The Most Important Mitzvah of the Season

We are in the month of Elul and there are many things we do during this month to prepare for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, our annual Yamim Noraim, Days of Awe. They are right around the corner, you know. We blow the shofar every weekday morning after shacharit, we get up a little earlier to offer selichot prayers, we visit the graves of parents and others no longer with us, to be uplifted and inspired by the cherished memories of them we have. We might even buy a new suit or outfit in honor of the Holy Days.

All of those things are very important and very commendable, of course, but I would like to share what I believe the most important mitzvah of this year's High Holy Days is. This was always an important mitzvah, but for THIS year, it is the most crucial and the most important mitzvah. Ready? Here it is: make the arrangements to have seats in our Sanctuary and plan to be with us in person for all of our High Holy Day services.

Nothing is more important this year. For the past three years, we had modified services due to the pandemic. Our services were lovely in every way. Every way except one, that is. There were many who chose – understandably – to watch services via livestream. We made the decision to offer that option for the best reasons, of course. But it meant that too many of us were spectators of, and not participants in, our beautiful services.

My dear congregants, spectator season is over. It's time to come back to the shul for the High Holy Days. Our tradition says: *b'rov am hadrat melekh* – God is most praised among a throng of people. There is no substitute for being there. We have so much planned for the High Holy Days – and for every day of the upcoming year – and we are doing it all for you. We need you to come. So...please...if you have not already done so, get your seats NOW for the High Holy Days. We will be glad you did, but more importantly, YOU will be glad you did.

All is not well in the world, but our children and grandchildren need us to paint a good picture of the future. We, the Jewish people, have endured much the past 3,800 years. We can only remain a light unto the world through positive optimistic actions and thoughts. I look forward to seeing and greeting and singing with all of you, my friends and congregation, this “Yammeem Noraeem,” these days of Awe and Holiness.

History of Jews in Uganda & Their Sukkot Experience

October 5 @ 11:00 am - 12:00 noon

Rabbi Sizomu will speak about the origins of Abayudaya, the challenges occasioned by the dictatorial reign of president Iddi Amin Dada, antisemitism and living as a minority in a country that is predominantly Christian and Muslim.

Rabbi Gershom Sizomu is the spiritual leader of the Abayudaya Jews in Uganda, a community of almost 2,000 living in rural villages. He made history as the first native-born black rabbi in Sub-Saharan Africa after attending a rabbinic seminary in Los Angeles, supported by a Be'chol Lashon Fellowship. Gershom's commitment to education led him to open a Yeshiva in Uganda to train African teachers and rabbis for their emerging Jewish communities. In 2016, he achieved another milestone by becoming the first Jew elected to Uganda's parliament, furthering his impact on Jewish life and representation.

Who is in charge? Philosophy of halakhah through the eyes of Rabbi Joseph Soloveitchik and Rabbi Moshe Feinstein

One of the ongoing debates of modern Jewish life is the extent to which human beings or God should be given the final say on religious questions of ultimate importance. For many, this dilemma is seen as an either/or, and one must choose a side. Rabbi Zachary Truboff is the Director of Rabbinic Education for the International Beit Din, and his work focuses on educating rabbis about halakhic solutions to the agunah problem. The Daffodil Project

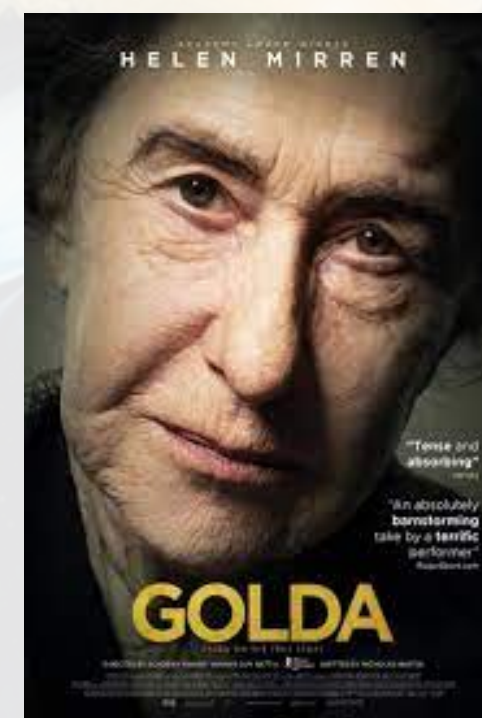
