Notes from the Rabbi: Ethan Seidel In Honor of Josh Furman

[Excerpted from a *drash* I gave on Shabbat morning, May 23, at TI]

As we prepare to say good bye to Josh Furman and Alisha Klapholz (and of course, Tova), who are leaving our community in a few weeks, I have been thinking about all the good things Josh has done for our community, in particular with regard to adult education.

I think especially about the SHALEM program of talks on Shabbat afternoons, after services, which Josh started. How many times have I reluctantly dragged myself up from the Cherner Auditorium at 1:15 p.m. on a Shabbat afternoon, leaving the pleasant food and relaxing conversation of the kiddush, to go to one of these talks in the Reamer Chapel, only to find myself enchanted by a talk exposing

me to an aspect of the Jewish world (and/or an aspect of a congregant's expertise) I knew little about. I found I almost always felt glad that I'd made



the effort to learn something new.

Which brings me to another effort I plan to make, inspired by Josh's career as a historian of Judaism. But first a confession: I myself don't study much Jewish history. I do study, of course, but I tend to focus on the primary religious texts

President's Column: John List My Path to a Deeper Connection to Judaism

For my first column, I am using a photo of Jeff Davidson and me. I chose this photo as a representation that those of us in new leadership positions begin with the benefit of the efforts of those who preceded us and those who continue to engage with us.

I would like to use this column to tell you a little about myself. As a young child in a home with a lapsed Catholic mother and Jewish father, there was no religious observance in my life until, as a preteen, I began attending religious School at Temple Beth El in Alexandria, VA.

I met my wife, Lynne, at Temple Beth El and we were confirmed together. At that time, Beth El was an assimilationist Reform Congregation.

In college at UVA, my Jewish identification came mainly from being a member of a "Jewish" fraternity.



After college, Lynne and I were married at Beth EI and then moved to Ann Arbor, Michigan for three years (law school for me and the beginning of Lynne's social work career). After graduation, we returned to the DC area to be close to our extended

– Tanakh, Talmud, midrashim, and the commentaries thereon. To be sure, there is history mixed into all those texts, but I find that I sometimes miss the grand forest of our history by focusing solely on the intricately branched trees. What Jewish history I do read tends to be of the historical fiction variety, not that one should be embarrassed about such reading.

I plan, in Josh's honor, to rededicate myself to reading at least a modicum of Jewish history in the coming year – maybe even something a little more challenging than historical fiction. Maybe you would like to make a similar effort to start a study project? If you are not already a studier of things Jewish, I have three categories to recommend:

Hebrew language, the key to so much of our fascinating literary heritage and culture. Not everyone has the time

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for this, but learning, say, how to decode Biblical narrative Hebrew is quite doable in one's spare time. I'm always holding classes, and even individual tutorials for those who can find the time to do the homework. Let me know if I can help you with this.

Teaching. In my own experience, I have found that nothing gets me studying more than when I have to prepare a class. And whom would you be teaching? How about being my assistant in tutoring one of my conversion students, or someone else in the congregation who knows much less than you. Let me know if this interests you, and I may be able to match you up with a learner in need.

Online learning. This can be a great way to keep yourself on a schedule, while not tying you down to a particular class time each week. Here are some offerings under the auspices of the Conservative Movement that you might want to consider:

Perek Yomi ("daily chapter"). Many Conservative Jews throughout the world have committed themselves to reading a chapter of *Tanakh* -- the Bible -- each day. USCJ's Art Engagement Calendar provides Information on each day's readings and the website has questions to help guide your reading.

Mishnah Yomit ("daily mishnah"). The goal is to learn an entire order of Mishnah in the course of a year. Each day's lesson includes an introduction to the *mishnah* in question, a translation, an explanation, and questions for further thought.

Daf Shavui ("weekly page [of Talmud]"). Every day participants will receive 1/6 of that week's *daf* (page) of Talmud in Hebrew, with an English translation and an explanation.

There are plenty of other online classes out there to interest you.

For instance, Machon Hadar has what looks like a fascinating collection of courses that you can take online, with a *hevruta* that they match you up with – another Jew from some other place. One cannot take a look at their course offerings (http://www.projectzug.org/#!courses/cihc) without finding something that appeals.

In summary, I can think of no better way to thank Josh for all he has done for us, than to follow his example, and study. We wish Josh and Alisha well in Houston, and hope that they (accompanied by Tova, of course) come back regularly to visit.

Trustees

The following trustees, who are not officers or board members, were elected to one-year terms: Laurie Berger, Sheryl Gross-Glaser, Stephen Marcus, Rabbi Bob Saks and Audrey Smith, Cemetery Trustees; George Greenberg, Hilary Sachs and Anita Kramer, Building Preservation Fund Trustees.

At-Large Board Members

The following at-large board members were elected for one- or two-year terms to fill vacancies, or for full three-year terms:

Hannah Rubin, Reva Snow and Joel Cohen, for terms ending in 2016; Terri Zail, for a term ending in 2017; and Cynthia Peterman, Ruth Tabak, Laura Schiavo and Arthur Friedman, for terms ending in 2018.

A vacancy remains unfilled for a term ending in 2016. Chris Zeilinger, Judy Herzog and Judy Tulchin continue to serve for terms ending in 2017.

Dues

The Congregation also approved dues increases recommended by the Board of Directors at its March 9 meeting. Dues for 2015 - 2016 will be \$1,350 for single adults and \$2,700 for two-adult households, an increase of \$100 per person. Dues for members under 30 will be half of these amounts.. Dues for members over 79 will be 75% of these amounts.

Dues will now include High Holiday seating for members, their children 18 months - 20 years who live in their household, and their children under 26 who are full-time students.

The Wolman Sanctuary will have reserved seating on the first day of Rosh Hashanah, Kol Nidre and Yom Kippur morning for an administrative fee of \$18 per seat, if reserved by July 31, and \$36 per seat if reserved August 1 or later.

There will no longer be any additional costs for Cherner services where there will be open seating at all times.

Social Action at TI: Stephen Nelson B'nei Mitzvah Focus on Social Action

Tifereth Israel has a long tradition of encouraging social action among its younger members. Every month, children and teenagers join those who participate in the Martha's Table van run. Entire families often work together to provide dinners to homeless women who reside in the Luther Place shelter. The same is true for our largest project, the Holiday Meals program in December.

Bar and Bat Mitzvah Projects

Part of that tradition is having Bar and Bat Mitzvah students plan and execute a social action project during their B'nei Mitzvah preparation. For years, those students have dedicated themselves to a variety of such projects, including participating in TI's Shepherd Park School tutoring program, delivering food to senior citizens who have limited mobility, or raising funds to provide school supplies for underprivileged students.

While there is no absolute requirement for TI students to embark on a specific project, participation is "strongly urged," according to Rabbi Seidel. He raises the idea of a social action project at the initial meeting he has with the students and their parents.

B'nei Mitzvah Coordinators

Over the years, many TI members, including Lynn Golub-Rofrano and Marcia Goldberg, have worked with B'nei Mitzvah students to the encourage them and help organize Earlier this school their projects. year, longtime TI member Judith (Judi) **Berland** assumed the responsibility of B'nei Mitzvah Coordinator.

Judi is encouraging students at TI's religious school to "think out of the box" in planning social action projects. She is working with students from as early as the fifth grade to encourage them to choose projects for which they have a passion.

"I think it's important to get to them early, so that they can choose a project that matches well with their interests." She encourages students who have interests, for example, in the environment or animal rights to develop projects that tie into those interests.

Berland, who is currently a thirdgrade teacher at Congregation Beth El's religious school, has a long history in Jewish education, having



also been the education director at Congregation Adat Reyim.

She has also been a Vocational Rehabilitation Specialist for the D.C. Department of Rehabilitation Services, and is presently the training coordinator for Hands On, a program that places persons with disabilities in Hyatt Hotels for on-the-job training.

Innovative Student Projects

While Berland is relatively new to the B'nei Mitzvah Coordinator position at TI, she already is excited about several projects students are planning. One student, in honor of a brother who recently recovered from leukemia, is planning a blood drive. Another, with both an interest and aptitude in computer programming, is planning a series of workshops for senior citizens and others who might need training in that area.

The Social Action Committee believes that it's important to encourage these students in their efforts and to recognize their accomplishments. In the coming months, we will highlight some of the more innovative projects they organize.

Gevarim is pleased to offer the TI community the following program in June.

Movie Nite @ TI

Sunday, June 14, 7:30 p.m. *Jerusalem:* The Center of the World (2009, 120 minutes), tells the epic story of one of the world's most incredible cities, capturing the rich mosaic of Jerusalem's Christian, Jewish and Muslim communities.

Covering a sweeping history of over 4,000 years, the film explores the founding of the city; the birth and

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convergence of the world's three major monotheistic religions; and the key historical events, as described in the Hebrew and Christian Bibles, the Talmud, the *Hagaddah*, the Koran, and the Hadith.

Highlights include: Mount Moriah, the site of the First and Second Temples; the Church of the Holy Sepulcher; the Dome of the Rock; and the Western Wall. Directed by Andrew Goldberg, and hosted by Ray Suarez (The NewsHour with Jim Lehrer), the film includes interviews with locals, top scholars and clergy.

Hallah Purchase Program

We are exploring the possibility of a new *hallah* baking program at TI. We are researching offering freshly baked *hallot* that will be available for purchase on Friday afternoons.

We are now trying to determine what interest there is in buying these hallot. We are first planning to bake them once a month, and if successful, perhaps more frequently. We are also considering selling them to families from JPDS.

Purposes of Program

The purpose of the program is multifold.

First, it would be an opportunity for those who are not able to bake their own *hallot* to have freshly made *hallah*, not brought in from who knows where, with who knows what ingredients.

Second, the program aims to raise funds to help subsidize non-sponsored Shabbat Kiddushim.

We also intend to donate a portion of the profit to a local charity such as SOME. Another goal is to provide meaningful work to members of the congregation who might benefit from baking *hallah*. We are also seeking baking volunteers.

I have discussed this program with Rabbi Seidel. He is supportive and enthusiastic and would like to be an integral part of the program.

I have many ideas for the program, trying different recipes each month, such as mine, Rabbi Seidel's or yours. If we are successful we might expand the program to offer other baked goods or perhaps market the *hallot* to other Jewish organizations.

What is the Interest Level?

First we need to determine the level of interest in the congregation for buying the *hallah*.

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
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
