Reminder about shul safety:

Entrances and Exits

Please remember to use emergency exits only in case of emergency.

Access Control:

The key to our shul's safety is access control. Although LSS is welcoming to all we need to balance this with the need to restrict access to those who may pose a threat.

Fundamental to access control is using one main entrance and one main exit that is monitored by shul security. If members use the emergency exits as a short cut to leave shul anyone waiting outside can come in without being screened. This is a security breach and a threat to our safety.

If you see something, say something. Act as if your live depends on it, because it does.

Earlier this summer, Anthony Stokes began experiencing chest pains. His mother brought the 15-year-old to Children's Hospital in Atlanta. Doctors discovered that Anthony had an enlarged heart. Without a transplant, he would die within three to six months.

Like all transplant candidates, Anthony underwent a screening to determine if he would be a suitable recipient for a new heart. He was rejected because he had "a history of non-compliance."

Anthony had low grades, and a record of juvenile detention; he had been in a fight--some say to protect his younger brother. The committee that rejected him believed that he would not follow instructions to take crucial medications after a transplant, and would die despite receiving a new heart.

When his rejection became national news, Anthony moved to the top of the waiting list for heart transplants. Now, he has a chance to live.

A Spiritual "History of non-Compliance"

During the <u>Aseret Yemai Teshuvah</u>, the Ten Days of Repentance, I envision God finding "a history of non-compliance" as he reviews my 5773 records. The incidents go beyond a justifiable fight. My grades in certain character traits could be better. I am no juvenile. I have no excuse.

Nevertheless, during the days from the beginning of Elul through Yom Kippur, God offers people like me an opportunity for spiritual heart surgery. If there are accusers who protest, God can silence them with absolute authority. God is the world's Healer, but there is no waiting list and no need for insurance.

The challenge lies in diagnosing yourself and going to the spiritual emergency room. Traditionally, during the <u>Aseret Yemai Teshuvah</u>, the doctor on call is available to all-with few if any questions. He desires only that the candidate for an upgraded heart express a sincere desire to change for the better.

If we had waited months and finally were granted access to an outstanding heart specialist, would we not leave our business early and rush to visit her? If she could fit us in only at certain times, we'd gladly forego trips to the theater or sports events to see her. Through Yom Kippur, the office is open to all.

National Non-Compliance

A verse from this week's parasha [Deut. 32:20] accuses: "They are a generation that reverses itself, they are not trustworthy." We and our ancestors have suffered grievously for our shortcomings. Yet God has not forsaken us and will not abandon us. "And God will remove the blockage (literally circumcise) your heart and the heart of your offspring, (so that you will) love God with all your heart and all your soul, that you may live." [Deut. 30:6]
