

Sukkot Events:



D'var Echod B'lev Echod

Insights into the weekly Parsha and other matters at the heart of the LSS community

Rabbi Bunam, the great maggid is said to have remarked to his disciple Rabi Sussya, "The tenfold doctrine I cannot teach you but all you need to know you can learn from three behaviors of an infant. First a child is always happy at being alive, be cheerful without special cause. Second a child is always active, therefore to do not lie inert, even for a moment. Third, a child always cries for anything he wishes, that is we should tearfully implore the Lord to fulfill our aspirations. (The Hasidic Anthology page 42)

The paragraph before the Shema, the greatest statement of faith in our tradition says, "Lilmod ulilamade, you must learn and teach" Before faith comes learning. Before believing we can do anything we must acquire the skills to do anything. Before we have the confidence to run we must understand we can walk. Learning breathes life into belief. Belief in God and in ourselves. We must be engage in learning, not in broad strokes like reading the newspaper but in the details of study. We must learn about our tradition at a level commensurate with our maturity. And if we must solidify our skills in order to accomplish that, then that is what we must do.

One of my earliest memories is of my grandmother continually yelling don't run. The house I grew up in was a large house but we were constantly running into each other and into things. We often bruised each other with accidental head bangings, sometimes not so accidental and we often broke items in our home. Candy dishes on coffee tables, plants on window sills lasted only for a limited time. While trips to the doctor and the emergency room were pretty common. I suppose the reason she would ask us not to run because she was afraid someone would get hurt. But that was the fun of it. We were always in a hurry, in the same way my kids are always in a hurry. Children have an excitement for life. They want to experience it all. They never want to miss out on anything. That is why it is so hard to get them to go to bed. They think they are missing something. The love life and they chase after it.

That is the message we have to learn, we must pursue life. We must want it and in the face of challenge we must continue to choose it. The Torah teaches us *Uvaharta Ba'hayim*. Choose life. Yes, this statement is referring to literally choosing life. But we must read this statement metaphorically as well. We cannot shy away from life. We must run after it. We must seek new experiences, we must go after that which will expand our horizons. We must not look toward the end when life eventually ends, as does for all. We must live in the moment.

The Talmud in the tractate of Brachot teaches *Hakol B'yidei Shamayim*. Everything is in Heaven's hands. We can try, but in the end there is great security tremendous *betachon* that come with the understanding that thought though life may appear haphazard and chaotic, there is a plan that God implements personally and intimately. Things happens for a reason regardless of whether or not we comprehend its purpose. Therefore we must continue to peer around the corner, to see what is next, while we relinquish our desire to control the future of those whom we love and wish would never be hurt.

We recite a litany of lines about the sins we have committed. Sins we committed as a community and sins we have committed as individuals. We order them alphabetically and we sing them to catchy tunes all in the name of acknowledging our shortcomings so that we might change. This is not supposed to be an exercise in futility. We are not supposed to spend the month of Ellul in preparation for these holidays only to walk away at the end no different. These days remind us to recognize that we have all fallen short of the mark at some point and that we must do better. We are not here to engage in some abstract discussion about the hereafter. We are present to change the here and now. If we do the work *B'olam Hazeh*, in this world, we will reap the benefits *Ba'Olam Habah* the in the world to come. And Yom Kippur says do it now.
