From the President: Rabbi Jason Kimelman-Block

I recently listened to a sobering episode of the Ezra Klein Show podcast that discussed the epidemic of loneliness in American society. A 2018 report by the Kaiser Family Foundation found that 22 percent of all adults – almost 60 million Americans – said they often or always felt lonely or socially isolated. In the 30 years before the pandemic, the number of Americans who reported having five or more close friends decreased by 25%. Most striking to me is that young people now report feeling lonelier than the elderly.



There are many possible causes of this epidemic of loneliness in American life - millions living far away from family, the physical design of many of our living spaces that facilitates isolation from each other, and technological developments (such as social media and the ubiquity of headphones) that help us to avoid uncomfortable or awkward interactions, while increasing our isolation.

No matter the cause, one remedy is to seek out and build what sociologists call "third places" -- social surroundings that are separate from home and the work-

Now, I haven't been here that long, and we are just now getting back into kiddushes and specifically birthday & anniversary kiddushes, so I didn't know about this and thought their skit was just a spoof. Well I sure was wrong.



So, what have I learned from this. One thing is that TI is a place that listens to the congregants and, when possible, implements the desired event, activity, or policy. It could be that this has been raised many times before. I don't know. Sometimes that is the case but appropriate persistence (and maybe even a good Shabbaton skit) can produce movement.

This, I have noticed, is also how many events come to be. Someone has an idea,

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place (and now that many of us work remotely, the social space of work is in decline as well). In my own life, TI is a precious "third place" – a place where I can spend relaxed time with people that are not necessarily my closest friends or family (although it's great when they're there too), but who I build connections with as part of a larger circle. I think that's why when I've heard people describe what they love most about TI, many people say "lunch!" We sometimes joke about people who come on Saturday mornings "JFK" (just for kiddush), but maybe Shabbat lunch is the most important hour of the week.

The value we place on simply spending time together was underscored during Rabbi Werbow's installation this past spring. As part of the celebration, each committee donated a board game to the shul, so that people could linger after lunch and spend more time in each other's company. Another example is our Helping Hands effort, led expertly by Susan Catler, where people can provide simple assistance to each other, such as rides to medical appointments. In considering the value of TI in our lives and how we can meet the needs of our entire community, we should pay special attention to our ability to address this epidemic of loneliness. I'm sure there are so many other things we could do to thicken our relationships with each other and I'd love to hear your ideas.

The staff is not able to make every idea brought forth into a viable program. Yes, they do it a lot. They are often the movers and doers on programs but every program we have will have a greater chance to succeed if those who are interested do what is needed to make it happen.

I have mentioned before my interest in having many programs that address the needs of our congregants. There are small groups that are making things happen. The families with young children have an active Tot Committee (yes they planned the infamous Tot Bar-B-Que) and some have begun a chavurah in addition to the regular tot programming. Another group of families with middle school aged children have also started a new chavurah. These are in their early stages and if you are interested in being a part of the activities, please reach out and I'll put you in touch with the organizers.

What else can we be doing? Shabbat afternoon is a wonderful time to be together in community. We often have a SHALEM program with an interesting presentation. **Rabbi Seidel** holds a Talmud class and there is often an anagrams game or some other game taken out of the game closet. Invite some friends to play a game and start up during Kiddish. Often, others will stop by to hear about the game and will join in the next time.

What do you want to see happen at TI? Let me know. Let our president, **Jason Kimelman-Block** know. We can't promise that every idea will get the same traction as July Birthdays & Anniversaries did but you are what makes up TI and you can make TI happen too.

Unfortunately, I will be away July 22nd but others should be sure to come and celebrate at our July birthday & anniversary kiddush.

New Neighbors Interfaith Alliance (NNIA) Refugee Family Support – School ended in Montgomery County on June 16 and thanks to the research and hard work of our own Bob Mathis the two oldest Afghan refugee children—Ahmad and Asra— started attending Kids After Hours summer camp June 20. Bob also managed to get almost the entire fee excused by the camp. Additionally, due to a generous gift from Kol Nashim the children were taken on a shopping trip to Target with their mom and NNIA family lead volunteer, Joyce Mange, to stock up on summer camp supplies (think sunscreen, hats, closed toed shoes, swimsuits) - the children are so excited about camp and so appreciative! The remaining money

In other news, the children's father started a new job in early June which he feels is an excellent fit. He is an Immigration Legal Coordinator for Lutheran Social Services, a relocation agency. Again, Bob Mathis and Joyce Mange have work hard to help the family submit applications for funding, and we are hopeful that some will come through soon.

AN UPDATE ON THE JUDICIARY CONFLICT IN ISRAEL Bill Galston

Anacostia River Trip - Julie Steinberg

Three days after Washington DC suffered code purple air quality, a group of TI members joined the Anacostia Watershed Society for a boat trip on the river to learn from our guide about water quality, wildlife, and the history of the Anacostia River. The weather was comfortable.

As we traveled, we observed four ospreys perched on trees bordering the river and an eagle sitting high up on a tower. Swallows swooped over the river catching insects, and when we passed under a highway bridge, we could see their mud nests.

One of the society's goals is restoration of the wetlands. They use wild rice to rejuvenate the marshes. Unfortunately, the Army Corps of Engineers put up seawalls that prevent the renewal of the marshes and are prohibitively expensive to remove.

We passed the location of one of the nation's dirtiest power plants (now closed), the old Benning. Road PEP-CO power plant. When operating, it burned coal and emitted toxic air pollution into the river and local neighborhoods. Carolina Herron made the connection that when she was young and visiting her grandparents, she used to play outside with the ash raining down on her and her friends. As we returned, we passed a kayaker with 5 tires on his boat who ventured often onto the river to collect tires and trash.

TI's Innovative Approach to Jewish Education - Stan Dorn

Jennifer Lav had mixed feelings when she first sent her son to the Himmelfarb School. She wanted Ira to get a strong Jewish education. But "traditionally, Hebrew school wasn't fun. It was something you had to go to."

She was astonished to find that Ira "absolutely loves Sunday school". Now six years old, Ira "looks forward to it every week, and when he gets home, he's excited to tell me what he did." After just two years, "it's installed a love of Jewish learning. He's sad when Hebrew school breaks for the summer."

Volunteering at Tifereth Israel's Himmelfarb school, Jennifer discovered the school's secret sauce: it's "a diverse and accepting place that meets kids where they are as they learn in very different ways."

Under the approach pioneered by the school's director, **Rabbi Kelley Gludt**, most class cohorts are not defined by age or grade level. Instead, each student

picks a club where Jewish learning is integrated with the child's favorite activities. As Rabbi Kelley explained, "we support student agency, encouraging children to have as much say in their educational journey as possible." This promotes learning that is "hands-on, experiential, and filled with energy and joy."

The school teaches familiar subjects: Shabbat, holidays, Hebrew, Jewish values, Biblical literacy, Israel, prayer, preparation for Bar, Bat, and Kabbalat Mitzvah, etc. But learning methods are anything but traditional.

Rising sixth-grader **Ava Strollo** explained, "we're all focused on one topic, but we learn it in different ways." For example, during the Shabbat unit, students in Ava's reading and writing group "wrote short stories, using what we researched about Shabbat." In the Music Room, students rewrote the lyrics of popular songs to bring out their favorite parts of Shabbat. And during a unit on the book of Genesis, students in the Builder Space used Legos to picture key moments drawn from a close reading of the Biblical text.

According to Ava, "being able to choose how you learn" lets students "be more creative in our classes. We get to do what we really want to do. We listen more, we're more productive."

Ava's 13-year-old sister, **Mia**, put it succinctly: "School is a lot more fun."

Hebrew instruction is especially individualized. Over Zoom, Hebrew teachers meet with students one-on-one, using instructional methods carefully tailored to fit the individual child's situation, knowledge base, and learning style.

Fresh from her recent Bat Mitzvah celebration, Mia explained why she found the one-one-one Hebrew instruction remarkably effective: "Everyone learns at their own pace. Each student can learn as fast as they can, but without speeding anyone along. We learn everything better and more thoroughly."

Some activities are community-wide. Students and teachers all come together for weekly prayer. Usually, seventh-graders lead the upbeat, tuneful service, though younger students often volunteer to lead.

Holidays are another time when the entire school community comes together. This Spring's celebra-

tions included a Tu B'Shevat ice cream seder, "Nailed It! Passover Edition," and a Purim carnival.

The school is built on a "pedagogy of joy," according to Rabbi Kelley. "Joy comes when our children are engaged by learning, have a degree of independence and agency, and feel safe to explore concepts and ideas without fear of judgment." In Ava's words, "It's a very good community to be learning. No one's going to judge you if you're not always right. It's about learning, not about knowing everything."

Michelle Strollo, Ava and Mia's mother, was struck by the school's trusting environment that helps older kids feel comfortable sharing their thoughts about tough topics, including rising antisemitism in area schools. "That's a great gift we can give our kids," Michelle explained, "providing safe spaces where they can be proud of their Jewish identity and cultivate that together." Michelle noted the contrast with weekday schooling: "After sitting in classrooms all week, it's nice for kids to have a place where learning happens so naturally, not in a traditional, formulaic way," She stressed that the school gives students "a chance to get creative," providing a break from secular schools that focus on standardized test results by "teaching to the test."

"In the past, my kids would go because they're good kids. But on lots of Sundays we heard them ask, 'Do we have to go?' Now, it doesn't matter how late our girls stayed up on Saturday night. They wake up on Sunday and want to go to religious school," drawn by "renewed energy and a sense of community."

Rabbi Kelley provided a long-term context for the school's innovative approach: "When learners feel contentment, belonging, and joy within Judaism, we reinforce the foundations of our Jewish future."

A Frightening Vision for Israel, and a Path toward Improving Palestinian Living Conditions and Israeli Security - Elihu Leifer

Editor's note: this is the second part of a two-part article. The first part ran in the June 2023 issue of the Menorah.

I. The Smotrich "Decisive Plan"

A program drafted by Israel's new Finance Minister and Minister in the Defense Ministry Bezalel Smotrich, known as the "Smotrich Decisive Plan", if carried out, will seriously compromise Israel's security, economy, and foreign relations. It contains three main features:

- 1. The settling of an additional half-million Israelis in the West Bank;
- 2. A judicial overhaul which would endow the executive branch with unfettered power, including power to execute this plan;
- 3. The undermining of what remains of the Palestinian Authority's operational capacity, which will lead to the strengthening of Hamas and other anti-Israel terrorist organizations.

These are far from abstract musings. In the plan itself Smotrich writes that "this goal...will be realized via a political-legal act of imposing sovereignty on all of Judea and Samaria [i.e. the West Bank]."

In the new Israel government Smotrich has received the Finance Ministry and a portfolio in the Defense Ministry, powerful positions that would enable him to promote his agenda. In his capacity of Finance Minister, he can allocate vast resources necessary to put his plan into practice. In his role in the Defense Ministry, he can control the civil administration with responsibility in the West Bank. To make matters worse, the extremist Itamar Ben-Gvir, has secured the National Security Ministry whose powers include the internal security forces that operate in Israel and, increasingly, in the West Bank.

The results are already evident. Nine outposts, illegal by Israeli and international law, have received post -facto authorization; plans were approved to build thousands of housing units across the West Bank; the Disengagement Law (which secured withdrawal from the Gaza Strip and five settlements in the northern part of the West Bank in 2005) was repealed; the illegal settlement of Homesh was effectively reestab-lished; significant new budgets were approved for settlement infrastructures; and signs were posted on West Bank billboards condemning IDF OC Central Command, a clear warning to those soldiers and their officers who would stand in the way of West Bank annexation.

For these reasons, and to reduce the violence currently taking place in the West Bank and the surrounding area, it is critical for the Israel government to implement quickly and, if necessary, unilaterally a peace plan that clearly rejects the Smotrich Decisive Plan, and that will enhance Israel's security and improve Palestinian living conditions.

II. Viability of Prompt Implementation of a Peace Plan

I believe this is a moment of potential positive change in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict and relationship. This may seem counter-intuitive because of Israel's new right-wing government, the ongoing violence by Palestinian terrorists and Israeli West Bank settlers, the deep political split within Israeli society, the seeming indifference of Prime Minister Netanyahu and U.S. President Biden, and the hostility toward Israel by international agencies, organizations and media. But a deeper examination shows the contrary is true, if appropriate action is taken promptly.

To be sure, positive change will require Netanyahu's agreement to the substance of a peace plan and

his willingness and ability to restrain the right-wing forces in his coalition. It will also require personal involvement by Biden and his willingness to push Netanyahu to agree to such a plan. This, in turn, will require acquiescence by Egypt, Jordan, Britain and the E.U. Ideally, an effort should also be made to obtain acquiescence to the plan from the United Nations Security Council, including China and Russia, and the countries of Turkey, Saudi Arabia, and Arab Gulf states that have normalized relations with Israel. Impossible? Consider:

- 1. Netanyahu already agreed, in 2020, to a peace plan which included:
 - A. Recognition of a Palestinian state with its capital in a portion of eastern Jerusalem.
 - B. No displacement of Arab and Jewish residents from their homes in Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Gaza.
 - C. A division of land in the West Bank whereby i) 97 percent of Palestinians currently residing there would be incorporated into the new State of Palestine, and ii) simultaneously, 97 percent of Jews currently residing in the West Bank would be incorporated into the State of Israel.
 - D. Retaining the <u>status quo</u> regarding rights and protocols on the Temple Mount, including the al-Aqsa mosque, and all other Moslem holy places.
 - E. Retention by Israel of all security prerogatives it currently exercises over land, sea and air.
 - F. Retention by Israel of sovereignty over the security-sensitive Jordan River Valley. Existing agricultural enterprises owned or controlled by Palestinians would continue without interruption.
 - G. The State of Palestine would include a limited portion of the Negev contiguous to Gaza.
 - H. The "triangle communities" of Kafr Qara, Ar'ara, Baha al-Gharbiyye, Umm al Fahm, Qalansawe, Tayibe, Kafr Qasim, Tira, Kafr Bara and Jaljulia, which largely self-identify as Palestinian, would become part of the State of Palestine.
 - I. A high-speed transportation link would be built to enable efficient movement between the West Bank and Gaza, crossing over and under the State of Israel's sovereign territory.
 - J. First rate infrastructure solutions (including tunnels and overpasses) would be implemented to maximize unimpeded and secure movement throughout both states.
 - K. There would not be a return to Israel proper of any Palestinians who fled or were displaced during the 1948-49 War.
 - L. Funding of the implementation of the plan would be through an international fund administered by a "multilateral development bank" that would receive investments by interested countries, United Nations agencies, and private individuals and organizations which are approved by Israel, the Palestine Authority (PA) and the U.S.
 - M. Many other features that will improve Palestinian living conditions. (See Section IV.)
- 2. On June 9, 2023 Prime Minister Netanyahu told the British media company Sky News, in an interview, that a normalization deal with Saudi Arabia "would help us solve the Israeli-Arab conflict." He spoke one day after the U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken completed a three-day visit to Saudi Arabia, where he spoke with its leaders about such a deal.
- 3. Netanyahu has very recently shown that he is willing and able to restrain and override the extreme rightists in his coalition:

On February 26 and March 19, 2023 representatives of Israel, the PA, the U.S., Jordan and Egypt (the "quintet") met in Aqaba, Jordan and Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt, respectively. At these meetings, the PA (Continued on page 30)

agreed 1) to carry out its security responsibilities in the West Bank under the "Oslo Accords" and report on a continuing basis to the "quintet leadership" on this subject; 2) Israel and the PA will address all outstanding issues through direct dialogue; 3) Israel and the PA will continue the <u>status quo</u> at the Moslem Holy sites in Jerusalem; 4) Israel will stop authorization of new outposts for 6 months, other new settlements for 4 months and even stop discussion in the Knesset of any new settlements for 4 months and even stop discussion in the knesset of any new settlements for 4 address for 4 months. These agreements also show that Biden is able and willing to have his administration play an active role in a new search for peace.

- 4. The very recent events in Israel related to the right-wing's judicial reform plan has created a new political dynamic in Israel that will make it easier for Netanyahu to implement such a plan.
- III. Procedural Steps to be Taken by Israel Prior to Implementing the Peace Plan.
 - 1. Israel should promptly advise the PA that it wishes to discuss the peace plan, and do so if PA agrees.
 - 2. At the same time, Israel should implement certain good faith measures to demonstrate its intent to improve immediately the living conditions of Palestinians. These should include:
 - A. Suspending authorizations of all new settlements and outposts, all actions involving displacement of Palestinian residents in Jerusalem and the West Bank and all destructions of Palestinian homes and apartments.
 - B. Take no action inconsistent with the peace plan under discussion.
 - C. Allow Palestinian to develop their communities in accordance with the provisions of the plan as it would apply when fully implemented.
 - D. Increase construction of Palestinian hospitals in eastern Jerusalem, suspend construction of Jewish homes in all of East Jerusalem; implement its announced (last September) relaxation of West Bank entry rules that adversely affect Palestinian foreign passport holders, including professors, students, physicians, and their families, and give official recognition to Bedouin villages that are home to 90,000 individuals and families, so they can be connected to power and water.
 - 3. Biden (or the Secretary of State) and Netanyahu should coordinate their efforts and promptly discuss the plan and its imminent implementation with Egypt, Jordan, Saudi Arabia, other Arab Gulf states with whom Israel has normalized relations, the U.N. Security Council Secretary General, Britain, France, the E.U. and other countries of their choosing. (If Biden wishes, perhaps Turkey, China and Russia should be included.)
 - 4. Following the discussions, implementation of the plan should be commenced as soon as moneys for construction, etc. become available. (While Israel should consider all points raised in good faith by the PA, implementation should not depend on PA consent; this should be made clear in all discussions with the PA and others.)
