People have asked how much of the Schpiel was ChatGPT, and how much did Rabbi Jana write. Compare what we got to the final version.

We asked ChatGPT for the story three times:

- 1. We asked for a noir version of the Esther Story. It was fun, and short, and had too many inaccurate things to use exactly as it was written.
- 2. We asked for a noir radio version of the Esther Story with music. We thought that maybe it would suggest good music to use, or even have links to music we didn't know, we never used ChatGPT before. It was cool to see the radio version and we even imagined doing sound effects, etc. It did not tell us which songs to use, just descriptions of songs, such as "eerie music." That wasn't what we needed.
- 3. The first two versions of the Esther story it provided did not include anything about Vashti, so we asked for a noir version of the Vashti story for the Book of Esther. This one was more complete, but very boring, and not very noir.

Here are the complete responses we got from ChatGPT
