Notes from the Rabbi: Ethan Seidel Poor Cell Phone Reception

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I have attended several discussion groups this past year about very sensitive topics. (In truth, what is the point of a discussion group if you're not going to confront the difficult truths of our existence?) In each of these groups, there were people who had their cell phone out for much of the time, checking incoming messages and mail.

Actually, the phones were not out *all* of the time, which leads me to believe that the abusers were on some level aware of their inappropriateness. At the beginning of the sessions, the cell phones started out in a pocket or a purse. Sometimes, the first use was accompanied by a muttered apology "I just wanted to check on ..."

But once out, the phone was never replaced in pocket or purse for long. And subsequent uses were not preceded by any apology. To me, it had all the appearances of addictive behavior.

In the same vein, here at TI on Shabbat, cell phones are making inroads. It used to be that I had



to ask only *guests* to put away their cell phones. No longer. And unlike guests, who (almost) always hurriedly put away their phone with abject apologies to me, Tl'ers can be indignant. This is their home, after all, just as much as it is mine.

Communications and Information

After reflecting back on the past year and listening to feedback from the congregation, I feel extra attention needs to be given to communication with the congregation at large about the activities and decisions of the Board and other lay leadership. While I believe that I and other members of the TI leadership have been communicating both on a personal level and through our current publications, I do not think that this has been sufficient.

On a personal level, many people stop me to ask a question or share their views on issues/events and I have enjoyed discussions that have followed. Other Board members and volunteers in various leadership positions have also been available, either by personal interaction or email. We have also been using the

synagogue's various written and on-line publications such as The Menorah, weekly TI newsletter and special event pub -licity to commu-In partinicate. cular, important initiatives new such as our year Centennial



have had their own informational feature in *The Menorah*.

I now realize that as helpful as these disseminations of information might be, they are not designed for community

Truth be told, I have tended to avoid chastising Tl'ers about this issue. I don't want to roil relations with a congregant, because it may make them reluctant to lean on me in a future time of need. Similarly, I never said anything to any of the offenders in the support groups, for fear of adding the insult of public humiliation to the injury the cell phone had already caused to the intimacy of the group.

And there is injury, though some will deny it. Studies apparently show that even if a cell phone is *visible*, without being used, it changes the nature of a conversation. People tend to avoid difficult, potentially lengthy topics when they know that the conversation is likely to be interrupted at any time.

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Menorah submissions: menorah@tifereth-israel.org This reminds me of something written in my evaluation last year: that sometimes, at Kiddush after Shabbat morning services, Tl'ers have the feeling when talking with me that I am also gazing around the room, looking for someone else that I might need to speak with. I can see how that could be extremely irritating, and also non-conducive to in-depth conversation. Similarly, speaking with a person with their cell phone out is like talking to someone who is constantly looking over your shoulder, anticipating another interaction with someone else.

Anyway, I hereby put you on notice. I promise to be gentle, but I will be thorough. Please don't take out your cell phones on Shabbat in the TI building: not to make calls, or take pictures, or even show others pictures or read books.

It is all clearly forbidden in the recent responsum by Rabbi Nevins on this subject, available at the Rabbinical Assembly website. The basic reason: it is too tempting; at the touch of a finger, you are on the web, and out of the moment. This is the very opposite of Shabbat. And I believe it is part of my job – a big part – to make TI a safe space for rest and renewal on Shabbat.

I'd rather not have a confrontation over it, and I'm guessing you'd rather avoid the discomfort of having me ask you to put the phone away. Please respect our community's standards on this issue.

I'm happy to discuss this in person with anyone interested in further details.

members to have a convenient place to ask questions, request more information on a particular topic or give feedback. I am thus committed to improving communication from the Board and leadership to members of the congregational community.

One new way to highlight developments from the Board and ongoing activities that relate to the TI community as a whole, will be a spotlight feature in the weekly TI Newsletter titled: What's Nu at TI. I am also very open to hearing other ideas for improving communication. Please tell me if there are other processes that we may add to help the community get the information they need or desire.

In addition, I would like to take this opportunity to give you information on some topics that the Board is currently working on:

Annual Meeting, 5/24/16: Election of Leadership and 2017 Budget

TI's Annual Meeting will be held on Tuesday night, May 24. As is our practice, we will serve a light dinner beginning at 7:30 p.m. and the meeting will begin at 8 p.m. At the Annual Meeting, TI members vote on persons to serve as officers or members at large on the Board, as well as persons to serve as Cemetery Trustees and Building Fund Preservation Trustees. In addition, there will be a presentation of the 2017 budget and other updates about activities.

A Nominating Committee selected by the Board is currently in the process of making recommendations for persons to serve on the Board. The Nominating Committee is chaired by Laura Schiavo. The other members of the committee are Jason Kimelman-Block, Steven Bressler, Earl Dotter and Judy Miller. People may also be nominated from the floor at the Annual Meeting. The proposed slate will be sent to the Congregation around the second week of May.

Changes in Professional Leadership

As has been reported in various publications and meetings, through a long and intensive process, the Board has decided to modify the structure of professional leadership in Lifelong Learning. We have undertaken a process during the last six months and made some important decisions, and will continue to seek feedback to strengthen and evaluate our plans during the next year.

I will provide here a short review of our process and current actions and am open to talk with anyone who has questions or wants more information. After receiving a Report and Recommendations from an Ad Hoc Committee on Lifelong Learning, the Board devoted much time in our monthly and extra meetings, and has formed subgroups to work on aspects of the issue in order to consider what action to take and when.

The Board decided to create two part -time Lifelong Learning positions for the 2016-2017 year, a Director of Education, who will be the principal of the Himmelfarb School and Chai School, and a Director of Community Engagement, who will help our potential members, members, children, youth and school parents find their niche within our synagogue community and get the most out of our busy programming calendar by committees to create exciting events varying from religious to cultural to social action.

The Board focused first on the Director of Education. The part-time position was offered to Eitan Gutin but, after consideration, he decided it would not be in his best interests from a professional and personal perspective. The job was then advertised and a Search Committee has been formed to recommend a candidate to the Board to hire from the applications we have received.

The Search Committee is chaired by Chris Zeilinger. The other members at this time are Rabbi Seidel, Lee Anderegg, Janet Blank, Sara Goldberg, Judy Miller and Liz Sokolov. Jevera Temsky, Tl's Executive Director, is also actively participating in this process. The plan is to have the person hired as of July 1.

The TI Israel Committee is sponsoring a special program at the Erev Shabbat dinner following services on Friday evening, May 13. The featured speaker is TI congregant Ari Ne'eman, who will discuss "The Homeland Landscape: How the Early Zionists Saw Themselves."

Ne'eman will explore the broad ideological diversity of the early Zionist movement, ranging from religious Zionists to Socialists to the right wing Revisionists, and how the political dynamics between these groups shaped the actions of the Zionist executive in pre-state Israel.

He will also address the diversity of the modern Zionist movement today and the relationship between Zionism, Israel, American Jewry and American Jewish politics.

Ne'eman is an amateur student of Zionist and Israeli history. He works as a disability rights activist and directs the Autistic Self Advocacy Network. He was a member of the New York Jewish Week's 2010 "36 by 36" list and also received the 2014 Morton E. Ruderman Award for Inclusion from the Ruderman Family Foundation.

From 2010 to 2015 Ne'eman served as one of President Obama's appointees to the National Council on Disability. He has a bachelor's degree from the University of Maryland-Baltimore County, where he studied political science in the Sondheim Public Affairs Scholars Program.

In April, **Alan Ronkin**, Director, of AJC's Washington Regional Office delivered a talk on anti-Semitism in Europe and challenges to Israel in the international arena, including some hopeful thoughts on how European governments are having a positive impact.

On May 21, in partnership with the New Israel Fund, we will hear Ron Gerlitz (a Jew) and Rawnak Natour (an Arab), Co-Directors of Sikkuy – the Association for the Advancement of Civic Equality, an organization of Jewish and Arab citizens working to implement full equality on all levels between the Arab Palestinian and Jewish citizens of Israel.

They will speak about "Advancing Shared Society in Israel - Breaking down Barriers. Creating Opportunities." What could Israel look like as a shared society? And what are the opportunities and challenges to truly achieving it?

This will be a conversation about how American progressives, and our partners in Israel, are working to reclaim Israel's founders' liberal and democratic vision. Hear about what is done on the ground to advance a vision of an Israel where all citizens — Jewish and Arab alike — have an equal voice and an equal stake in the country's future.
