
The **Beginners Service** is held in the Second Floor Belfer Beit Midash

Insights into the weekly Parsha and other matters at the heart of the LSS community

This week's Torah portion is *Ha'azinu*. This Shabbat is *Shabbat Shuvah*. It is entirely appropriate for *Ha'azinu* to be read on this very important Shabbat.

The final 16 verses of last week's reading introduce the song that constitutes the first 43 verses of Ha'azinu. After the Almighty directs Moshe to take Yehoshua with him to the Tent of Assembly (Witness), He tells Moshe that he will soon join his ancestors at rest and, that after he is gone, the Jewish people will stray from G-d and provoke His wrath. In response and anticipation, Moshe is ordered to transcribe the Song of Ha'azinu and teach it to the Children of Israel so that it can serve as evidence of the Almighty's relationship with the Jewish people, (Ch. 31 verse. 19). Moshe complied (verse 22) and then asks that the leaders of the people gather before him so that he can call the heavens and the earth to serve as his witnesses that while he knows that the Sons of Israel will sin and suffer greatly, that G-d will still be with the Jewish people forever.

Ha'azinu is, in effect, Moshe's t'shuvah drasha, his atonement speech, to the Jewish people. He chastises the Israelites, admonishes them, scolds them and, finally, reminds them how they must try to live their lives. As promised, Moshe begins by calling on the heavens and the earth as his witnesses and praises G-d for His creations and His justice. He urges the Israelites to understand that they have sinned and will sin again but that despite their repeated transgressions, they must always seek to return to the correct path. Moshe explains that with G-d at their side the Israelites can accomplish great things, but without Him they are lost. He reminds them that their accomplishments are those which G-d has allowed them to achieve.

Moshe provides hints as to the three major elements of the *t'shuvah* process. Rosh Hashanah is called *Yom Hazikaron*, the day of remembrance, but what are we expected to remember? The second aliyah of today's parsha begins with the words *Zechor yemot olam, binu shnot dor va'dor* "Remember the days of yore, understand the years of the generations which have gone before you." These words direct us to one set of memories upon which we must focus if we want to better ourselves. We must hearken back to our ancestors and appreciate and understand everything they have given us: the traditions; the teachings; the ethics; the examples they have set; and so much more. We must appreciate the many sacrifices which have been made, by those earlier generations, which allow us to be where we are today.

If these memories are not humbling enough, we must also review our own actions of the past year and weigh them against the standards that G-d has set for us. A careful examination usually reveals to me that I have fallen short of my own expectations for my-self, let alone those which God has set for me. When I try to measure myself against the examples which my parents and grandparents provided for me, I am even more motivated to try to better myself.

The next step is a return to G-d, which Moshe alludes to after he has completed the song and says "pay attention to all of the things about which I have testified before you today. . . to ensure that you follow all of the rules of the Torah." (Ch. 32; Verse 46) The ten day period between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are called the *Aseret Y'mai T'shuvah*, the ten days of return – not the days of atonement. First we must seek to return to G-d and the Torah's teachings and thereby better ourselves in the face of our shortcomings. Forgiveness/atonement is the final step in the process after we have shown our desire to get closer to G-d.

(Interestingly, there is a similar tripartite progression in the *shemonah esreh* which we say three times each weekday. After the three introductory blessings, we first ask G-d for the ability to comprehend and understand. Next we ask Him to help us to return to His Torah and his righteous ways. Only then, in the sixth blessing, do we seek forgiveness for our actions. Only after we have completed the daily *t'shuvhah* process, on a small scale, do we begin to ask G-d to provide us with our physical, material, communal, societal and spiritual needs.)

At the end of the parsha, after he is done admonishing them, Moshe repeats to the Jewish people, what he said before he began the "song," that it is the Torah that will guide them through life and will provide them with the roadmap for their actions and deeds to ensure meaningful and prosperous lives. He is urging future generations of his people to do *t'shuvhah* in future whenever they stray from the path of righteousness.

May we all be successful in our efforts to heed his words and be successful in our attempts to do *t'shuvhah*. May all our prayers be answered and may we all be blessed with a year of good health, prosperity and peace. **Shabbat shalom and g'mar chatimah tovah.**

Children's Programming on Rosh Hashana @ LSS

Children's group will take place the 1st and 2nd day of Rosh Hashanah from 10am - 2pm. Please help your children be prepared to stay in groups and maintain a respectful decorum. Also remember to pick up your children on time.

<u>Toddler/pre-k</u> Room 206: Programing will consist of stories and play for both days. The first day we will be celebrating the creation of the world with an edible project: decorating rice cakes in earth shape, colored cream cheese and animal crackers as toppings. We will also be having a birthday party, (complete with hats) to celebrate the creation of the world.

On the second day we will be repeating this project. We will also do an apple tasting.

Please note that although we have an adult facilitator in the classroom, children cannot be left without an adult. We welcome babysitters to join us for that day, however, do to security concerns, babysitters must be met by parents at the front door.

<u>K/1st grade</u> Room 207: Programing will consist of stories and play for both days.

The first day we will be celebrating the creation of the world with an edible project: decorating rice cakes in earth shape, colored cream cheese and animal crackers as toppings. This group will also be having a birthday party, (complete with hats) to celebrate the creation of the world.

We will be repeating this, as well as a blind apple tasting. This group will also act out the creation of the world story.

<u>2-4th grade</u> Girls 208 / Boys 210: This group will start off with some davening, and then the group leaders will facilitate discussions regarding tesuvah and other topics. This group will have structured games, and a blind apple tasting activity.

<u>5-6th grade</u> Room 211: We expect children this age to daven with their parents or respectfully in the ballroom. At 1:00pm there will be a workshop with a clergy. The first day will be for the girls led by Rabbi Josh Rosenfeld, and 2nd day will be for the boys led by Rabbi Ben Elton. Any 5th or 6th grader is welcome to help out in the toddler room or pre-k room.
