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Notes from the Rabbi: Ethan Seidel 5776 - The Year in Numbers

As with last year, this year's Hebrew representation is not just a number, but also a word with a meaning. Moreover, this year's number/word turns out to be related to my plans for the congregation during the coming months.

When representing the Jewish year with Hebrew letters, we generally elide the thousands place, because Hebrew letters don't easily work with thousands. This leaves us with the number 776. In Hebrew, this is spelled תשע"ו. The taf is equal to 400, the *shin* is equal to 300, the *ayin* is 70, and the *vav* is 6. The "between the last two letters is there to tell you that this is a number, not a word.

But if you take out the ", you do in fact get a very good Hebrew word, תִּשְׁעוּ, meaning "You shall pay attention." In English, at

sounds like the same meaning as last year's Hebrew year number/word, תּשׁעה. also meaning "You shall pay attention."



However, *last* year's word was in the singular, hinting to each of us: you, as an individual, should be paying attention this coming year.

This year's word is in the plural, meaning "You all shall pay attention."

Dr. Martin Heinzelmann, who is in charge of maintaining significant sites in the nearby town of Geismar, will give a lecture on the Geismar Jewish cemetery. The cemetery, which is located on the town's southern boundary, was redesigned fifty years ago as a memorial, and today little is known about its earlier configuration or appearance.

After Minhah on Yom Kippur afternoon, we will hold our second annual "Teen Shmooze" with Eitan.



Born in South Africa during the apartheid era, she later lost her son, who was serving with the Israeli Army reserve in the Occupied Territories. When her attempts to initiate a dialogue with the Palestinian who killed her child were rejected, she returned to South Africa to learn more about its Truth and Reconciliation Committee's efforts to overcome years of enmity. Robi's thought-provoking journey leads from a place of deep personal pain to a belief that a better future is possible.

This documentary tells the story of a hotbed of Jewish intellectualism, New York's City College, around 1930, and follows the careers of four of the greatest minds to emerge from that environment, Daniel Bell, Nathan Glazer, Irving Howe and Irving Kristol. The film serves as a powerful record both of American intellectual history and of the peculiar role of a generation of Jewish thinkers in riding and shaping that history.

In the event of a medical emergency, medical personnel could quickly call the program's toll-free number. The Family Alert people then would contact that individual's emergency contacts, thereby allowing them to respond as quickly as possible.

Enrollees subsequently will be called every year or two to maintain updated emergency contact information in their file.
