





Menahel's Message No Reminders Necessary

Two of the three Shalosh Regalim, Pesach and Sukkos, are associated with specific, unique mitzvos corresponding to events commemorated by the respective holidays. The

matzah of Pesach reminds us of Yetzias Mitzrayim, the Exodus, while the sukkah of Sukkot commemorates the ananei hakavod and Divine Providence during B'nei Yisrael's desert sojourn. But the third regel, Shavuos, lacks specific Torah commandments relevant to the event with which the holiday is most associated, Matan Torah. While there are many Shavuos minghagim rooted in the Yom Toy's celebration of our receiving the Torah, there is no mitzvah d'oraisa to remind us of this most seminal of events. And for good reason.

Unlike Yetzias Mitzrayim and our subsequent desert sojourn, Matan Torah, explains Rav Aharon Kotler zt"l, requires no reminders. We need reminders to commemorate only events of the past, not

those still experienced at present. The powerful impact of Hashem's unprecedented revelation at Sinai is still felt today, and thus requires no additional commemorative reinforcement.

The Midrash relates that when G-d spoke at Sinai, the power of His voice, 'kol gadol', shook the world's very core, but still there was no echo: "kol, v'lo bas kol." An echo is generally the result of sound waves deflecting off of a surface. In the case of Matan Torah, suggests the Lubavitcher Rebbe zt"l, the words of Hashem were not deflected, but rather eternally absorbed into the very being of each and every neshama present at Sinai, including our own and those of our children.

No reminders necessary.






As Bnei Yisrael arrived at Har Sinai in preparation for receiving the Torah, Hashem instructs Moshe on how מpproach Bnei Yisrael; "כה תאמר לבית יעקב ותגיד לבני ישראל". Hashem then c<mark>onti</mark>nue<mark>s wi</mark>th the actual words that Moshe is to speak. Rashi comments that בית יעקב refers to the women. Moshe was instructed to speak to the men and women separately.

In his work Toward a Meaningful Life, Rabbi Simon Jacobson writes that Hashem created man and woman to represent two opposing forms of divine energy. While the male usually represents a more physical and external oriented world and the woman normally presents inner dignity and subtlety, there are times in history when these roles reverse and women have had to take upon themselves a more assertive position.


