Vayera takes us through Abraham's encounter with the angels, the announcement of the birth of *Yitzchak*, the confrontation between *Hashem* and Sodom, Lot's daughters, the birth of *Yitzchak*, and the expulsion of *Yishmael*. The sedrah concludes with the Akeidah;

וְיָהִי אַחַר הַדְּבָּרִים הָאֵלֶּה וְהָאֱלֹקִים נִפָּה אֶת אַבְּרָהָם וַיֹּאמֶר אֵלֶיו אַבְּרָהָם וַיֹּאמֶר הִנֵּנִי: וַיּאמֶר קח נָא אֶת בִּנְרָ אֶת יְחִידְרָ אֲשֶׁר אָהַבְתָּ אֶת יִצְחָק וְלֶרְ לְרָ אֶל אֶרֶץ הַמֹּרִיָּה וְהַעֲלֵהוּ שָׁם לְעֹלֶה עַל אַחַד הֵהָרִים אֵשֵׁר אֹמֵר אֵלֵיך:

After these events Hashem tested Abraham. "Abraham!" He said. "Yes." "Take your son, the only one you love - Isaac - and go away to the Moriah area. Bring him as an all-burned offering on one of the mountains that I will designate to you."

The Divine commands and Abraham's response are terrifying. How can the Divine, benevolent Creator of the world, request his most devoted follower to forego the caring that was demonstrated when Abraham pled for the righteous of Sodom - and then murder his own son. This Divine test negates the very act of man's creation, for clearly mankind was created with instinctual compassion for its children.

This "test" has led some observers to claim that Hashem tested Abraham, and he failed the test. He should have protested the Divine decree and, as Moses was to do in the future, pray for the Jewish people that Hashem promised to be fulfilled through Isaac.

Our Sages are well aware of the horror of the narrative. The theme of the sacrifice of Isaac is mentioned many times in our prayers. It is used as a tool to persuade Hashem to have mercy on us. It is as if we are saying "You owe us". It is a central theme in the High Holiday service.

Those of us who read the Akedah portion every day in the *siddur*, include an introductory paragraph and a concluding paragraph. The introductory paragraph contains the text;

ְזְּכָר לָנוּ ה' אֱלֹקֵינוּ אַהֲבַת הַקַּדְמוֹנִים אַבְרָהָם יִצְחָק וְיִשְׂרָאֵל עֲבָדֶיךָ, אֶת הַבְּּרִית וְאֶת הַחֶסֶד וְאֶת הַשְּׁבוּעָה שֶׁנִשְבַּעְתָּ לְאַבְרָהָם אָבִינוּ בְּהַר הַמּוֹרָיָה, וְאֶת הָעֲקַדָה שֶׁעָקַד אֶת יִצְחַק בִּנוֹ עַל גַּבֵּי הַמִּזִבֵּח, כַּכַּתוּב בִּתוֹרָתָךָ:

Remember on our behalf - Hashem our Lord - the love of our Patriarchs, Abraham, Isaac, and Israel Your servants; the covenant, the kindness and the oath that You swore to our father Abraham at Mount Moriah, and the Akeidah, when he bound his son Isaac on the altar, as it is written in the Torah ...

The concluding paragraph continues the theme;

....זְכָר לָנוּ בְּרִית אֲבוֹתֵינוּ. כְּמוֹ שֶׁכָּבֵשׁ אַבְרָהָם אָבִינוּ אֶת רַחֲמָיו מִבֶּן יְחִידוֹ, וְרָצָה לִשְׁחוֹט אוֹתוֹ כִּדֵי לַעֲשׂוֹת רָצוֹנֵךָ, כֵּן יִכְבִּשׁוּ רַחֲמֵיךָ אֶת כַּעַסְךָ מֵעַלֵינוּ...

Remember for our sake the covenant of our forefathers. Just as Abraham our forefather suppressed his mercy for his only son and wished to slaughter him in order to do Your will, so may Your mercy suppress Your anger at us...

Why does the concept of the *Akeidah* still resonate with us over the millennia. Many have suggested that the event serves to contrast the Jewish teaching forbidding human sacrifice with the actions of the neighboring cultures of Abraham's time. If that is the case, why are we moved by the narrative today, when such behavior is ostensibly rare.

The answer may lie in the fact that the Jewish people have been energized by the concept of our children being dedicated to following the will of Hashem. Throughout the generations, most parents have not assimilated or converted their children in order to improve their physical comforts, but have raised their children as individuals who would maintain the tradition of their ancestors. They have dedicated the future of their children to sustaining the mission given to Abraham, our father. This dedication of our children is also exemplified by the willingness of Israeli Jews, both religious and secular, to defend their country, and not pursue the tantalizing but vacuous dream of leaving embattled Israel, and assimilating into other cultures. This has been a persistent characteristic of the Jewish people throughout the ages, and it perhaps explains the large role that Abraham's sacrifice plays in the ethos of the Jewish people.

May we use the reading of the Akeidah as an inspiration to bring on the ultimate redemption of Israel and the Jewish people.
