Notes from the Rabbi: Ethan Seidel **A New Leniency**

When I first came to TI, in 1992, I made it clear in my interview that I would not perform a wedding if the meal after the wedding was treif. I was fine with the wedding meal being milchig, even if there was no kashrut supervision, but if the wedding had meat, it had to be kosher.

I believe my standard was unique among local Conservative Rabbis, and it was controversial-several families left TI because of it.

I don't regret that policy of mine-I think it's important to have such standards, and that setting high expectations ultimately draws more folks than it repels. But that was then. Times are changing fast, and the make-up and expectations of the Jewish

community are quite different than thev were 20 years ago.

I am now sensing that strict mv standard on



kashrut is more likely to leave couples baffled than inspired.

In our society, increasingly, we consumers want what we want. And if we can't find it in one place, we search on the web until we find it. My reading and my (Continued on page 2)

President's Column: Susan Catler What I Appreciate About Tifereth Israel

Our youngest child went to JPDS. Her former classmates attend a wide variety of synagogues in the area. As they are now turning 12 and 13, I have been visiting their synagogues to attend services celebrating their becoming Bat and Bar Mitzvahs. My visits have made me think about what I appreciate about Tifereth Israel, especially as we approach our daughter's Bat Mitzvah.



I appreciate that Tifereth Israel is egalitarian through and through. Our daughter will read from the Torah and the Haftarah during the regular Shabbat morning service and lead the Torah Service and Musaf. I am proud that TI was one of the first conservative shuls to allow and encourage full participation of girls and women.



I appreciate that Tifereth Israel actively welcomes visitors and members. At TI a member is in the Juniper Street lobby to direct the first-timer to the sanctuary and welcome all. When you arrive at the sanctuary another member wishes you Shabbat Shalom and hands you the weekly announcements. The sanctuary (Continued on page 3)

conversations with others have led me to believe that the tenor of conversation between client and professional has changed. Nowadays, a patient is much more likely to come into his doctor's office quite sure of the medication he wants. And lawyers increasingly are seen as tools to get what a client wants, rather than trusted advisors who might reject a course of action as immoral.

Similarly, couples nowadays often have an idea of the ceremony they want, and will shop around until they find the Rabbi that will go along. I am now usually interviewed by couples, to see if I might be a suitable Rabbi for their wedding. The idea that I might require something from them as well, especially something that could cost them a great deal of money, or prevent them from having the meal of their dreams, does not go over well.

I have a hunch that a part of this change in the relationship between client and professional is due to the thinning out of community. This sort of shopping tends



not to happen with couples that are connected to TI, who understand that part of living in community is not always getting exactly what you want (a good lesson for those about to marry!). Moreover, the couples that approach me who are not in any way affiliated with TI don't have a reserve of respect for me that might influence them kindly towards my requests.

But why change my standard, you ask? (Or perhaps you're asking "What took you so long?") I worry about the future of our shul. Though we are still holding our own, or even slightly increasing our membership, this is highly unusual among shuls nowadays, and I have less confidence that I used to have about high standards attracting new members, especially 20-somethings. I think it is in the shul's interest that I have as many positive interactions with potential members as possible, and to further that goal, I'm reluctantly relaxing my *kashrut* standard at weddings.

Not that I'm giving in on everything. I intend to hold the *halachic* line within the ceremony itself. So I expect that there will still be couples (and congregants, no doubt) who will find me unbearably inflexible. That is as it should be. The trick is for me to hold standards high enough that I stand for something, but not so high as to turn away the vast majority of couples looking for a Rabbi to marry them. I hope this new standard threads that needle; I'm interested in hearing your thoughts about it.

Lilmod U'lilamed (To Learn and to Teach) Eitan Gutin

Nativ Experience in Israel

Fifteen years ago I spent a year in Israel with Nativ, the Conservative movement's gap-year program in Israel. The 45 students in my group included my first cousin, Erica (z"I), my future wife, Aviva, and many who have gone on to serve the Jewish community as both professionals and volunteers. When we boarded the plane at JFK in September 1995 we had no idea what a difficult year 5756 would be for Israel and the Jewish people.

On Saturday night, November 4 (11 Heshvan), I was asleep in my dorm room when my cousin woke me. "Eitan," she said, "Rabin's been shot. He's dead." So began my personal experience with what I consider to be one of the darkest moments in Israel's history.

Speech to USCJ Convention

I was then serving as the International President of USY. When Rabin was assassinated the USCJ biennial was meeting in DC. I was asked to speak over the phone to the convention to share what it was like to be in Israel through this tragedy, and to share a hope for the future.

While I am often skeptical about the chances for peace in Israel, I cannot help but feel some of the same hope that I was able to summon 15 years ago in the face of this tragedy. What follows are some excerpts from the telephone speech I gave on November 5, 1995:

"It is not uncommon to see candles burning in the *Moadon* [meeting room]. We light candles to usher in the Shabbat, and we light another to end it. However, this morning...the center of the *Moadon* was dominated by a candle none of us in our worst dreams expected to see. On a small brown chair sits this tiny memorial candle. Over it,...on a white sheet of paper, are written the words: 'Yitzhak Rabin, a warrior, a leader, one who loved, and one who was loved, 1922-1995...'

Shared Public Moments

"All of us can recall where we were when we heard about the assassination. A group of us were hanging out on Ben Yehudah when passers-by started asking 'Did you hear, did you hear?'

"Much of the group was on its way home from the various locations where we spent Shabbat. On buses from Netanya, Tel Aviv, and other places, Nativers moved to the front of the buses along with everyone else to hear the tragic news [on the bus radio].

"At midnight, when just about everyone had returned, David Keren, the Nativ director, held a special session...to give us some direction.... He told us...that he hopes this tragedy will have the effect of uniting a country that, for the past few years, has been severely divided.

Disconnect with Rabin's Enemies

"David assured us that order will prevail in the next few days, weeks, and months, and that life will go on. 'There are those who will be rejoicing that he is dead,' said David. 'I may say the same prayers as these people, but as a Jew, I share no connection with them.'

"From what I have seen and read in the last 24 hours, the vast majority of the country agrees. "As Jews we should be proud that in his statement to the press the president of the United States used the Hebrew words *Shalom, Haver*, goodbye friend, to say goodbye to the Prime Minister of one of the smallest countries in the world.

Impact on World Leaders

"Rabin had a relationship with other world leaders that is only now becoming evident. He moved not only Israel, but the entire Middle East, in the direction of *Shalom*. It is our duty, after this tragedy, to unite again as the people of Israel, the Jewish Civilization, and continue Yitzhak Rabin's example of what we mean when we say *Bakesh Shalom V'radfehu*, look for Peace and pursue Peace.

Two Marches to Jerusalem

"Just three weeks ago, during the intermediate days of Succot, 250,000 Israelis marched 12 kilometers in a symbolic pilgrimage to Jerusalem. ...The city was busy celebrating its 3000th year and we participated wholeheartedly in the festivities. In order to keep the roads safe, public buses...were free, and a constant stream of travelers came into the city.

"Tomorrow, once again, the country of Israel will go up to Jerusalem. Once again, buses will be free, and the streets...full of Israelis. This time, however, instead of celebrating a nation, we must mourn one of its greatest and most courageous leaders.

"A great protector and keeper of all the nation of Israel has fallen. May we have the strength, the hope, and the vision to continue his legacy and dream of peace until it reaches fruition."

As you know, the Social Action Committee's work is guided by the words of Rabbi Hillel. On October 10, TI members, alongside members from Emory Beacon of Light Church, responded to Rabbi Hillel's question, "If not now, when,?" by participating in the *Walk for the Homeless*. In the words of TI member and Emory liaison **Pierre Dugan**:

"The Emory Beacon of Light and Tifereth Israel celebrated their eleventh annual *Walk for the Homeless* on Sunday, October 10. Since 2000, the two congregations have shown their solidarity with the unsheltered in the District of Columbia once a year by meeting in the parking lot of Emory United Methodist Church in Brightwood, just a few blocks south of Walter Reed. Together with the Coolidge High School band we parade around the neighborhood as a sign of hope for those in need.

"Volunteers from TI and Emory also stay at the transitional house owned by the Beacon of Light and dedicated to housing young mothers and their children during the months of September through June. All families are screened by Capitol Hill Ministries, who provide counsel and guidance to these families as they find gainful employment and permanent housing. "The annual walk, which usually takes place around the holiday of Sukkot, is the Beacon of Light's largest fundraiser of the year, as the Fannie Mae Foundation provides matching grants based on the number of registered walkers.



Emory Beacon of Light Walk for the Homeless, October 10




