WHY IS THIS MISSION DIFFERENT FROM ALL OTHER MISSIONS?

After a slow start, no doubt because of all the *haggim*, registration for the Solidarity Mission has started to pick up. For those of you still trying to decide, here are some reasons to register, as well as answer to the FAQ's that we have received:

- "Why should I go now? Isn't the war over?" The war is indeed over, but the emotional and economic pain that it caused lingers, especially in the hard-hit South. Every night that you will stay at the hotel in Ashkelon, every meal that you eat in the Southern villages will help the local economy. And, simply seeing the members of the mission walk the streets of Sderot will remind those residents that they have not been forgotten and that all Jews are indeed responsible for one another.
- Rabbi Robinson will personally lead the trip. Expect erudite commentary and understated British humor. Fair warning: If we see a tank, Rabbi Robinson is likely to climb on it.
- "Do I need to fly out with the group on Motzei Shabbat, 11/22?" Not at all. You are welcome to fly out a few days early and meet the mission in Israel. The only thing that is required is that you be in the lobby of the Renaissance Hotel in Tel Aviv on Monday morning (11/24), ready to board the mission's bus and head south.
- We offer what you asked for! The Israel Action Committee has worked very hard to come up with a mission that reflects the interests of our shul members. The itinerary was selected to reflect the input that we received when we conducted a survey of the membership earlier this year. We negotiated with four different organizations before selecting the one that we felt provided the best value.
- There will be no solicitation of funds whatsoever! The price of the mission includes donations that will be made to the various institutions to be visited.
- "I've been to Israel many times before. Why do I need to go?" We could tell you that you will provide *hizuk* (strength) to the residents of the Southern communities that you will meet. And this would be true. The bigger truth, though, is that you will be even more strengthened by the ordinary people that you will meet. Chazak, chazak, v'nithazek.

The deadline for registration is **October 29th**. After that date, registration depends on the availability of rooms in the hotels where we will be staying. In the meantime, please help us spread the word about the mission by letting your friends and family know about it. Members of all shuls are welcome and encouraged to register.



The Torah calls Noach 'ish tsadik tamim haya bedorotav' – a perfect tsadik in his generations. Rashi brings two interpretations. The Tanhuma says that the pasuk implies that even in the degenerate times in which Noach lived, he was able to be tsaddik. However, had he lived in a better age he would have been even greater. Bereshit Rabba has a different reading. In the generation of the flood Noach was considered a tsaddik, but in Avraham's generation he would not have been thought anything special. These midrashim are sometimes thought to contradict each other. In fact, they largely agree. Noach was righteous, but he was not the greatest tsaddik.

Why do both Midrashim stress that Noach was somehow lacking? I suggest that the Midrash is trying to explain the events after the flood. When Noach came off the ark, he planted a vineyard, became drunk and was disgraced. This seems like a very different Noach than the one we got to know at the beginning of the parsha. In the first part of Noach's life he was obedient, conscientious, Godly, but after he left the ark he became animalistic. The first fruit he planted on the newly dry earth was grapes, so he could indulge in alcohol.

The Abarbanel noticed this dramatic shift in Noach's character, and he located the turning point at the moment when God told Noach to leave the ark. God instructed Noach to disembark with his wife, and his sons with their wives, and to repopulate the world. But Noach does not follow the instructions precisely. He left with his sons, and his wife left with his sons' wives.

God was telling Noach to refound the world. To raise more children and establish productive communities. Instead, he remained separate from his wife and rather than establishing farms to produce basic foods to support new communities, he remained isolated, physically and emotionally. Family relations broke down to such an extent that his own son humiliated Noach in his drunkenness.

Noach was a tsadik for the time of the disaster, but he was not a tsadik for the time of rebuilding. When he was told to save himself and his nearest and dearest he complied willingly. He even followed God's instructions to bring on animals. He was dutiful, but he had no spontaneous thought for his fellow men and women who would die in the flood. He could not found the Jewish People, the world had to wait for Avraham.

God gave Noach the long and arduous task of building the ark so that the people around would ask him what he was doing, he would tell them that God was going to bring a flood as a punishment and they should repent. Noach answered their questions, but he was passive, reactive. There is no indication that he went out of his own accord to end the wickedness in his generation and to save the surrounding from its sins.

That is the great contrast with Avraham Avinu. Our model is not Noach's closed ark, lined with tar inside and out, impervious and impregnable, but Avraham's tent, open and inviting. Avraham sat at the entrance to his tent looking for guests. According to the Midrash, he actively went out and sought converts to ethical monotheism. That is why he became the father of the Jewish people.

There is a concept of 'Benei Noach' in Judaism, which asserts that all humanity should recognise and obey God. Interesting, of the seven Noahide Laws, only one – to establish a system of justice – is a positive commandment. The rest of the laws are prohibitions and the seventh merely enforces those restrictions. The calling of the Jewish People, those born as Jews or who choose to become Jews, is more demanding and difficult. Our responsibility is to reach out to others, to be active in promoting justice, ethics and the worship of God. We don't build an ark and float on the surface as humanity drowns beneath the waves. We engage with the people and society around us and try to be 'metakn ha'olam bemalchut Shad-ai', to perfect the world under the sovereignty of God.
