The Prophet and the Prostitute

Ever since the writing of the Septuagent (Targum HaShivim), the book of Bamidbar has been translated "Numbers" from the rabbinic appelation "Sefer Hapekudot." Granted, it was done in reference to the events bracketed in time by the census Moshe performed just after Mount Sinai, and again the census performed 38 years later on the plains of Moav, before the People of Israel entered the land. Except for Joshua and Caleb, none of the men enumerated in the first count are still alive at the second. But calling it Numbers presents a misleading emphasis because the book is actually more about the complexity of names, roles, choices, conflicts and consequences than about the simplicity of a census number.

Moshe counted the people and was praised; King David counted the people and was chastised. Because Moshe's count was accompanied by an exhaustive list of names and narratives, it served in an act of love for Hashem to count *Bnei Yisrael*. David's failing was that he sought a quantity, to revel in his power as leader. Numbers are soulless; names are qualitative and convey identity, character, and fate. The dryness of the census in reading parashat Bamidbar is compensated by the deep richness of narrative and emotional impact of Hosea's life and prophesy in the haftorah reading. Through the naming of his children, Hosea brings his prophesy to life. What's in a name? Every *Yom Hashoah* and *Yom Hazikaron*, in Israel, it is customary to recite the poem *L'Kol Ish Yesh Shem*, "Every Person has a Name" by the beloved Israeli poet Zelda Mishkofski. In it she exhaustively lists the

Every time a man increases his mitzvoth, he earns himself a new name. There are three names by which a person is called: one that his father and mother call him, one that his peers call him, and one that he has earned for himself. The best one is the one he earned for himself.

names given a person by his parents, his luck, his efforts, his sins, his aspirations, his enemies, his love, his chal-

lenges, even his death. The poem is reminiscent of a Medrash Tanhuma in Vayakhel:

This is a message of hope that, No matter what our circumstances, and how far we have wandered, we can still renew ourselves, energized by knowledge of G-d's unwavering love and betrothal to His people.

Hosea lived and prophesied in the last years of Jeroboam II, a corrupt king of the northern tribes, and he spent his life forewarning their demise at the hands of the Assyrians in 722 B.C. His life overlapped those of Amos and Isiah, who lived in the southern kingdom of Judea.

The Navi uses the metaphor of Hosea's marriage to Gomer, a prostitute, to explain Hashem's loyalty and belief in the people of Israel, in spite of their disloyalty in an era where idol worship was rampant. And the names Hashem commanded for his children represent a lifelong commitment to his prophesy.

Hosea challenged God, asking why He does not abandon the Jews and take another nation as his chosen people. In response, Hashem commanded Hosea to marry Gomer, a harlot, even though he knew she would not be faithful. They had three children, and Hashem instructed that they be named *Yizreel*, after the valley where so many Israelites were killed, but also meaning the re-sowing of Israel into the land after the diaspora; *Lo-Ruchama*, meaning without mercy; and *Lo-Ami*, meaning they are no longer My people. Then, Hashem ordered him to send his family away, and he could not abandon them. He understood, viscerally, G-d's continuing love and longing for the people of Israel. This was not just a metaphor of a disloyal wife: Hosea was made to actually live out the prophesy in his life, so that he would speak from the heart. In our haftorah, Hosea teaches that the Jewish people can turn things around and reclaim Hashem's love. Then the names of the children of Israel will change and become *Ami*, My People, and *Ruhama*, Worthy of Mercy. We can control our destiny by being faithful to Hashem.

The haftorah ends with G-d's promise that we recite every day while putting on tefillin, that Israel will be betrothed to Him forever, in justice and in mercy, and in true fidelity, and we will know G-d. Motivated by this knowledge, we can keep the hope that we can and will be accepted by G-d. In the words, *lehavdil*, of a song from the rock musical, Hair: "I believe in G-d, and I believe that G-d believes in . . . me."
