

What We Can Do to Help

The situation in Israel is very grave and is approaching a war of attrition. The stabbings, the shootings, the car attacks continue unabated. The list of casualties keeps growing and growing. In November alone, Netanel Litman, Yakov Litman, Benjamin Yakubovich, Yakov Don, Aharon Yesayev, Reuven Aviram, Hadar Buchris, Shadi Arafa, Ezra Schwartz, and Ziv Mizrahi were all murdered by Arab terrorists. Countless others have been injured.

What can we do to help? To start, call your friends and family members in Israel. Let them know that you're thinking of them. Israelis feel very isolated during this turbulent time and they experience first-hand the double standard that Rabbi Robinson talked about last Shabbat. No buildings and monuments are bathed in blue and white in the world's capitals. Hatikvah is not played before concerts and sporting events. Your call will let Israelis know that we have not forgotten them.

Second, join AIPAC and NORPAC. The lobbying over the Iran nuclear deal has left a gaping hole in the critical Israeli-American alliance at a time that Israel needs all the help that it can get from both sides of the aisle. Over the next couple of weeks you will hear from Ann Crane about registering for AIPAC's 2016 Annual Policy Conference in March (\$100 early bird discount if you register by December 1). What's In a Name?

Our forefather Jacob was a complicated man. True to his name, for most of his life he had been a grasper and a grabber. He may have seemed a "quiet man of the tent," but like much about him, his looks were deceptive — Jacob had been a wrestler since he was in the womb. Forced to flee his homeland in order to escape his brother Esau's hunger for revenge, in this week's parsha, after more than a 20-year absence, he returns. His departure from Laban was hasty, but he is hardly a typical refugee. Jacob is now a very wealthy man.

Suddenly he learns Esau, accompanied by an army of four hundred, is marching to meet him, and Jacob becomes utterly unnerved. Terrified that everything he's worked so hard for will be taken from him and half-convinced he never deserved it to begin with, he prays for deliverance. But ever the schemer, his first thought is to appease Esau by offering a bribe. And ever astute, he also devises a contingency plan. He divides his property into two camps and sends them off in opposite directions to stave off, however briefly, the prospect of total annihilation. Metaphorically, he is paralyzed with fear. Toward morning, he will be paralyzed for real.

When a stranger confronts him by the Jabbok river, Jacob is alone. Wordlessly, determinedly, he wrestles the man throughout the night. But while this ordeal was taking its toll on his body, what was going through his mind? Might he have been thinking, how did I end up here? Was he re-evaluating how he had swindled his brother out of his birthright? How he defrauded his father into giving him Esau's blessing? How he grabbed up his considerable holdings and sneaked away from his father-in-law Laban like a thief in the night?

The story of Jacob wrestling with the stranger is among the most enigmatic narratives in all of Scripture. Who is this mysterious adversary? Where did he come from? What does he represent? Is he even real? Why is a wealthy man like Jacob alone without a bodyguard? Why do the two of them, after wrestling the entire night, wait until morning before they first speak to one another? Readers are left to search for the symbolism.

By daybreak, the match is a virtual tie. After a last-minute attempt to cripple Jacob fails, the stranger finally speaks, wanting release; but Jacob refuses to relax his grip and demands a blessing as the price for doing so. Thereupon the man asks Jacob a puzzling question: "What's your name?" It's impossible to believe he would not have known with whom he'd been wrestling for so many hours, so what's the real purpose of this question?

Jacob replies, "I am Jacob." It's a simple, declarative sentence, but it's a 180-degree turnaround from the answer he gave the last time someone asked his name, the last time that he, Jacob, had asked for a blessing. Twenty years earlier, he was perfectly willing to go to great lengths to impersonate someone else, tricking his blind father into believing he was Esau and insisting not once but twice that, indeed, that's who he was. This time, for once, the usually wily Jacob answers without hesitation, forethought or guile, and it is in this moment of truth that the stranger/angel/man contradicts him, and the history of our people is forever changed.

No, he says, you will be Jacob no longer. That name implies a grasper, a grabber, a supplanter. I crippled your leg, the most powerful weapon a wrestler can employ, yet even without a major ability to grip, you prevail. This is the moment for you to realize that you never needed Esau's blessing. You're worthy of your own blessing, based on your own accomplishments. There's no more need for scheming or manipulation. For in an honest struggle, however hard, however unexpected, you prevail. You prevail whether that struggle is with a stranger, a brother or even yourself. Even when the struggle is with your own Creator, you prevail.

From now on, you are Israel.
