Parshat Noach

Two similar Rashi commentaries, one at the beginning, the other near the close, bookend this week's *parashah* (Torah reading). The Rashis are similar in that they both compare the moral tenor of society in different historical eras. While the earlier Rashi is famous, the later Rashi doesn't get much attention. And yet this wallflower Rashi bears a lesson that is central to Jewish communal life to this day.

The famous Rashi, which opens the *parashah* (*Genesis* 6:9), takes up the question whether Noah, termed "righteous" in his generation, would have been so regarded had he lived in the generation of Abraham.

The later Rashi, on *Genesis* 11:9, that is not as well-known (at least to me, perhaps because it is found toward the *parashah's* end, where I seldom reach in my reading), comes at the morality question from the opposite direction. It is concerned not with comparative *righteousness* but with comparative *wickedness*. Which generation, Rashi asks, was the more wicked, the Generation of the Flood in Noah's time or the Generation of the Dispersion at the time of the Tower of Babel?

At first blush, it would seem that the Generation of the Dispersion committed the graver sin: by constructing a tower that would reach into the heavens (*Genesis* 11:4), they sought to challenge G-d Himself! Don't they win the wickedness contest hands down? Amazingly, no! Rashi points out that the Generation of the Dispersion did not suffer the greater punishment. The Generation of the Flood was wiped off the face of the Earth, whereas the Generation of the Dispersion, while they were scattered across the Earth (*Genesis* 11:8), were allowed to survive. The question is why.

Rashi identifies the merit of the Generation of the Dispersion that justified their survival. Whereas the Generation of the Flood were robbers, among whom mutual hostility prevailed, the Generation of the Dispersion was marked by love and friendship. G-d, it is plain, treasures concord and peace among humans even to the point of downplaying His own dishonor.

Such concord and peace must be genuine. The forgiveness of sins between persons cannot, as we are reminded so often during the Days of Awe, be outsourced to G-d. It's our responsibility alone.

Our sacred texts abound with examples of the primacy given to caring human relationships. Thus, Moses infuriates G-d by blaming Him for Pharaoh's requiring the Israelite slaves to make bricks without being given straw. Nevertheless, G-d overlooks this challenge to His honor, recognizing that Moses' cry was for the sake of the people (*Exodus* 5:6 -- 6:1, from a *d'var Torah* of Rabbi Robinson). Another example appears in Talmud *Berachot* 12b. There, Rabbah bar Hinnana the Elder says in the name of Rab that whoever has it in his power to pray on behalf of his neighbor and fails to do so is called a sinner! (From Rabbi Robinson's 5777 *Shabbat Shuva drasha* and his remarks before *Ne'ilah*.)

It is not incidental that these two examples come from the teachings of Rabbi Robinson. The Torah imperative to strengthen the cords of caring in our community has been a consistent theme of his messages. To be sure, caring for one another is an emphasis that goes back to the very origins of our congregation. Lincoln Square Synagogue could not have flourished as *the* pioneering outreach shul without congregants who care about everyone who walks through our doors. Even our shul's trademark seating-in-the-round works toward that end; seeing people's faces rather than the backs of their heads is an antidote to indifference.

And so, may love and friendship prevail among us. May we forgive, may we be forgiven for, sins against one another. May we always include each other in our prayers.

This *d'var Torah* is dedicated to the memory of Barry Youngerman, whose first *yahrtzeit* fell this past week. The upcoming election, *bimheirah b'yameinu*, reminds me that Barry and I disagreed on politics. Yet we still included each other in our prayers (well, for the most part).
