

## Ki Mi'Tzion Tetze Torah

A few weeks ago, we were privileged to hear from Rabbanit Dr. Michal Tikochinsky from Beit Morasha. Rabbanit Tikochinsky is one of the leading women Talmud scholars and educators in the world today, a sought after lecturer in Talmud, Jewish law and women's issues. She holds a Master's Degree in Law and a Doctorate in Talmud from Bar Ilan University. Rabbanit Tikochinsky is Director of the Moshe Green Beit Midrash for Women's Leadership and the Women's *Halakha* Program, which offers a select group of senior women Torah scholars the opportunity to study and take examinations that are parallel to the requirements for male rabbinical candidates in Israel.

"Vayigash eilav Yehuda..."

"And Yehuda approached him [Yosef, Viceroy of Egypt, second only to Pharoah]..."

Yehuda's petition to Yosef leads to Yosef finally revealing himself to his brothers. It is one of the most dramatic and emotional scenes in all of *Tanach*. Yehuda appeals to Yosef to accept himself (Yehuda) as a slave on trumped-up charges against Benjamin, and let Benjamin return to their father Yaakov, so Yaakov will not die of the shock from losing Benjamin. Yosef can maintain his secret identity no longer, and bursts into tears.

To appreciate just how special this episode of "vayigash" is, I urge the reader to open the black-bound Rabbinical Council of America Edition of the *Artscroll Siddur*, and read Rabbi Saul Berman's inspiring and insightful essay, "An Overview: The 'Approach' in Prayer." Rabbi Berman writes that, according to the Sefer Rokeach, our three small steps forward each time we recite the Standing Prayer "relate to the fact that – as an introduction to petition – the word 'vayigash' (and he approached) appears three times in Tanach." Those three time are:

- Avraham's petition to God to save the city of Sodom on behalf of the few innocent citizens who live there;

-Yehuda's petition to Yosef (whose identity the brothers don't know), to take himself (Yehuda) as a slave in place of Benjamin, allowing Benjamin to return in peace to their father;

-Eliyahu the Prophet's petition to God to bring a miracle to restore the faith of the Jewish people in the one God.

Rabbi Berman's comparison of these three pivotal episodes in Tanach is full of meaning for the contemporary Jew. Yehuda's petition is by far the most emotionally dramatic of the three episodes of "vayigash." It pierces Yosef's stoic ability to withhold his true identity, and it reunites the house of Israel in peace.

Every year when we read this parsha, it gives us a chance to reflect on how we approach prayer as individuals and as a community. As a useful thought experiment, let's compare our own approaches to communal prayer with our approaches to watching a professional ball game and watching a play or musical in live theater. For example:

- 1. Do we come with joy and anticipation at the prospect of speaking to the Almighty every time we come to shul to pray? How does that compare to the sense of joy and anticipation we bring to the stadium or the theater.
- 2. Do we connect socially with our seat neighbors and friends during davening or Torah reading, (as we would in the ball park), or do we provide the serenity of our listening and intention to enable the prayer leader/Torah reader to represent and lead us communally in petitioning, thanking, and praising God (similar to the way an audience watches and listens silently during a play or musical, until they respond emotionally and in unison to what's happening in the play part of the magic of the theater)
- 3. If you talk socially during davening or Torah reading, have you ever asked a slower davener sitting next to you whether your conversation adversely affects his/her concentration? In a ballgame, that wouldn't matter. In a theater, a seating neighbor might ask you to quiet down or stop your conversation.
- 4. Do we bring a sense of awe and wonder to the experience of davening? That sense of awe and wonder is experienced by passionate sports fans at a ballgame, and by passionate fans at the theater. Children observe everything we adults do. Do you share or express your sense of awe and wonder with any children in the vicinity of your seat?
- Finally, do we look forward to davening and communal Torah study as a chance for an intimate conversation for us as individuals and members of the Covenant *bnei* and *bnot brit* -- to have with God, the way Avraham, Yehuda, and Eliyahu did?
- So, may our approach to prayer strengthen our relationships with God and our wonderful kehilla, the same way that Yehuda's approach to petitioning Yosef in this week's parsha restored love and unity to the House of Israel.
