
Lincoln Square Synagogue will once again be offering a Mishloach Manot sale for members of LSS! This years packages have been created by "Yachad Gifts."



The Torah's Magic 8 Ball?: Some Thoughts on Cleromancy, Oracles, & the Mishkan

As the Torah reading shifts focus from the architecture of to attire *in* the Tabernacle, there is one element of the Priestly vestments that especially arouses our curiosity - the *Urim ve-Thummim* that are a key part of the High Priest's breastplate, the *Hoshen Mishpat* (Ex. 28:15). Although their original mention is in last week's *sedrah*, our lesson from them is relevant to *Ki Tisa* and the upcoming readings as well.

Pinning down the exact nature of the *urim ve-thummim* is difficult, and even the words themselves vexed the early translators of the Torah. The Vulgate (a 4th Century Latin edition of the Bible) translates *doctrina et veritas*, "teaching and truth," which fits in nicely with the Rabbinic interpretation of the *Urim* as 'shining forth the will of God' while the *Thummin* serve to transmit that message with completeness [=tamim] and clarity (bYoma 73b). That same Talmudic discussion is also the *locus classicus* for the notion that the stones of the breastplate would communicate the divine message through the patterned illumination of the respective tribal stones (Interestingly, Maimonides codified this aspect of the Priestly attire in the *Yad*, *Hilkhot Kelei ha-Mikdash* 10:11).

In the *TaNaKh*, we see the *Urim ve-Thummim* used as a conduit for the divine word, especially when King Saul beseeches God to reveal his guilt via their 'casting' (I Samuel 14:41), and elsewhere, where we see that pressing issues and questions were saved "until a priest would appear with Urim and Thummim" (Ezra 2:63). Whatever their exact nature, it is clear that they were a type of Oracle, physical objects endowed with the spiritual capacity of communicating the direct word of God upon demand. Specifically from their usage by King Saul, they could even be characterized as a type of sacred lottery, providing 'yes' or 'no' responses to the qualified questioner (see I Samuel 23:10-12). All of this begs the following question: given that the *Urim ve-Thummim* were a counterpart to Prophecy, what accounts for the seemingly random nature of their function? Is not the whole point to communicate the divine will - - why should it take the outside form of randomized cleromancy?

I have often mentioned in Shul the tradition of the SheLaH ha-Kadosh (R. Isaiah Horowitz, 16th Century Prague) that the weekly Torah portions mystically correspond to the events of the week and the Jewish calendar at large [I assume this was also true of the Biennial and Triennial cycle traditions as well; students of the *Daf Yomi* may be particularly aware of this phenomenon]. Therefore, it should come as no surprise that the reading of *Tetsaveh* and *Ki Tisa* coincide with *Rosh Hodesh Adar* (I, this year). The central holiday of *Adar* is *Purim*, which also roughly translates to "lots". Many of us are by now familiar with the story, in which the wicked Haman cast lots to determine the most auspicious day on which to purge the Kingdom of its Jewish population.

I think that the model of Haman's diabolical lots is instructive in understanding the answer to our question. We might suggest that Haman enjoyed unfettered access to the *keilim shonim* (= the vessels that had been taken from the first Temple by earlier Babylonian plunderers) of Esther 1:7. It is not inconceivable that Haman cast his lots mimicking the High Priest's consultation of the *Urim ve-Thummim*. After all, he was asking the question of whether or not to go to war against the Jews, one of the queries specifically designated for their use. According to R. Yose b. Hanina, Ahasuerus himself donned the very garments of the High Priest during the sacrilegious 180-day feast that opens the Megillah of Purim (*b*Megillah 12a)[1], so it is furthermore possible that Haman made an attempt to use of the very *Urim ve-Thummim* themselves!

The Torah's description of the holiest type of divination - the *Urim ve-Thummim*, contrasts deeply with that of Haman. Our confrontation with the unknowns of life, whether endeavoring to discern the divine will, or figuring out the most auspicious day for genocide, may look quite similar on the surface. However, it is not simply the object, or the physical trappings of the process that are important, but on a more profound level it is the person asking the question, be it the High Priest versus the wicked Haman, that determines the nature of the answer the Oracle provides. Finally, I submit that this is the overarching theme of the readings for this past and the upcoming weeks: despite the intricate enumeration of all the physical details and minutiae of the Tabernacle, all this physicality is only divine when done in complete consonance with the constant refrain (30x in connection with the Tabernacle and the Priests) "...as God *commanded* Moshe". Shabbat Shalom.
