WHAT DO YOU EXPECT?

When I counsel young couples who want to get married, I talk to them a lot about expectations. I point out that everyone has expectations — like if her family always went out to a restaurant for birthdays, and his family always gave gifts (even silly ones), when he buys her a perfect gift, but doesn't take her to a restaurant, she feels like something is missing. Neither of them may realize what it is, or that their expectations aren't being met, but it can cause a person to feel like something is missing in their relationship, and yet it is an easy thing to fix.

I also try very hard to listen for expectations when I am helping a family with life cycle events. Often there are things that the family or individuals in the family are expecting, but don't always realize it. Like having a certain song that they always remember being sung. In order for their dreams to come true and their expectations to be met, they have to do some of their thinking out loud — they have to tell me.

Please think about your expectations. Think about how they affect relationships, but also think about how they affect you getting your needs fulfilled at B'nai Zion. Please tell me if there are things that you find really endearing that we do or have done at B'nai Zion — or things you wish we would do that you have seen elsewhere, or new ideas that you would like to try out.

There are other kinds of expectations that I would like you to share with me. For example, no one likes to think about their own funeral or that of a loved one, but while you are still here to discuss it, think about what your expectations are. Are there specific poems or prayers that you would like to have read? Are there things that you would prefer not be done? Are there things that you would hope would be in your obituary? Are there things you would like said about your loved one in a eulogy? At B'nai Zion we file away these requests for when we need them. Not many people think ahead to make requests, but it would be helpful if they did.

You can talk to me about expectations or write them down, but try to acknowledge for yourself what your expectations are, and once you recognize them, share them with others who care about you. I know that I can't please everyone all the time. I do know that if I am being honored by leading someone in a worship experience, or officiating at a life cycle event, I would hate not to fulfill whatever your expectations are. I can only do that if I know what they are. So tell me, what do you expect?

FROM OUR EDUCATOR, HELAINE BRAUNIG

If you've been at B'nai Zion on a Sunday morning this year, you've probably noticed how many very young children we have in our school. Bethany Sorkey's class of three and four year olds has twelve inquisitive students, and Kris Haas's Kindergarten/First Grade class has another eight. If you add to that the fact that we have another eleven on the list for our pre-Religious School class (infants and toddlers who aren't yet three years old), what strikes you is that about 50% of our students (and soon-to-be students) are under the age of seven. It's a demographic that we've not seen in the last 25 years, and it reminds me that we must always be engaged in assessing who we are and what we need. To that end, I'd like to ask that parents of the children in this group come to a special meeting Sunday, March 22 to talk about the things that we can do, outside of Religious School, to help your young children find joy in their synagogue life. Whether their families attend B'nai Zion or Agudath Achim, we need to know what our institutions can do to support the families of our youngest students.

I'd like to suggest a similar meeting for parents of our older students. We have the smallest number of students in second grade and above, and our task often seems difficult because when just a few children are absent, our teachers' plans are sometimes crippled. What will work with a group of seven students does not always work with two or three. And what does the teacher do when there are only four students to start with? If we are to do our best for the students and families in our Shreveport Jewish community, we need to look at the challenges that we face and work together to meet them.

In the meantime, our Religious School year is passing rapidly, and two of our most loved holidays will be here before we know it. On Sunday, March 8, FOLLOWING RELIGIOUS SCHOOL, the community will enjoy its annual Purim Carnival. It takes hard work by so many people to make the Carnival the huge success that it is, so please say "yes" when someone asks you to help. The carnival will begin AFTER parents pick up their kids from Religious School at 12:15. Here's an example of a community event whose time had to be changed due to the demographics mentioned earlier. No teacher can be responsible for kids drawn in many directions by the intriguing games, face painting, and food. With activities outside the building as well as inside, parents must be responsible for their own kids' comings and goings during the Purim carnival.

On March 22, students will spend part of their morning learning to cook delicious Passover recipes, and on March 29 we'll have a Model Seder for young children. Again we'll need your help, so email me at braunigw@aol.com to let me know that you are available to help us.

By the way, if my email address is not in YOUR email address book, please add it right now. Email is the easiest way for most of us to communicate, but communication does not just mean that *you* read email from me. I am delighted when you write to tell me what great things your child's teachers are doing, whether the teacher is the regular classroom teacher, an enrichment teacher (art or cooking or an invited guest), or the rabbi. I love to pass the compliments on to the faculty, and of course if you have concerns, I want to address those as well.

Looking forward to seeing you play an active role in the Religious School.

If you prefer to be called about things like funerals, etc., please call the office to make sure we have your current phone number and let us know not to email you. Let us know if you are willing to help make a few calls.


PEOPLE OF THE BOOK CLUB

RABBI GIL NATIV FROM OMER, ISRAEL RETURNS TO SHREVEPORT



March is busy at North Louisiana Jewish Federation

Rabbi Dr.Gil Nativ, from Congregation Magen Avraham, in Omer, Israel Shreve-port's "sister city" through the North Louisiana Jewish Federation will be visiting again. His visit last year was entertaining and informative. We look forward to this year's presentation.

A third-generation Sabra born in Haifa, Dr. Nativ served in the IDF as a paratrooper and participated in the liberation of the old city of Jerusalem in 1967. He was educated at Haifa University, Hebrew University, and HUC-JIR. He has taught at a variety of venues including Leo Baeck College in London and the University of Judaism in Los Angeles, and has served as a congregational rabbi in Ohio, the United Kingdom, and Israel.

His talk will include photos and information on the ongoing activities of Magen Avraham as well as on how the community coped with the missile attacks during the recent war in Gaza. Everyone is invited to attend Monday, March 16, 7:30 PM at Agudath Achim. There is no charge.

PURIM FUN FOR THE FAMILY



Purim - Literally: lots, like a lottery. Haman used the "lot method" to choose which day the Jews would die.

-- Can you think of other times that people use lots for choosing? **Megillah (pl. Megillot)** - Literally: scroll. There are five *megillot* in the Bible.

The one read on Purim is Megillat Esther.

- Do you know what the other megillot are?

Grogger - Noisemaker used to drown out Haman's name. In Hebrew it is called a "Ra'ashan." You can make noisemakers out of many things. In some places people bring loud musical instruments to help blot out the sound of Haman's name.

--Some people write "Haman" on the bottom of their shoes on Purim so that they can "stomp out" the name of Haman. Try it -- by the end of the day, the name is stomped off your shoes.





Purim Schpiel - Humorous play put on at Purim.

-- We are always looking for some good "kosher hams" who want to help us act out the Purim story in fun ways. Start thinking about next year's play.




Mishlo'ach Manot - also referred to as "Shalach Manos - Sending portions of food to friends to celebrate the holiday.

-- Purim is a holiday when we get dressed in costumes and then GIVE food away, instead of trying to get food. Don't worry, there is plenty for us to eat also.

Hamantashen - Filled three-cornered pastries supposed to represent Haman's hat. There are many possibilities for Hamantashen filling. Which ones have you tried? Do you have any ideas for flavors you haven't tried yet? Our students learn how to make hamantashen with Judith Grunes. Yum!

Religious School students will be doing special art projects which will be used at the seder.

We are getting great prices on food from the Albertsons on Southfield. They will try to stock Kosher for Passover food this year, too. The meal will be cooked by supervised students of the Culinary Cooking Classes of the Caddo Career Technology Center.

PROVIDENCE HOUSE SHELTER MITZVAH PROJECT





CYBER SECURITY

A recent presentation at Agudath Achim showed ways to protect ourselves and our children from identity theft and online computer crimes.

Statistics show that 6 out of 10 kids under 15 years old have already been approached online. 80% of all children ages 7-18 receive inappropriate email, instant messages or text messages on a daily basis. Our email and postal mail boxes are inundated with tricks and scams from various predators.

In order to protect our children locally there is a task force made up of local law enforcement and Federal agencies. www.MarshalsforKids.com is the local site. They have information for kids (even games and videos) and for parents (like finding out where registered sex offenders live near you. You can sign up for free public safety email alerts. Their phone number is 741-8888.

We have become a society that relies on computers. Make sure that your children know how to stay safe. Please remember that kids can go to their parents or their rabbi for help if they are concerned about inappropriate behavior.


B'nai Zion Gets Rewarded When You Shop



Kroger is starting to look pretty good. Not only are they doing a lot of renovation to modernize the store, and they have a larger selection of Kosher foods, but they have a new program that lets B'nai Zion earn money each time you shop.

This is truly a win-win situation. When you shop at Kroger, B'nai Zion can get a check based on how much money we spend each year at Kroger. You don't have to be a member of B'nai Zion to use this program and let B'nai Zion get the reward. Tell all of your friends and family.

First, you need to have a Kroger Plus Card. Present this page with the B'nai Zion barcode shown below and your Kroger Plus Card to your cashier upon checkout. After they have scanned the barcode and your Kroger Plus Card you will be enrolled for the current year of the Kroger Neighbor to Neighbor Donation Program. Every time you shop at Kroger and use your enrolled Kroger Plus Card, Kroger will contribute a percentage of your eligible purchases to the Kroger Neighbor to Neighbor Donation fund. Once a card is scanned with the barcode, it will be active through April 30. You will need to scan it again in May to have your purchases count for the new Kroger year. The Kroger Neighbor to Neighbor Donation Program will donate \$1 million annually. B'nai Zion will earn a percentage of the \$1 million equal to the percentage of total earned contributions attributable to that organization. If you shop at Kroger anyway, this will give B'nai Zion "free" money.



- \$ The Kroger year goes from May I through April 30 and you have to show your barcode again to qualify each year.
- \$ You can only participate in one Neighbor to Neighbor Kroger Donation Program. If you had scanned a barcode earlier in the year for a different organization, and then you scan B'nai Zion's barcode, only B'nai Zion will get the points toward the "reward."
- \$ You only need to show the B'nai Zion barcode once per year (remember their year starts May I).
- \$ You don't have to carry your KrogerPlus card to get the points you can give the cashier your phone number and you will get the Kroger discounts, and B'nai Zion will get our reward. You can even do this at the self-check-out counters.
- \$ If you can't find the barcode from this page, or just want more copies to share with friends and family, we have extra copies at B'nai Zion, and you can download the barcode at http://www.krogerneighbortoneighbor.com/pdf/10000083728.pdf.
