We are Thankful for YOU!

In describing the birth and naming of Yehudah, the Torah records Leah's immense gratitude to Hashem- gratitude that manifested itself in her choice of a

name: "תאמר הפעם אודה את ה', על בן קראה שמו יהודה". Leah's fourth son was named Yehudah for the express purpose of eternalizing her hakaras ha'tov towards Hashem, an obviously noble gesture.

Yet note the words that immediately follow the naming: "תעמד מלדת". Leah was (temporarily) denied further children, and through no coincidence. Having successfully given birth to a fourth son, explains the Chiddushei HaRim, her gratitude knew no bounds, as reflected in her choice of a name. Besides being grateful, however, she was also satisfied; satisfied with her blessings to the point of no longer

being desirous of further beracha. And when one no longer yearns, the berachos cease as well.

There is a very fine line between contentment and satisfaction. Being content and happy with one's lot - שמח בחלקו: fine, and in fact a goal. Being satisfied and complacent is not.

The Mishnah at the end of Berachos succinctly captures what Chazal deem an appropriate balance. Upon entering or leaving a new town, "נותן הודאה על העבר וצועק על העתיד". We thank Hashem for past benevolence, but simultaneously cry out for further providence: always grateful, but never satisfied!
