From Rabbi Chaitovsky

Pesach is almost here...and I hope that, by now, we are all in the last stages of our preparations. The idea of preparation not only applies to our homes but also to our hearts and minds. The most elaborate meals of the year – the two sedarim which take place next Wednesday and Thursday nights – are intense educational experiences. They ask that we become expert story tellers and relate the "greatest Jewish story ever told." The story may be ancient but it modern at the same time. Are we prepared to tell the story that way?

To help us do that, here are some thought-provoking questions courtesy of my colleague and mentor, Rabbi Mitchell Wohlberg, of Baltimore, MD. Discuss them at your seder while reading the Haggadah and enjoying your delicious meal. They will make you smile and even laugh, they may raise eyebrows, but most importantly they will make you think...and then engage in conversation.

The first of the Ten Commandments speaks of God "who took you out of the land of Egypt." Do you believe in God? Do you believe He/She is involved in your life? Does it make a difference? It was God – through the agency of Moshe – who brought the Ten Plagues. Do you think God is responsible for the plague we have been living through- COVID? Earthquakes?

"And a new king arose who knew not Joseph." One man led to the Jews being enslaved for 210 years. This year we were once again reminded of the power of one man – whether it be Vladimir Putin or Volodymyr Zelensky. With this in mind, what do you think our sages were thinking when they left the name of Moshe out of the Haggadah?

The Jews were very much a part of Egyptian society and then one day it all changed. Is that happening in Europe? Could that happen here in America? How do you explain the rise of anti-Semitism? Are you scared?

As the Jews passed through the Red Sea, the Torah tells us that the water was a "wall" [chomah] on the right, and on the left. Our sages read the word not as chomah (wall) but rather as cheimah, meaning "hatred." Our country is divided between the left and right, liberals and conservatives. Do the Jewish people today face a greater threat from the right or from the left? Does it make a difference?

The sages in the Talmud disagreed on whether the matzah and maror had to be eaten together or separately. We do both. Either because we don't know who is right, or both may be right. This is called the act of "compromise." Wouldn't it be nice if that is the way politics were conducted in America? In Israel?

A Kabbalistic interpretation of the word "Pesach" views it as a combination of two words: "Peh" – "mouth" and "sach" – conversation. Freedom means to be able to say what you want. Are we being forced to be too politically "correct" when it comes to freedom of speech? In a "cancel culture" are there not some things that should be "canceled?"

In ancient Egypt the Jews were called upon to slaughter a lamb (which Egyptians worshiped) and place its blood on their doorposts to identify themselves as being Hebrew/Jewish. How comfortable are we in modern America identifying openly as Jewish? Is cleaning streams and caring for animals enough to identify as being Jewish?

We speak of the "four children" at the Seder. But now it is said there is a "fifth" one: the one who does not come to a Seder! A recent survey revealed that nearly 40% of American Jews do not attend a Pesach Seder. How is this possible? Will your grandchildren have a Seder? Are you sure? What can you do to make sure?
