Thanks to our Caring Community

Some members of our congregation know about my recent health issues. In case you did not hear, in October I had a heart attack and have had three arteries opened and six stents inserted. I also was hospitalized with

internal bleeding in December. This was likely caused by the effects of the blood thinners I was taking.

By the time you read this I will be going to Cardiac rehab and hopefully, I am on my way for a full recovery.

I especially want to share some thanks. To the leaders and Rabbi of Neve Shalom and to Rita Devlin, I truly appreciate your support, good wishes, and understanding when I needed to miss services or events. A number of congregants prepared meals for my wife, and myself. Nita also has had ongoing health problems. You don't need to be the Hazzan to receive this kind of care. Our Tikkun Olam committee can help you in times of good health or a crisis. Dan Rushefsky heads the committee and Rena Kallman has been amazing at organizing meals and other help. When I was not able to drive, neighbors and congregants, including Keith Boxer, helped me get to doctor's appointments. This is a very special congregation and community and I am grateful for your help and prayers.

I also want to thank the staff of JFK Hospital. The nurses and support staff all work so hard and do all they can to meet everyone's needs. The nurses are truly special and I am grateful for their care. I learned some things while I was there that I wish to

share with anyone who may have future stays at JFK. There is a Bikkur Cholim committee and the hospital's pastoral staff can also be helpful. If you are there on Shabbat, they can give you electric Shabbat candles to light. If you are there on Chanukah (as I was) they can lend you a small electric menorah. There are some kosher foods and other items in the Bikkur Cholim closet though you need to ask for them. I was able to watch services on my smartphone. You can Zoom the Neve Shalom Shabbat evening, morning, and weekday morning services. Many other congregations stream their services on YouTube, Facebook, or Zoom. I was able to "shul-hop" without leaving the hospital bed.

I am also grateful for the EMTs, the doctors, Emergency Room staff and doctors of Raritan Bay Cardiology for their life saving talents and care. You may not know that JFK hospital has a new, state-of-the-art catheterization area which makes the hospital not only convenient but an excellent place to receive heart care. JFK also has a new program that makes being discharged from the hospital more efficient than in the past and the staff in this discharge area were also especially caring and helpful.

Another new item I noticed was a translating computer on wheels which was available for the man in the next bed who spoke very little English. I think it has A.I. visuals and multi-language capability which helped this Cantonese speaking patient to efficiently communicate with the nurses.

I am very grateful for the care and support I have received and look forward a full recovery. Again, I thank everyone who was so helpful in these difficult times.

what the seven species are and its connection to the Land of Israel, all the while learning to appreciate and thank Hashem/God, for the bounty of food He has given us through His creations.

32nd Susy Schwartz Memorial Concert: May 19th

After a year's hiatus, the Susy Schwartz Scholarship Memorial Concert makes a highly anticipated return on May 19, 2024. The committee is pleased to announce that we have selected **Hadar and Sheldon**, whose music and harmonious voices will captivate and energize you.

Hadar and Sheldon is the brand-new crossover collaboration of husband and wife duo Sheldon Low and Hadar Orshalimy. Since entering the studio in the Spring of 2018 to record their first three singles, the duo has already begun touring the country together and their tune "Body Is A Temple" was featured on the URJ Ruach 5779 compilation album.

Growing up, Hadar was a popular performer in Israel, with appearances on Israeli TV, such as "Kochav Nolad" (Israeli "Idol"), and at major national and municipal events. Upon completing her mandatory Army service in the IDF as a nuclear, biological, and chemical warfare defense trainer, Hadar enrolled in the Rimon School of Jazz and Contemporary Music in Israel, studying with some of Israel's most renowned contemporary musicians. She then transferred to Berklee College of Music in Boston, where she studied professional music and voice and graduated with honors.

Sheldon Low continues to establish himself as a prominent voice in contemporary Jewish music, with five albums to his name and more as the highly acclaimed duo "Hadar and Sheldon." A self-proclaimed road warrior, Low performs in over 100 concerts, services, and workshops around North America each year. In addition to becoming a mainstay of congregational life, Sheldon's music has become the soundtrack of the lives of hundreds of thousands of children around the globe, thanks in part to PJ Library distributing two of his children's albums and featuring him on countless other compilation albums. Sheldon is also widely known for creating and hosting the innovative Jewish Songwriter podcast.

The duo were married in Jaffa, Israel in 2015 and live together in Harlem, New York.

Hadar and Sheldon will appear on our stage on Sunday, May 19th at 3 PM for Neve Shalom's 32nd Susy Schwartz Memorial Scholarship Fund Benefit Concert. The goal of this scholarship fund, which is primarily supported by the concert, is to raise money to provide each Neve Shalom Bar and Bat Mitzvah child a "Passport to Israel." The Passport, with a value of \$2,000, may be redeemed towards any trip to Israel that has an educational component, taken between ninth grade and the end of college. High school students using the Passport are also eligible to receive additional funds from the Jewish Federation in the Heart of New Jersey. Approximately 150 of our students have redeemed their Passport since the program's inception. The Passport to Israel program is one of Neve Shalom's great gems and a perk of membership. The Passport is presented from the bimah during the Bar/Bat Mitzvah service.

The long history of the concert is a testament to the memory of a larger-than-life member, Susy Schwartz, who

died prematurely in 1990. It's also a testament to the staying power of an idea. Loving Israel and young people as she did, Susy would have been very proud to watch the parade of students who have jumped at the chance to go to Israel and have benefitted from the fund's generous stipend.

We hope the availability of this opportunity will encourage our current and still-eligible Religious School families to both support the concert and help their children explore the many options for educational experiences in Israel.

Concert tickets go on sale in February on the shul website, www.neveshalom.net. They may also be purchased by mail or through the Neve Shalom office.

On behalf of the next generation, please consider becoming a **Benefactor (\$200)** or **Patron (\$100)** of the May 19th concert. Benefactors and Patrons receive two tickets to the concert, name listed in the concert program and more. General admission tickets are \$30 for adults, \$12 for children under 12. NEVE SHALOM ADVOCACY EVENT: USING OUR VOICES

On December 25th, Neve Shalom held an event that underscored the commitment of the community to advocate for Israel and address the alarming rise in antisemitism on college campuses. The event brought together more than thirty individuals from diverse backgrounds, each eager to contribute to a meaningful dialogue and take concrete actions to make their voices heard. Linda Gotlib (photo, right) of the Israel Awareness Committee organized the event which was championed by Rabbi Schoenberg.

The gathering was centered around the powerful tool of written communication. Attendees were encouraged to write letters and emails to their elected officials, urging them to support Israel in the face of various challenges. The event recognized the importance of active civic engagement and emphasized the impact that individual voices can have on shaping public policy.


One of the primary focuses of the advocacy effort was the need for continued
