This year's Lifelong Learning is once again a collaboration of the Jewish Community Center (JCC) of Middlesex County, Neve Shalom, and Temple Emanu-El (TEE). Together our three organizations will provide an expanded and diverse curriculum to meet the educational and social needs of our greater community at large. The program includes classes, lectures and concerts just to name a few of the offerings. The courses will be presented to you by an assemblage of esteemed rabbis, cantors, teachers, musicians and other lay professionals.

Temple Emanu-El, Neve Shalom and the JCC will be offering our programs with classes taught in person or via Zoom. When you register you will receive the appropriate dates, times, names of presenters, course locations and Zoom links. These opportunities will be held on various days and at convenient times to accommodate the schedules of many of our community members. Use the registration form in this booklet.

This year, members of Neve Shalom, the JCC, and Temple Emanu-El, will pay \$72 per year for as many of the listed classes as you wish to take. This is the same fee for each of the organizations. For non-affiliated registrants, there will be a charge of \$90 per year. Selected courses or events may have additional fees. Neve Shalom and Temple Emanu-El have a special benefactor/patron fee for those who would like to make a tax -deductible contribution which will entitle those donors to ALL Lifelong Learning courses without additional fees (see your own organization's registration form).

Each of the three collaborating organizations should have their participating members pay their home organizations. If a person belongs <u>solely</u> to Temple Emanu-El, Neve Shalom, or the JCC, they should pay that organization. If Temple Emanu-El or Neve Shalom members also belong to the JCC, they should pay TEE or Neve Shalom! If the JCC member does not belong to either TEE or Neve Shalom, they should pay the JCC. 





Civilization and the Jews Hazzan Sheldon Levin

He provides on-air commentary and analysis for CNN on news relating to the U.S. Department of Justice, major criminal trials, the Supreme Court, Congressional and grand jury investigations, national security, policing, and other legal issues. In 2022, Honig was nominated for an Emmy Award in the category "Outstanding



News Analysis: Editorial and Opinion." He is a national best-selling author who has written two books for HarperCollins: "Hatchet Man: How Bill Barr Broke the Prosecutor's Code and Corrupted the Justice Department" (2021), and "Untouchable: How Powerful People Get Away With It" (2023). Honig also hosts podcasts and writes for Café and Vox Media, teaches at Rutgers University, and is Special Counsel at a New Jersey law firm. 

For generations the study and performance of Jewish liturgical music on the concert stage and on the bima was reserved for men only. Everything changed around the turn of the 20th century when cross dressing and gender-bending to perform traditionally male roles was evolving in the predominantly Jewish and queer communities on the Lower East Side and other major American cities.

Meet **Susan Mandell**, addressed as "Cantoress," who served as cantor of our own Temple Emanu-El from 1964-1978, and **Cantor Kalix Jacobson**, whose research for their HUC-JIR Master's Thesis, *The Hazentes and the World that Allowed them to Be*, brought them to Susan Mandell.

Both innovators in their time, Susan was the third woman to serve as a congregational cantor before women were ordained, and Kalix is the first openly transgender non-binary ordained cantor to be contracted by a synagogue. Together they will share their personal journeys through stories and song.

The morning session will be an opportunity for stories and dialogue, and the afternoon session will be an excerpted performance of Cantor Kalix' Master's Thesis Recital with Cantor Simkin, Rabbi Axe, and Cantoress Susan Mandell, the only living pre-ordination woman cantor upon whose shoulders all non-male cantors of our day stand. The program will take place at Neve Shalom.
