The message of the tree: Torah for Tu Bishvat

The list of Torah's "Rules of Engagement" - negotiating peace, use of force, exemptions, treatment of women and children and total obliteration of key nations, finishes with a fascinating final rule. If you besiege a city for three days and you need fortification, don't cut down its fruit trees. Why? "Man is the tree of the field." says the Torah. (Dev 20:19)

A beautiful, even haunting thought, but what does it mean?

Rashi says it's a *dilma*. a rhetorical question. Is man a tree of the field? Do trees have hands or weapons to defend themselves? People fight people, not trees. Let them be, says Rashi.

The Ibn Ezra vehemently disagrees, challenging Rashi for using *pilpul*, rhetoric thinking, to explain a straightforward moral lesson The metaphor is simple, he says. A fruit tree is life, man depends on it for sustenance. What kind of jerk would cut it down? You might need it someday!

An entire body of halacha, the laws of destruction, *bal tashchis*, are learned from these few mysterious words. Rashi says to not destroy for altruistic reasons. Ibn Ezra says it's for reasons of self-preservation. Either way, the fruit trees remain standing. Yet the main question is left unanswered. Is man a tree of the field or not?

Should you clean up polluted waters to save money on Polish Spring or because you rescue the fish, plants and other organisms living in their biosphere. Save the remains of a *kiddush* because staff and members will have something to nash? Or give it to the street people, Rachael Lindenthal style. Take a carpool to work because you'll save money? Or because carbon transmission of gas threatens a dangerous climate change. Feed a stray dog because it makes you feel good or because it makes the dog feel good.

It's wartime when God chooses to tell the Jewish people to separate plastics from paper, restrict hunting and fishing or to leave a milk container in the refrigerator even if it has less than enough for a cup of coffee.

War is hell (not my line). You can have laws to protect trees yet you destroy entire villages, rape, kill, and pilfer. How nasty was God Himself last week sending frogs, lice and seven other freaks of nature, to show Who's Boss. And this week, He sends the Egyptians to their death drowning them in the very sea he parted for His people.

You can relinquish styrofoam, march to save the whales, and never let the sink run too long. You can't, however, control the killing and pilferage of war. As God describes the Rules of Engagement, he reminds you of the innocent, life-giving tree.

The Quran and the Torah both insist on negotiating peace before going to war. The Torah, however, sends our boys off with a *mitzvat lo saaseh*, a "don't do" commandment, prohibiting cutting down fruit trees. The Quran sends their boys off with a *mitzvat asseh*, to kill and destroy the enemy by any means possible. We both say *Kaddish*. They exalt Allah for killing the enemy. We exalt God to remind us in our mourning that everything God does is good.

Is man a tree or is he not a tree? For practical reasons, it hardly matters; the tree is left standing. In wartime, however, the message of the tree is clear. Whether you fight to save yourself or fight to save an ideal, if the holy laws of *bal tashchis* were followed, the world would be at peace.
