#### Hide and Speak

As the poignant last page of Genesis is turned, the metaphoric reality of life is keenly felt. Past a certain age, we have all mourned the significant others of our earlier lives. We subsequently entered new worlds as we shed the wings of our families of origin, but we never forgot them. We continue to reference mom, dad, and Uncle Joe. Likewise, we cry upon leaving Genesis, but know that our beloved collective family of origin will always remain with us as we continue to reference our forefathers and mothers, Joseph, and Judah. Life is like Torah, a dynamic force forever moving us forward.

In Parshat Shemot, the preeminent personality of the rest of Torah is introduced. Moshe Rabbeinu was a man with a disability, a description infrequently referenced. His speech impairment, a hidden disability, was revealed upon communication. The intersection of his personality and disability might have resulted in compensatory actions to either hide or minimize his condition, or to express great frustration through physical means.

Moshe Rabbeinu, as seen through the disability lens, strengthens our understanding of the duality of his personality/disability. In Shemot 2:11, he saw an Egyptian strike a Hebrew man and wanted to assist. Perhaps with the gift of perfect articulation he would have verbally intervened on behalf of the Hebrew. Instead, he slew the Egyptian, thereby avoiding disability exposure. Subsequently, he saw two Hebrews fighting. Although he first verbally defended the weaker, he did not continue when the belligerent one contemptuously referenced the first incident. Moshe Rabbeinu was uncomfortable that the first incident was known, and perhaps he declined to verbally defend his prior actions anxious that his speech might be ridiculed.

His fear of Pharaoh's possible reprisal for slaying an Egyptian precipitated an escape to Midian. He hid as a shepherd, but not for long. Hashem selected him for leadership, a man who could not self-present perfectly. Moshe Rabbeinu's own protestations were for naught. He begged Hashem to release him from the spotlight due to his impairment, as people with hidden disabilities frequently state what they cannot do. He was self- conscious, but he only cites it once with Hashem. To the credit of all others, his speech impairment was never referenced.

Jethro did not encourage his daughter to seek another mate (Shemot 2:21); the children of Israel never complained about an imperfect leader; Miriam and Aaron did not include disability when they complained about their brother to Hashem (Numbers 12:1); and even Korach refrained from mentioning his rival's disability. Moving through Torah, we forget about the speech impairment and see our leader as he self-presented in other ways. Yet, his own fear of disability exposure or exacerbation was omnipresent. Moshe Rabbeinu's speech disability could have contributed to the smashing of tablets (Shemot 32:19) and hitting the rock (Numbers 20:1). Anger expressed with physical means minimized the disability and reflected what other men might have done.

With the selection of a physically imperfect leader, Hashem set an example not to dismiss the talents of people who cannot perfectly present. Hashem also communicated to disability holders to push past their comfort zone and assert abilities. To emulate Hashem's ways, people without disabilities should offer opportunity and not feel that a favor has been bestowed. A renowned musician with a disability once said that being disabled means being a member of a group to which anyone could eventually belong.

Sensitivity awareness for people with hidden disabilities translates to understanding that exposure can equal shame. Socially acceptable excuses are substituted for actions. The legally blind might state that without glasses they cannot review a document, which is visually inaccessible even with glasses. Those with heart conditions might express momentary fatigue for not taking walks. Holders of hidden disabilities experience stigmatization upon exposure and the wish to conceal is paramount. Those with speech disabilities have unique challenges when it comes to hiding since communication is instant exposure. Voice is critical to self-perception and the perception of others to the self. Imagine rejecting a gifted personality who could not articulate perfectly. Hashem could not have imagined that.
