



n o such disclaimers. On the contrary, writes R. Yitzchak of Korvil in his classic Sefer Mitzvos Katan, our unwavering belief in the ultimate Redemption is founded on the fact that Hashem redeemed us from the bondage of Egyptian slavery once, and is thus eminently capable of facilitating miracles of similar magnitude in the future.

The commandment of "אנוכי ה' אלוקיך אשר הוצאתיך מארץ מצרים" - "I am Hashem your G-d who took you out of Egypt"- is thus the basis for each of us being asked after 120 years whether or not we were sufficiently optimistic: "צפית לישועה."

It is perhaps for this reason that later on in Parashas Shoftim, the Torah describes G-d not merely as the One who released us from Egypt, but rather as the One who elevated us from Egypt: "מארץ מצרים By redeeming us once, suggests the Lubavitcher Rebbe z"l, Hashem elevated our individual and collective spirits, and infused within them an eternal sense of optimism and hope.

Enjoy your present berachos, and look forward to those that await, for unlike the predictions of even the most confident prognosticator, Hashem's past nissim v'niflaos are guaranteed harbingers for an even brighter future: "בימי צאתך מארץ מצרים אראנו נפלאות".

### Klezmer Niggunim

Klezmer music is an instrumental music tradition.

Klezmer music is traditional to the Ashkenazi Jews of Central and Eastern Europe.

Klezmer includes dance tunes, ritual melodies, and virtuosic improvisations alayed for listening.

Did you know?

Klezmer music was created to sound like certain sounds, such as crying, laughing, or wailing. These are very emotional songs that use many instruments. A niggun is a wordless melody that is slow and meditative, or fast and jubilant. It is sung over and over again.

The songs are strongly influenced by Slavic folk songs.

Did you know?

There are many niggunim that are sung at the Pesach seder during the meal.






### Phat We Are Writing

As a middle school girl, the longer parts of the Haggadah is the time for me to space out until I know a specific section or a certain song. This year, however, I had turned the bat mitzvah age, which means it was now my requirement as a Jew to follow along and participate. I did so willingly, because soon the fun would begin, like the matzah sandwich and the delicious meal.


"Vihe Sheumda," my family started singing. I joined in, wondering why the song was itching my mind. We sing this song every Pesach, so of course it feels familiar, but I kept thinking there was something a little more significant. It was only till I crawled into bed two hours later and pulled the covers up to my neck that I remembered why the song felt recognizable.

I was seven or eight years old, walking with my grandfather and brother to the park while my

parents had been resting for the seder. We played for a little while on the green and brown playground, before walking back to my grandparents' house. As we walked back, my grandfather and I had started singing "Vihe Sheumda," but with a silly little twist. Each time that we sang the song, we cut out a word, until we were left with the word "Vihe." We extracted a letter from "Vihe" each time until we were left with the final letter.

The silly song isn't the only thing that brought back this memory. It was my laughter. At the beginning of the song, it had sounded normal, but by the end, it sounded hilarious, at least to sevenor eight-year-old me.

I smiled to myself and rolled over, thinking about all the excitement that was around the corner. I can't wait until today becomes another memory that I look back on fondly.




