Dvar Torah:

In this week's Parshat Terumah, Bnei Yisrael are given the commandment to build the Mishkan, a portable dwelling place for Hashem and a place for Bnei Yisrael to participate in special rituals with Hashem. The reason the Mishkan needed to be portable was because Bnei Yisrael never knew how long they would be in one place, sometimes it was one year and other times it was a few days. Hashem proceeded to detail to Moshe the different components of the Mishkan, and how each should be constructed. A machloket is brought up at this point between Rambam and Ramban. Is the commandment to build the Mishkan a single mitzvah? Or is it many mitzvot all together? Many believe that it was one single mitzvah that grouped together all the different items like the Menorah and the Mizbeyach and others think that each different part was its own separate mitzvah.

When Hashem commands Moshe to build the Mishkan, he uses the words "I will dwell in them." But wouldn't it make more sense to say "I will dwell in it"? The answer is that Hashem meant "them" to mean us as Bnei Yisrael. We should each build a Mishkan inside our hearts where Hashem can dwell.

Questions:

- 1. Why did the Mishkan need to be portable?
- 2. Who financed the Mishkan?
- 3. What is the argument between Rambam and Ramban about the mitzvah of the Mishkan?

Answers:

1. Because Bnei Yisrael never knew how long they would stay in one place.

2. Bnei Yisrael donated gold and silver to build the Mishkan.

3. They debate whether the Mishkan is a single mitzvah or many mitzvot.

Why I Intend to Wear a Costume This Purim

Two tenets of Judaism are that G-d created the world and that nothing happens in this world that isn't His will, from the rise and fall of nations to the rustling of a leaf. Amalek disagrees. Amalek sees life as a series of coincidences without consequence or purpose. While Amalek and his descendent, Haman, may see happenstance in any isolated event, we look at history and see a pattern. For the heirs of Avraham, it is obvious there is no house without an architect nor a symphony without a composer. Purim is one of our proofs. It might have been a coincidence that Vashti was deposed as Queen and Esther replaced her. How fortuitous that Mordechai overhears a plot to assassinate the king and how lucky the king had insomnia, the only cure for which was to be reminded of Mordechai's loyalty. How could Haman have known Esther was Jewish? And how unfortunate for Haman that he served a paranoid king who suspected that Haman had designs on both his queen and his throne.

G-d's name is absent from the Megillah and His face is hidden (Chullin 139b), but in retrospect, His fingerprints are on every page. The reason the person who reads the Megillah is required to unroll the entire scroll before reading it (Shulchan Aruch 690:17) "is to see in one glance how all the events of Purim are connected, and how even the (apparently) negative events lead to G-d's salvation" (R. Chaim Friedlander).

The Gemara (Chullin 139b) finds an allusion, זרמז, to Haman and his philosophy in man's first sin. In Gan Eden, G-d asks Adam, "Did you eat from the tree?" Ha-min haetz, המן העץ (Bereshit 3:11). The name "Haman, "המן spelled the same as the interrogatory "ha-min, ".המן G-d's question is a reflection of the distance between G-d and man that Adam created by disobeying Hashem and eating from the Tree of Knowledge (R Akiva Tatz). After his sin, Adam actually convinced himself that he could hide from and deny the truth to G-d, who is both omnipotent and omniscient. It is a short step from imagining a limited god to denying G-d altogether. The archetypical atheist was Amalek. "He did not fear G-d" (Devarim 25:18) because he did not believe in G-d. If you don't believe in G-d there is no objective morality; all the world is chance, and power is the only king. Hitler, the spiritual heir of Amalek, saw this contrast clearly, "The Jews have inflicted two wounds on mankind - circumcision on its body and conscience on its soul.... I am freeing humanity from the false vision called conscience and ethics... The struggle for world domination will be fought entirely between us, between the Germans and the Jews." (Quoted in Purim Unmasked, from Hitler Speaks, Hermann Rausching.).

Pesach Survey: As we look toward Pesach this year we recognize how long this year has felt, for many riddled with the challenge of isolation and loneliness. We also recognize that, with the introduction of the vaccine, some members may feel more comfortable to safely soften some boundaries.

While we Implore everyone to continue following DCD guidelines we are also exploring if there is interest in bringing our community together as safely as possible. *Stay tuned for the Pesach survey coming soon!*

Even the name Purim is tongue-in-cheek. A pur, קופר, a "random event," a roll of the dice. Certainly, G-d created a world where there are statistics for large numbers of identical events. But the sequence in which they unfold are not calculable and rare event are not predictable. (Ask the Nobel Laureates at the former Long-Term Capital). The Torah understands that no event is random and subconsciously, everyone seems to recognize this. How many times have you said, "What are the chances" or wondered at a "bizarre coincidence"?

When the sailors in sefer Yoneh were in mortal danger and didn't know who among them was the cause of the supernatural currents, "...they said everyone to his fellow, 'Come and let us cast lots, that we may know for whose cause the evil is upon us.' So, they cast lots, and the lot fell upon Yonah" (Yonah 1:7). Elsewhere, the Jewish people accepted a lottery system to divide the land of Israel. Undoubtedly, each person desired the most fertile and scenic

homestead, but everyone accepted lots as a manifestation of Divine will. "Notwithstanding the land shall be divided by lot; according to the names of the tribes of their fathers shall they inherit" (Bamidbar 26:55).

Just as all events in history are connected, so too are all Jews connected. Poor, unwell, and less knowledgeable Jews may feel a sense of isolation from the larger Jewish community. That is why the Rambam in Laws of Megillah (2:17) writes, "It is preferable for a person to be excessive when it comes to the

Mitzvah of giving gifts to the poor... because there is no greater or more glorious rejoicing than to gladden the hearts of the poor, the orphans, the widows, and the strangers, for one who gladdens the hearts of these unfortunate individuals can be compared to the Shechina (G-d's Divine Presence) as it is written (Yeshaya 57:15) 'to revive the spirit of the humble and to revive the heart of the crushed.'" מתוכות לעניים means they are not forgotten. It is a tangible acknowledgement that they are as much a part of the Jewish family as any Jew.

"Amalek represents the philosophy of chance: an atheism that deprives the world of purpose" (Purim Unmasked). Purim is the holiday of seeing G-d in the natural course of events, of seeing the truth beneath the surface. There is a custom to wear masks on Purim to show how ridiculous it is to look at

superficial and think it represents a deeper reality. Nothing encapsulates the essence of Purim better than the phrase, "Great costume, Chaim." Despite the creative disguise, we immediately recognize who is underneath. By the way, great costume this year, Hashem.
