From the Cantor's Corner



The Book of Shemot, called "Exodus" by the Greeks and later translators, begins with something very import to Jews of all generations "Names." The Torah recalls the names of the twelve tribes which became 13 with the two sons of Joseph each becoming a tribe of its own. From 70 souls following 210 years of enslavement, we have become a people too numerous and potentially dangerous to the Pharoh and people of Egypt. Their cruelty only grew as we resisted.

400 years earlier, God had foretold to Avraham, that his people would live in a foreign land for many years and ultimately return to the promised land. I'm sure many of the Hebrew slaves {Iv-reem} doubted that their slavery would ever end. Hashem had found in Moshe, whom we call "Moshe Rabbeinu-Moses our Teacher and first Rabbi" the man and leader, who had the strength and will to bring about The Exodus from Egypt and the transmission of The Torah to all of us.

Each year at our Pesach Seder, we re-live and retell the story of our Redemption from not just physical slavery but more importantly the Spiritual, soul level beauty of living as a giving, sharing and thoughtful people. This obviously was not to be the last Exodus, as we were forced from our land, our Temples in the Golden city of Jerusalem destroyed twice and our people scattered throughout the world. Here is where our Haftarah comes in so heavily, as the prophet Isaiah leaves us with a message of both calling us out for our misdeeds and the power of a future redemption.
