Jews traditionally bless one another with wishes for "arichas yamim v'shanim." We desire not just longevity, explains Rav Yechiel Michel

Tukachinsky zt" but shanim that are filled with yamim. We aspire to years filled with months, months filled with weeks, weeks filled with days, days filled with hours, hours filled with minutes, and minutes filled with seconds.

A masmid, the saintly Netziv of Volozhin would note, is not a scholar who studies countless hours, but rather one who studies sixty minutes each hour. Every day, every hour and every minute count.

This is why the righteous are generally described throughout Tanach as "getting on in their days"- as opposed to the colloquial "getting on in their years": "ואברהם ושרה זקנים באים בימים"-"And Abraham and Sarah were elderly, getting on in their days" (בראשית י"ח); "והמלך" בא בימים"- "And King David was elderly, getting on in his days" (מלכים א', א'). Their years were not hollow ones, but rather effectively filled with productive days. This may also be the reason why we count both days and weeks of the Omer. Why count both? Isn't it understood that three weeks is the same as twenty one days, for example? By requiring us to count both, perhaps the Torah is reminding us to make sure that our weeks are filled with days, and that in both our preparation for Shavuos and Matan Torah, and throughout the year, we make every day count!


