Sinai.

Karov has yet another meaning that not only squares with this reading but also leads back to the Table of Nations. *Karov* can signify family. Now *Exodus* 13:17 reads:

It happened when Pharaoh sent out the people that G-d did not lead them by way of the land of the Philistines, because it was kin [= karov].

Which kinship? The Da'at Zekeinim mi-Ba'alei ha-Tosafot, citing "om kerovo" in Psalms 148:14, posits G-d's kinship with Israel. But the Da'at Zekeinim offers an alternative possibility: the Philistines' kinship with the Egyptians, a reading derived from the Philistines' descent from the Egyptians in the Table of Nations.

So the sense of *Exodus* 13:17 may be this:

It happened when Pharaoh sent out the people that G-d shielded them from the culture of the Philistines for the people were all-too familiar with the kindred Egyptian culture.

In English the two readings of *karov*--as meaning "familiar" or as signifying family--converge, because "familiar" and "family" both derive from the same Latin root: *familia* = household.

Rabbi Elchanan Adler notes that *Exodus* 13:17 is the sole instance in the Torah where the words *derech* and *eretz* are conjoined to form the phrase *derech eretz*. Catnip for commentators! Sure enough, two commentators pick up on the phrase and its ethnographic meaning.

To the Chasam Sofer (R' Moses Sofer, 1762--1839) the Philistines represented the secular culture of Central Europe. He read G-d's abhorrence of the Philistines as a warning against allowing secular European culture to make inroads into the traditional Jewish community.

The Chafetz Chaim (R' Yisrael Meir Kagan, 1838--1933) interprets *Exodus* 13:17 by framing an argument G-d has with Himself. Philistia, G-d reasons, is a settled land where the Israelites will find ample food. But the Israelites will also find there the same polluting impurities of Egypt. In contrast, the desert is free of impurity, unsullied by idolatry. But it is unsown, barren. How will the Israelites find food? In the end, G-d takes the desert route. Like the Chasam Sofer, the Chafetz Chaim saw a lesson for his own time. To those who said Sabbath work was necessary for their livelihood, the Chafetz Chaim pointed to the desert generation: if G-d could sustain the 600,000 who left Egypt, surely He can sustain every individual who keeps His commandments.

To find Rabbis Sofer and Kagan aligned with Speiser may surprise. Speiser was immersed in modern academia; Sofer opposed secular culture and modernity. Speiser looked to archaeology and philology to illuminate the past; Kagan looked, rather, to the future Messianic Age (believing it so imminent that he carried special garments to change into once the Redemption began). But Speiser was not just a dispassionate academic. He shared, in his fashion, the Chasam Sofer's and the Chafetz Chaim's conviction that Judaism has a unique role on the world stage. Speiser sees Abram's journey from Mesopotamia (spoiler alert!--it's told in next week's *parashah*) as more than the story of one person or even of one people. That distant event, Speiser declares, altered history irrevocably, becoming the very mapping out of history's main road, *Anchor Bible, Genesis*, p. LII.
