### Insights into the weekly Parsha and other matters at the heart of the LSS community

To explain Torah while a naive convert stood on one foot, Hillel turned the very positive imperative in this week's *parsha* to a negative. "Don't do to others what you wouldn't want done to yourself" he said. The young man put his foot down. It seems much easier, at least to me, to know what not to do than learning the hardest thing to do, knowing how to love.

Rabbi Akiva singles out this holy imperative as one of the great principles of Torah, says Rashi. We'd better make sure we're getting it right.

And so the early commentators put these three eternal words (five in English) under the microscope of halacha.

Chezekia ben Maona, known to us as Chizkuni, says that this defining principle is a direct response to the beginning of the verse. It first warns against harboring revenge or bearing grudges. Why? After all, you're not doing anything to hurt anybody. But You can't love others, says Chizkiyanu while having bad feeling Just thinking bad thoughts is enough to prevent you from love.

Ibn Ezra says that loving, in this context, means to respect the values your neighbor holds dear — his family value. his possessions and his *kovod*. Dare not put your neighbor down to get yourself *maftir*. Or wreck his car to make your jalopy look good. Don't use him for your respect. Give him the respect he deserves.

The Rambam sees it differently, stressing the Biblical nature of the commandment. So many rabbinical laws deal with caring, he says, visiting the sick, supporting the poor, comforting the mourner and this biblical imperative puts them all under the rubric of Torah. Their observance in fact, helps perform this mighty mitzya.

You can't take it so literally, says the Ramban. It's impossible to love your neighbor as yourself. Your life has precedence over your neighbor's according to Rabbi Akiva himself. It's about souls, says the Ramban. Your neighbor's soul deserves the same rewards as yours.

Who are these lucky neighbors? ask the rabbis. Should proximity make a difference in your behavior. Could a friend from the other side of the ocean be your neighbor? What about your tennis partner who lives in Scarsdale. The snazzy guy with a handkerchief who tips his hat as he walks his poodle. Your bus driver? The delivery man from Bagels & Co. Could someone you don't even know be your neighbor?

Of all the Torah world's accepted translations, only Art Scroll considers an alternative. "Fellow," it says. "Love your fellow." A chap. A gentleman. A neighbor who wears a bowtie.

"Why all this fuss?" ask today's rabbis as they perform under the chuppah on a busy *Lag Ba'omer*. "Why so difficult to explain who your neighbor is? Look no further than the fifth *bracha* we are about to say (or 'said' depending upon who's doing the wedding) *You* are the very neighbors the Torah says to love. You are the *re'im*, the poorly translated neighbor we talk about. And the *passuk* closes with God's statement of love. 'I am the Lord thy God,' "He says. "I chose to love a nation of ungrateful complainers. A hungry, thirsty, rebellious bunch. The rabbi switches to a more personal tone. "As your relationship grows," he explains, "it will meet new challenges and unpredictable change. But love the way God loves His people and your love will last forever."

The rabbi looks at his watch. He has two more to go.

But rabbi? With a suicide rate of 18%, drug addiction at a dangerous high, obesity, alcohol, narcissism and resentment raging through our people, why would anybody want to be loved by anybody?

Simcha Bunim, the great eighteenth century Chassidic leader, left no *sefer;* he wrote nothing down. But his wisdom, heartfelt stories and his love for his people, live on. He understood.

"I thought my love would change the world," he said. "But the world didn't change. I thought it could change my Poland, but Poland never changed. I then brought it to Peshiscah, the city I love. But it too failed to change. I tried my family, my friends, my chassidim. But no one wanted my love." He sighed. "The only one left to change, I realized, is me.

Love yourself. It's the beginning of your neighbor loving you and the beginning of you loving them. It will bring out your uniqueness, standing you out in a crowd. And it's the road to performing the mitzvah pulled out from all the rest, the holiest mitzva in the world.
