From the Rabbi: Rabbi Michael Werbow

The Jewish calendar keeps us moving from one theme and focus to another. We just finished Purim with its theme of living in a topsy turvey world and, for this year at least, reflection on how we celebrate in a time when our attention is diverted and it is not conducive to a full

blown celebration.

No sooner are we done than we shift our focus to Passover. We have already had the special week of Parashat Shekalim, where we recount the giving of the half shekel that, in the times of the Temple, was used to get the Temple ready for all the pilgrims making their way to celebrate in Jerusalem. But now, we kick into high gear with the week of Parashat Parah. The ritual of the Parah Adumah (the red heifer) was a way



for individuals who were ritually unfit for bringing the Pesach offering to become ritually fit.

There is a big shift from Shekalim to Parah. In Shekalim, there is a communal focus and in Parah it is individual. First, it is important to spend time focusing on each of these. Both the community and the individual are important and need attention to be paid to them. What these parshiyot are also pushing us to think about is, how do we, as individuals, support the community and, how does the community support us?

TI is blessed to have a committed group of individuals who work together to support the community. Those individuals, though, also need the support of the community. As we get to know each person in our congregation, we can better see both how each person can contribute to the community and how the congregation can support each individual.

Another way this plays out in the run up to Passover is with Maot Hitin and selling chametz. Contributing to Maot Hitin is a way for us to come together as a community and to support those needing extra help for the holiday. And selling chametz is how we prepare ourselves for our own observance of the holiday.

Again, both of these are needed, and TI is a stronger community when we see both as our obligations in preparing for Passover.

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

Parshah Passages Exhibit at Artomatic - Julie Steinberg

My Sukkah is up at Artomatic! My art is hanging around and inside my sukkah, which is located on the 3rd floor, site #312. I encourage you to come and see it. I am not always there, so let me know if you want to meet me (<u>contact information in</u> <u>ShulCloud</u>). I call my creative process natrasand because I usually depict nature.

The pictures are made from fabric, foam core, paint, and sand. I installed 18 numbered pictures, each representing a story from a different Torah Parshah. On the table inside the Sukkah are quiz sheets (to guess what stories are represented in the paintings) in a blue folder. The answers are in a yellow folder. Also on the table are catalogs and an about-the-artist sheet.

Six additional pictures that are not Torah themed are inside on the right side and in the front of the sukkah. Many working clocks hang from above. Look for the glittery stars too. (Longtime Tlers may recall that a few years back I exhibited these paintings briefly in the Cherner.) There are 7 floors full of art and artists throughout the building. Artomatic is located at 21st and M Street NW (Dupont Circle Metro). It runs through April 28, open Wednesday through Sunday.

Watkins Mill High School Trip to the Holocaust Museum - Sonya Shpilyuk

Back in January, just before Holocaust Memorial Day, I sent an impassioned plea to our shul listserv. At the time, my 10th grade English students at Watkins Mill were reading Elie Wiese's *Night*, and though they engaged thoughtfully with the text, they revealed a profound lack of background knowledge about the Shoah.

I resolved to take our 10th graders – all 300 of them – to the US Holocaust Memorial Museum for a field trip. But our students and their families, 50% of whom do not speak English at home and 75% of whom receive free or reduced meals, were not in a position to fund the trip themselves. And I knew that those who would most benefit from the trip were the ones least likely to be able to afford it. So: I turned to our TI family with a GoFundMe, and you came through. And how. Within a couple of days, we had the funds needed to bring every student on the trip.

The field trip was a real success, thanks to the generosity of this beautiful community. The students were solemn and thoughtful, and many were in tears. Over the following week, they wrote essays about the trip, and it was clear from their writing that they'd been deeply affected by the experience. Many students wrote that seeing the museum exhibits with their own eyes helped them understand *Night* with a new depth.

Thanks to the generosity of our TI community, and the power of the USHMM, these students will go onto college and careers with a meaningful understanding of the Shoah, and of antisemitism. I couldn't be more grateful that so many of you donated, and sent messages of support, and in the case of **Josh Kranzberg** even helped chaperone the trip! Keeping the flame of Holocaust memory alive requires all of us, and I'm so proud of our TI community for helping make this important trip happen.

Rabbi Feinberg to be Honored

TI's own **Rabbi Chuck Feinberg** is being honored by T'ruah the Rabbinic Call for Human Rights with the Founders Award for his prophetic leadership as part of T'ruah's founding generation of rabbis and cantors.

He has been a leader in various social justice arenas, such as the Sanctuary Movement in the 1980s. His congregation in Madison gave refuge for 18 months to a Guatemalan family of six who eventually immigrated to Canada. In Poughkeepsie, Chuck became chair of an important social service agency called Dutchess Outreach. In Vancouver, he was chair of the Multifaith Society. Chuck was the chairperson of the Social Action Committee of the Rabbinical Assembly for six years.

Chuck was the founding executive director of Interfaith Action for Human Rights (IAHR), and now serves as interim executive director. IAHR represents people of faith who educate and advocate in Maryland, DC and Virginia for corrections systems that avoid unnecessarily punitive practices such as solitary confinement.

He will receive the award at T'ruah's 2024 Annual Gala on June 4th, 2024 in New York. The gala can be attended in person or Zoom. For more information, see <u>T'ruah the Rabbinic Call for Human Rights</u>.

Short Term Equipment Loans Available - Susan Catler

Do you need a walker for a few weeks? A wheelchair for a visiting relative? A car booster seat when your grandchild visits? TI may be able to help. We have two wheelchairs, three walkers, a cane, and a car booster seat available for short term loans. Call the office to see if what you need is available when you need it.

If TI does not have what you need, consider contacting Bikur Cholim of Greater Washington before buying something new. BCGW provides free short-term loans of medical equipment for the local Jewish community or for those visiting from out of town, including canes, crutches, toilet seats, commodes, knee scooters, shower seats, side tables, walkers, and wheelchairs. You can request to borrow equipment using the online form on their website (<u>bikurcholimgw.org</u>).

No matter which source you choose, borrowing rather than buying is the ecologically sound choice for short term use.

He is also survived by his wife, Jackie Kuchta, and four adult children: John Joseph, Thomas, Griffith and Kate Wachter.

Dave Wachter was born in August, 1946. He graduated from Montgomery Blair High School, was drafted into the Army in 1964, sent to Vietnam, and served as a cryptographer during the Tet Offensive. When he was discharged and returned stateside, he became active in the peace movement and was arrested during the protests at the University of Maryland in 1970. Dave worked at the Centers for the Handicapped, for the United States Postal Service, for the Veterans Administration helping veterans cope with disabilities and find employment, and then at the U.S. Department of Education for many years.

Israel Fantasies - Simcha Kuritzky

When is a coin not a real coin? When it is either a copy (counterfeit, if made to deceive), pattern, or a fantasy. A copy looks like a real coin, a pattern is a test piece made by an official authority in anticipation of authorization which never comes, while a fantasy claims to be a coin (lists an issuing government and a denomination) but is both unauthorized and does not look like any authorized coin.

I have come across an interesting set of Israel fantasies, produced by the main Dutch Mint of Utrecht in the early 1960s. Unfortunately, this mint did not keep its records from back then, and I have yet to find any contemporary articles or advertisements, so I don't know who paid the Dutch to produce this piece, or how many were produced. But I have a good guess as to why.

Today Israel is known as a prolific issuer of coins and medals, with dozens of circulating coin types and hundreds of commemorative coin types. However, Israel only started producing commemorative coins for collectors in 1958. So in 1962, there were only 42 coin types to collect and 15 medals. Someone could quickly complete such a collection, possibly all in one transaction. So someone decided to add their own pieces for collectors.



The choice of gold for these fantasies is peculiar, because most collectors of Israel coins lived in the United States and Israel, and both countries restricted importation of gold medals. The only gold coin Israel had produced was the 1960 Herzl centennial I£20, which had the same dimensions (22mm diameter, 8 grams of 22K gold) as the British gold sovereign (the most popular gold coin in the Middle East at that time), just under a quarter ounce of gold. It was also the only gold coin legal to own in Israel, and the only Israel gold that was legal to import into the United States in the early 1960s. Israel had started producing gold medals which Israelis were allowed to own. The 1961 Israel bar mitzvah medal shows symbols of the 12 tribes, and was issued in 5, 8, and 15 grams of 18K gold, as well as in silver and bronze.



A paper accompanying the Dutch fantasies proclaimed that these coins were produced to commemorate Israel's fifteenth year. The two coins issued at the beginning of that year (dated 5722/1962) (Continued on page 30)

showed the two kings who ruled at the height of ancient Israel's power, David and Solomon. They are also the only two kings to which the rabbis attributed authorship of Biblical books. Each coin has, on the obverse, the king's name and title in Hebrew at top and English below, with the dates to the side in western numerals. The right-facing crowned bust is purely imaginary as no images or descriptions of their appearance exist. There are probably a few hundred of the 1962 pieces around, and they do show up now and then at auction. They were minted using .900 fine gold, 22.5mm diameter and 6 grams for the 50 shekel denomination and 29mm and 12 grams for the 100 shekel. This means the 50 shekel was 75% of the weight of the Herzl 20 lirot, equal to 15 lirot, which may have also been a reference to Israel's fifteenth year. The reverse shows a *menorah* inside an olive wreath with 12 roundels each showing a symbol of one of the tribes. The denomination in English appears above the *menorah* and 'warns' in Hebrew appears beneath. This design may have been inspired by the 1960 20 lirot and 1961 bar mitzvah medal.



At the end of Israel's fifteenth year (1963/5723), two new 50 shekel fantasy coins (and maybe 100 shekel, but none have been found) were issued with modern Jewish leaders: Theodore Herzl and David Ben Gurion, each described on the fantasy coins as founders of Israel, although the Hebrew just has their name. Herzl is, of course, the grandfather of the State of Israel, forming the Zionist Organization (ZO) in 1897. David Ben Gurion served as the head of Histadrut, the Jewish national labor organization from 1920-33, a position he left to become the head of the Jewish Agency. In that capacity, he announced Israel's independence in 1948. Ben Gurion served as Israel's first Prime Minister until 1953, retiring but then serving again as Prime Minister from 1955-63. Israel law prohibits portraying living individuals even on medals, so no Israel state pieces portrayed Ben Gurion until after his death in 1973/5734. I came across these two pieces in an auction, and have never seen any other examples.

Another fantasy coin was issued a little later in Mexico. It also shows a crowned bust of David, though facing left, and a *menorah* inside an olive wreath, but instead of the twelve tribe symbols, it had two lions supporting the Ten Commandments above and the denomination 100 shekels in English and Hebrew below. This also has the same title and name for King David in Hebrew and English as the Dutch fantasy, but the only date here is in Hebrew 5765 which is 1964/5. I have found these in 42mm 34 gram (over an ounce) gilded silver, and 50mm 40 gram plain silver. A catalog lists a 45mm gold version, but I have never seen one. These fantasies have higher relief than the Dutch pieces, and are much larger. I have not seen an explanation as to why they were produced, but Israel had issued Hanukkah gelt one lira coins from 5719/1958 to 5724/1963, and this was issued one year later, so maybe it was intended to fill in for those coins. These are also scarce.

So in addition to Israel coins and medals, one can collect medallic issues that pretend to be Israel coins. It appears these fantasies were minted to capitalize on the expanding market for Israel collectible coins in the early to mid-1960s, before Israel's coin and medal production became so prolific that there was little need to supplement it.
