# 16 Adar II 5776 • March 25-26, 2016 Parshat Tzav - "What You Say vs. What You Mean"

What I would like to focus on in this *d'var torah* is how *chazal* (as brought down by *Rashi*) comment on the use of the word *Tzav* and on the use of two other similar strong verbs: *Kach* (Take) and *Krav* (Come near). The commentary on these words, as applied to *Aharon* and his children (who are in the process of becoming priests), go beyond how chazal understood the verbs themselves to how they viewed the priestly role.

This week's parsha begins by telling us how Moshe instructed Aharon and his sons about the rules for several sacrifices. Unlike prior sections in which God told Moshe to 'say' or 'speak' about the sacrifices to Bnei Yisrael (Vayikra 1:2, 4:2), here he is told "Tzav et Aharon v'et bannav", Command Aharon and his sons. Rashi tells us that this kind of language, in which Aharon is ordered to do something, was necessary to emphasize to him the requirement to be punctilious in performing the rituals; it is needed since there was a potential for financial loss in doing so (Rashi: Cheesarone Kees). It is as if merely being 'told' by God (through Moshe) would not be enough to overcome the human tendency to short-change people since this particular sacrifice (the Olah) did not financially benefit Aharon. Chazal understood that a Tzav (a command) was needed to make the point that fidelity to religious teaching (and God's law) is important particularly when personal financial benefit is low. The priestly family is seen as no different than any of us, potentially corruptable and in need of extra guidance to overcome human self-interest.

Here is another example (*Vayikra* 8:2). The verse says (to *Moshe*) "Take Aaron and his sons with him and the clothes, and the oil of anointment, and the bull of the sin-offering and the two rams and the basket of matzot." Looking carefully, it appears that *Aharon* is treated as a thing, because he is on the list of items that can be physically picked up and used as needed. To address this, the meaning of the word *Kach* (Take) is changed by *Rashi* to mean 'take (or win him over) with words.' That is to say, "create a human and relational moment *Moshe* and convince your brother to do it, to become the priest." This understanding of the word is almost the exact opposite of how *Kach* appears to be used in the verse where, to paraphrase Freud, Take means Take. At face value, in the text, priests are seen as things, instruments used in the sacrificial process, though *chazal* prefers to see them as persons and implies that we should interact and relate to them when bringing sacrifices.

A third example is to be found next week in *Shemini* (*Vayikra* 9:7): *Moshe* says to *Aharon*, after having told him previously to take a young bull for a sin-offering, "*Krav el hameezbeiach v'aseh chatatcha v'et olatecha*" (Draw close to the altar and do your sacrafices). *Krav* (Draw Close) connotes slight harshness ('move it already'), perhaps more appropriately applied to someone hierarchically lower, or to a herd of sheep. Uncomfortable with this connotation when applied to *Aharon*, *chazal* flip the meaning: As before with *Kach*, *Krav* here means that *Moshe* should have a conversation with *Aharon* and persuade him to overcome his hesitancy about becoming the priest. Instead of 'just do it' *chazal* suggest *Krav* means 'lets talk.' The *chazal* view of the priest here is a very human one, someone full of self-doubt and ambivalence about assuming the role and authority.

In these three examples the rabbis imply that more is apparent in the verbs used. Chazal saw Hard Commands in the text (like those used in the military, these are orders that are direct and clear and without explanation: Take. Command. Move it.). Biblical writing is full of them, but for chazal they were troublesome as applied to Aharon. Instead, they felt Aharon should receive Soft Commands (orders that are explained, reasons sprinkled with logic are given, and included is a metamessage that the recipients deserve to be told why: Wear your winter coat-its supposed to snow later.). Re-interpreting the strong verbs, chazal transformed the second and third of them into soft commands, and justified the need for a hard command in the first. The three examples may also show how, years later, chazal viewed priests in general: vulnerable to the human temptation to cut corners, ambivalent about their privileges, and perhaps, struggling with the impersonal aspects of ritual duties.

One implication of this is that *chazal* honored their own reading of the text. Feeling uncomfortable with how things were expressed, they did not ignore these reactions but used them to suggest a richer and more nuanced understanding of the way *Aharon* was instructed in the sacrificial service and installed into the priesthood. Plainly, we are not *chazal*. However, we too may react to word choices that seem off in light of how we communicate today. Rather than dismiss them, we should use these reactions to explore other meanings that may be embedded in the torah.
