Speaking Presidentially — <u>Committee Selects Rabbi</u> By Susan Catler



I am delighted to announce that Rabbi Ethan Seidel and the Tifereth Israel Congregation have entered into a new long-

term contract. Under the terms of the new agreement, Rabbi Seidel will work for TI for the next ten years and has a three year option to remain beyond that. This contract provides us with the benefit of Rabbi Seidel's continued leadership and the stability that comes with his tenure.

The process to get to this new agreement started in 2007 when the Rabbi Review Committee was established as provided in Tifereth Israel's Constitution and Bylaws "for the purpose of determining the view of the Congregation in guiding an effective way of discharging rabbinic duties and leadership." The committee's mission was to provide Rabbi Seidel with feedback. At the conclusion of their work, the committee - David Kritz, Paul Bardack, Franca Brilliant and Jennifer Kefer - presented a report and recommendations to the Rabbi in June, 2008 which was also placed in his personnel file.

At the September 2009 Board meeting, Franca Brilliant reported to the Board on the committee's work in 2007 - 2008. She described the process - Rabbi Seidel did a "self evaluation", the committee sent a survey to the entire congregation (using Survey Monkey which guarantees anonymity), and interviews were conducted by the committee with staff and some congregants. There were 118 responses to the survey. She reported that the committee found a high level of satisfaction with Rabbi Seidel.

Rabbi Seidel's current ten year contract with Tifereth Israel goes through July 31, 2010. After Franca Brilliant's report at the September 2009 Board meeting, the Board agreed that, rather than conduct a new review, the preceding committee should be asked to review their findings and report to the Board on any changes since that time. The Board also directed that the Congregation be notified in the Menorah that decisions related to Rabbi Seidel's contract would be made soon and that any comments or suggestions should be submitted to the President. The notice and request for comments was included in the President's October 2009 article. The responses were reviewed, and they overwhelmingly encouraged renewal of Rabbi Seidel's contract.

At the November 2009 Board meeting, David Kritz reported to the Board on the Rabbi Review Committee's review and update of its findings. The Board then voted to empower a committee to negotiate with the Rabbi on a new contract. The Negotiations Committee of Mike Tilchin, Jon Alterman, Shelley Heller, and Bill Galston was then appointed and the Board discussed issues that should be addressed and their feelings on those issues, including the length of term of the contract.

Since November the Negotiations Committee has been meeting with Rabbi Seidel and briefing

the Board on progress. At meetings in March, April and May the Board reviewed draft documents and made suggestions to the Negotiations Committee on language and substance. On May 10, 2010 the Board voted to approve the proposed contract. On May 14, 2010 the new agreement was signed.

The committee and others worked hard, and I would like to thank everyone who enabled us to enter into this new contract with Rabbi Seidel – the Rabbi Review Committee; the congregants who participated in the survey and/or submitted comments; the Negotiations Committee; David Zinner, who crunched the numbers; our Board of Directors; and, of course, Rabbi Seidel.

"I wanted to thank Stan and Pierre for all their work and guidance.



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Jewish Women's Archive Selects Local Woman for 2010 Institute for Educators



Brookline, MA – May 21, 2010 – The Jewish Women's Archive has selected area resident Lynn Golub-Rofrano of Montgomery Villa as one of the 26 participants to attend its prestigious Institute for Educators in Newton, MA, July 25-29. Ms. Golub-Rofrano was chosen out of a competitive pool of 95 applicants from across the country. The 2010 Institute for Educators is the third funded by a grant to JWA from the Dorot Foundation.

Focused on the role of Jews in the Civil Rights Movement in America, the intensive professional development program will prepare educators to use JWA's new *Living the Legacy* social justice curriculum and to integrate women's stories and primary sources into their teaching.

Lynn Golub-Rofrano has been involved in Jewish education for close to twenty-five years in both formal and informal settings. She has worked at Tifereth Israel Congregation for 15 years, initially as the Hebrew School principal. Over time, the position was expanded to incorporate formal and informal youth and adult education and programming. Her current title is Director of Lifelong Learning. Ms. Golub-Rofrano is a true believer in learning as a life-long endeavor and is always on the lookout for opportunities to expand her personal knowledge and professional development.

Applicants to the Institute for Educators represented the rich diversity of Jewish education today, including educators from Jewish communities large and small in 14 different states, those who work in day schools, supplementary schools, service learning programs, community organizing initiatives, and summer camps; new teachers as well as those with decades of experience.

Participants will study with renowned scholars and master teachers as together they investigate themes in Jewish women's history and the history of social movements in the US; examine primary source documents and oral histories; explore multimedia resources, including JWA's new Living the Legacy social justice curriculum; and develop strategies for using the material with students.

Presenters include Dr. Joyce Antler, Professor of American Jewish History and Culture at Brandeis University; Rabbi Jill Jacobs, Rabbi-in-Residence

at Jewish Funds for Justice; Barbara Rosenblit, Humanities and Judaics teacher at the Weber Jewish High School in Atlanta; Dr. Debra Schultz, author of Going South: Jewish Women in the Civil Rights Movement; Drs. Deborah Cunningham and Susan Zeiger of Primary Source; independent oral historian Dr. Jayne Guberman; and Dr. Judith Rosenbaum, Director of Public History at the Jewish Women's Archive. In addition to a range of seminars and guided work time, the 2010 Institute will feature a special screening of the film Freedom Riders, produced by WGBH Boson, a conversation between oral historian Jayne Guberman and Freedom Rider Judith Frieze Wright, and a performance and workshop by educator and artist Yavilah McCoy.

In their applications, educators expressed their eagerness for highquality professional development opportunities and their interest specifically in the Living the Legacy curriculum.

"I am very excited to have this opportunity to study with such high quality educators and instructors about such an exciting time in Jewish American History," Ms. Golub-Rofrano said. "I believe that Jewish involvement during the Civil Rights movement is an area that has not been highlighted enough in our schools, particularly the involvement of Jewish women at this time. This institute will allow me to enhance my own knowledge of the subject area in order to bring this knowledge to my congregation and community along with an increased understanding, awareness and access to the wonderful resources at the Jewish Women's Archive. Although social justice is a part of the curriculum in many congregational schools, the history of this involvement stemming from the civil rights movement is not illustrated and this educator's institute will give us the tools to draw these connections for our students."
