

Most of us are familiar with Chazal's account of Matan Torah, in which Hashem offered the Torah to several other nations. Each refused for various reasons, while Bnei Yisrael enthusiastically accepted with a resounding

Naa'seh V'Nishma.

Somewhat less famous is what happened next: According to the Midrash, the Ribbono shel Olam then demanded guarantors. B'nei Yisrael offered the Avos and Imahos- Avraham, Yitzchak and Yaakov, Sarah, Rivkah, Rachel and Leah- as cosigners; Hashem refused. They then suggested the Nevi'im- Prophets of the generations- and were again rebuffed. "Who else can we summon," wondered the Children of Israel. "How can we possibly find more trustworthy guarantors than our Patriarchs and Prophets?" And then it dawned upon them: Hashem was not looking to the past but towards the future. "We'll offer our children as guarantors!" cried B'nei Yisrael. Only then did Hashem finally agree to give the Torah, for, as the Midrash concludes: "אלין ערבאין ערבין שבין".

Children are not only our most precious personal gift from God but also our must valuable national resource. Rav Yosef Kahaneman zt"I, the late Ponevezher Rav, would note that while a child is orphaned upon losing his parents ", a nation is orphaned upon losing her children. All of us are pulled in so many directions individually; Matan Torah reminds us that we have to make time for our children, and after doing so, then make more time. The Jewish community is likewise collectively besieged by so many worthy causes and critical challenges; Matan Torah mandates that priority must always be assigned to those causes most directly relevant to our children, the Jewish People's eternal guarantors.

In this spirit, we thank our ASHAR family and friends for their exceptional support of this past week's inaugural virtual dinner, and look forward to continuing to invest in our children, Am Yisrael's most important resource, and our greatest source of nachas!

On Wednesday, the Early Childhood children celebrated Rosh Chodesh Sivan. We acknowledged the children who have birthdays in Sivan and we discussed the Chag that comes on the 6th of Sivan, Chag HaShavuot!

The children recalled the 4 names of the Chag and then had fun acting out each of names and the reasons behind them.

We met Mitzvah Man's great, great... grandfather. He told us that many, many years ago he lived in Eretz Yisrael (not ASHAR) and was a farmer. Every year at this time, during the times of the Beit Hamikdash, he was very busy. Mitzvah Man took the children to his field and told them he was looking on his trees for the first fruits. Those will be given to Hashem on Chag Habikurim (Shavuot)! But how would he know if it was a first fruit? We found the tiniest fruit growing on the tree. How would we remember that this was the first fruit to grow? We tied a red string around the fruit. Morah then turned the lights off and we used our imaginations to pretend that it was night time. We then turned them on and pretended it was day. Back and forth a few times and time had passed. When the lights came back on, the fruit had grown and there were lots of fruits. How would we find the one that grew first? We remembered to look for the fruits the ed string!

Mitzvah Man found some helpers to go to the fields with him to collect all the first fruits to bring to Yerushalayim! We picked the first fruit from the trees in the fields and took the basket to Yerushalayim. We sang our Bikurim song as we marched through the fields. We began our hike all the way to Yerushalayim to the Beit Hamikdash! As we got close, we heard the Leviim playing their instruments. As we got closer to the Beit Hamikdash, the music got louder and louder! It was so exciting! We ended our assembly listening to a wonderful medley of Shavuos songs from Micah Gamerman.


