Tree of Life



Tu B'Shevat (the fifteenth of the Hebrew month of Shevat) is designated as the birthday of the trees. We are given the opportunity to focus on and celebrate trees. We get to stop and truly look at them and appreciate them. Trees provide us with food, shelter, comfort, and they purify our air. During our Tu B'Shevat Seder we examine these attributes and others.

As you look at trees this month, think about ways in which we are like parts of a tree. In our families, I think that the roots are our elders and ancestors. They keep us grounded, and draw our sustenance. The parents are like the trunk since they bind us to the generations, help us to achieve great heights, and protect us. The children are our branches. They are eager to explore new directions. Together they produce the fruit that will perpetuate the family, and leaves that fly away, leaving signs of the family wherever they land. Sometimes families are flexible like willows in the face of challenges, and sometimes families stand strong like oaks. The family is a tree of life. [Continued on page 7]


Shreveport Jewish Music Month



From Our Librarian Judith Grunes

When is a cookbook not just a cookbook? When it is a Jewish cookbook - full of history and traditions and memories and innovations on a theme. Thanks to the Jewish book fair held at B'Nai Zion last November, the library acquired more cookbooks to add to our collection. The Hadassah Jewish Holiday Cookbook: Traditional Recipes from Contemporary Kosher Kitchens lives up to its promise in the title. "In every facet of our nourishment, we celebrate the future by digesting the past. Make no mistake," says the book cover, "tradition survives only in the observance of it." The Book of New Israeli Food: A Culinary Journey is irresistible from its cover displaying a wooden bowl of pomegranates to its pages of Israeli natural history. "The Bible is brimming with food, used for welcoming friends and appeasing enemies, for seduction and bribery, for comfort and religious rituals. Food or the lack of it, often played a pivotal role in Jewish history" says this cookbook. Add these foods to those of their Arab neighbors, mix Ashkenazi and Sephardic cookery, and a dollop of modern trends in a modern state and you have some hint of what you will find in this cookbook. Then, how can you resist a book entitled The Gefilte Variations? In keeping with our modernization theme, this book gives you 200 recipes that are "reinterpretations of traditional dishes designed for everyday meals as well as holidays." We are talking breakfasts and brunches, soups and fish, meatless meals, dairy dishes, sweet kugels and desserts. In the Holocaust Survival Cookbook, the

arrangement deviates from the normal structure of separating recipes by category. Recipes are grouped by the contributing family and the story of survival that goes with the recipes is more than coequal to the recipes themselves. You need to use the index to find a specific recipe but I recommend reading and using the book the way it is laid out. Anna Kledstadt, born in Germany in 1886, escaped to Holland in 1939 and finally came to the U.S. When she lived in Hawaii, she witnessed the bombing of Family Midrash Says... of course Pearl Harbor. Anna's granddaughter gave the authors Anna's recipe for marzipan chocolate cake as well as her own lemon almond cake recipe. Faye Rothstein Toporek was born in Poland and spent years in the Lodz Ghetto until it was liberated and she was sent to Birkenau. She survived with a brother and sister but passed away in 1970 at the age of 47. Her daughter sent in Faye's recipe for cottage cheese salad, as well as her own recipe for matzo stuffing. Come read for yourself the stories of the survivors and the survivor families and the foods that bound them together.

For lighter reading I recommend a series of novels by Sharon Kahn. These lighthearted and light mysteries involve Ruby the rabbi's wife. Technically, Ruby is no longer a rabbi's wife as her husband was killed. She remains at Temple Rita (and there is another funny story behind the name of the Temple), putting up with the likes of the whiney Rabbi Kevin and the President -for-Life of the Temple Board, Essie Sue, while making her living as a co-owner of a bagel shop and a fledgling internet business in

Eternal, Texas. Thank goodness she always finds the time to get involved in murder mysteries and solve them with wit and grit. How can you resist with titles such as : Fax Me a Bagel; Never Nosh a Matzo Ball; Don't Cry for Me, Hot Pastrami; Which Big Giver Stole the Chopped Liver?; and Out of the Frying Pan, Into the Choir.


In a Jewish bookstore in Florida this summer, I discovered a series of children's books, called The written and published in Brooklyn. This series is age appropriate with help from fourth grade to sixth. I began the library's collection with the five books in the Tenach that follow the Torah, ie., Joshua, Judges, I & II Samuel and I Kings. The illustrations may be in black and white, and the print ordinary block, but these books are brimming with details and additions based upon Rashi, Rishonim and Midrashim. It asks and answers many questions in its analysis of the literature of the Bible. There are keys to the quizzes, a glossary, and a selection in Hebrew in each of the books in this series. All of the books are written from a literalist, Orthodox viewpoint but can add much to your child's education into our sacred books. In religious school, we do cover the topics in these books on the prophets so it becomes a double whammy. One of our best readers in our Temple family has already begun reading the set before I even cataloged it.

Shabbat Shirah — a Sabbath of Song



Friday February 6 will begin Shabbat Shirah — The Sabbath of Song. The Torah portion sings the oldest recorded song in history (when we celebrated after crossing the Sea of Reeds to our freedom). During services on Friday evening a variety of melodies will fill our service. Our new Jewish Choir will lead us in harmonious song. B'nai Zion will continue to sing through Shabbat morning service with Rabbi Jana and Virginia. Come sing a new song to God — and some old songs too.

Torah Shabbat



This year it will be 6:30 PM, Wednesday, April 8 at B'nai Zion.

Food will be cooked with the help of students from the Culinary School of Career/Technical College. We will be teaching them about keeping kosher.
