USCJ's New, Flexible Membership Standard

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STREET OF STATE CONCREGATION

The umbrella organization for the Conservative movement, United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism (USCJ), has proposed to its member *kehilot* a change that would allow each congregation within USCJ the authority to define who can be a member of that shul. Tifereth Israel is one of the approximately 600 congregations in the US and Canada that are members of USCJ.

President's Column: John List

The Board of Directors of USCJ created a Commission on Community and Covenant in the Twenty First Century. The Commission first met on June 6, 2016, and the Board of USCJ adopted the Commission's recommendation on a change to Membership Standards on December 4, 2016.

Community & Covenant Members

The foundational principles of the commission were to honor members of the Jewish community and to honor members of the Jewish covenant, i.e., Jews by birth or conversion. Members of the community are those persons who are not members of the covenant and yet are invested in the well-being of the synagogue and share a commitment to the community with the Jewish members of the synagogue.

The Commission's proposed revision to the Membership Standard is viewed as a welcoming gesture, communicating that the involvement of non-Jewish community members is appreciated and valued, and acknowledging their de facto participation and investment in the synagogue community.

At our meeting on February 13, the Board of Directors resolved that TI vote on March 1, 2017, in favor of the revised Membership Standard. The current standard is: "only persons of the Jewish faith, as

determined by the rabbi, may be admitted to membership in the congregation."

The proposed standard is: "USCJ supports every affiliated kehilah in developing its own criteria for membership."



The proposed Membership Standard is supported by: the Rabbinic Assembly; the Jewish Theological Seminary; and, the Zeigler School of Rabbinic Studies.

If the proposed change is adopted, no congregation is required to change its definition of membership.

New Standard Doesn't Alter Others

The proposed Membership Standard does not alter the requirement of USCJ affiliated shuls to adhere to the Standards of Rabbinic Practice, published opinions of the Committee on Jewish Law & Standards of the Rabbinic Assembly and the positions of the United Synagogue. The proposed Membership Standard does not address halakhic issues.

If Tifereth Israel adopts the proposed Membership Standard on March 1, TI has an opportunity to engage in a long-range process involving the entire congregation as to whether we want to change the membership standard in our Bylaws. TI's Bylaws read: "Membership of this Congregation shall be open to all persons of the Jewish faith (as defined by the

Conservative movement and as interpreted by the Rabbi) who are of good moral character."

Amending this provision to allow non-Jewish persons to be members of TI can only be accomplished by a vote of three-quarters of the TI members at a congregational meeting. What lies ahead of us in any change to our membership standard would be a thoughtful deliberative process involving the entire TI community. One of TI's wonderful (and free) educational opportunities is the weekly Lunch & Learn program. It has been ongoing for several years, but I just began to participate this past fall (as both participant and occasional leader), and I enthusiastically recommend it to other TI members and their nonmember friends.

We meet in the Reamer Chapel every Monday morning at 11 for an hour's exploration/discussion of the *Parashat HaShavuah* – the Torah portion read on the previous Shabbat – followed by a lovely lunch served up (usually featuring the menu from the previous Shabbat Kiddush lunch) by Roz Kram.

We have a devoted group of "regulars" in attendance but continuity is not critical. Anyone can come

any week they are free to do so and not have any make-up work to do. Just read over the previous Shabbat Torah portion – or come to shul and hear it chanted -- for background, or even come in "cold!" No prior sign-up or registration is required.

Social Action at TI: Larry Baizer Refugee Support, Pesah Food Delivery

Aiding a Refugee Family

Last fall, several members of the Social Action Committee, along with a group of interested volunteers from the congregation, met with representatives of the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society (HIAS) for two educational sessions on the enormous scope of the current refugee crisis and initial advice on how local congregations might assist refugee families in the Washington area.

Some nine organizations in the US coordinate volunteer efforts on behalf of refugees. As HIAS does not perform that function in this area, they directed us to Lutheran Social Services (LSS), which has guided volunteers for several years.

Orientation sessions with LSS provided us with concise ideas and plans for hosting refugee families from the moment of their arrival in this area. These scenarios typically require significant commitments from the congregation, so alternative avenues were explored.

The Ethiopian Community Development Council (ECDC) is another of the nine organizations coordinating refugee assistance efforts in this area, and Jon Halpern and his family have worked with a Syrian family of six for the past nine months. Jon identified another Syrian family (friends of the people that he is working with) that settled in this area with the aid of ECDC in September.

A small group of Tl'ers (Gene Herman, Janet Nesse and Alice Burton) has made initial contact with this family to get acquainted, assess their needs, and discuss how best to be of assistance. Several visits have been made to the family in their home. The aim, we have learned, is not so much to do things for the family or give things to them but,

rather, to empower them to become independent.

The family is originally from Homs and arrived in September 2016 after living in Jordan for four years. They include a mother, father, and four elementary age children, who are happily enrolled in school (*madrassa*) in the Prince Georges County Public Schools. Dad works at a bakery that has hired a number of refugees.

Many congregants have generously offered assistance. At this time, someone has purchased and donated a brand new laptop for the family and another congregant identified and contacted a dentist who has offered free services for the family. Once the dental appointments are set up, drivers will be needed.

A third person located an ESOL teacher, who will be visiting two days per week. As learning English is probably the biggest step towards independence, another ESOL teacher would be very helpful. The small group of TI volunteers will continue to work with the family to strengthen the connection and to assist them in accommodating to life in the US.

The group will provide updates and eventually suggestions for ways other Tl'ers might assist in this vitally important effort. We have been advised that it is best if the family meets with a few people at a time, until they become comfortable with the relationship. Once the family learns some English, interactions will be easier and more folks can become a part of the team. Shukhran...thank you, everyone.

Pesah Food Deliveries

Every year, on Rosh HaShanah and Pesah, volunteers from TI help to distribute foods and accoutrements



appropriate for the holiday to those less fortunate among us so that they may share in the *simhah*. This year's Pesah delivery is on **Sunday**, **April** 2.

We encourage you to join us in brightening several families' holidays by helping us deliver dozens of bags of groceries to Jewish seniors, immigrants and others in need identified by local Jewish agencies. The packages contain traditional Passover delicacies such as wine, matzot, gefilte fish and horse radish, even a Maxwell House Hagaddah!

Interactions with the recipients frequently prove to be rewarding and enlightening for the TI volunteers, so this is a particularly good activity for families with children.

Her parents managed to leave Trieste, Italy just before the outbreak of World War II with a visa for New Zealand after having been unable to obtain visas to the U.S., Australia or Canada. Her father, a Hungarian asbestos expert, was able to obtain a permit only because New Zealand wanted to determine if its asbestos outcroppings were commercially viable. They were not.

Movie Nite@TI:

From March through May, Movie Nite@TI presents the opening episodes of three Israeli TV series. The first, on **March 19** at 7:30 p.m. in the Cherner, is *Hatufim* (Prisoners of War), on which Showtime's *Homeland* is based.

Hatufim follows the lives of two captured Israeli soldiers who are returned to Israel after 17 years in captivity in Lebanon along with the remains of a third soldier who was captured with them. The two episodes together are 110 minutes. Rabbi Seidel will lead a discussion afterwards. The presentation is free and nosh is \$4.

The following two series will be Srugim (April 23), a drama series which deals with the life of religious young singles in Jerusalem, and Arab Labor (May 21), a comedy about Amjad, a Palestinian journalist and Israeli citizen in search of his identity.

Great Course on Medieval Jewish Civilization
