

From our Rabbi, Jana De Benedetti

Children of Zion are Joyful -- B'nai Zion is Joyful

ובני ציון גילו ושמחו

I have often wondered about the name of our congregation: B'nai Zion. I know that it means "Children of Zion" or "Sons of Zion." I don't understand why we chose to keep the first word in Hebrew, but the second word in English. In Hebrew, the second word should be pronounced like "tzee-yon" but we use the English pronunciation. Why did we choose to spell the first word with an "a" in the middle -- many people look at it and think that it rhymes with "shy." I also don't understand why sometimes it is written with a capital N in the middle of the first word. That would be like writing: SOns of Zion. It is interesting that a congregation that loves to be spiritual in English uses a Hebrew name.

The other part of the name that is difficult, is trying to explain what "Zion" means. When I try to explain what it means, I say that it represents our core and our foundation. In Biblical texts it sometimes represents a place (where the Temple was built, where we received Torah), and also represents something more abstract than a specific location. Zion is an awesome thing throughout our Scriptures, for example: "For out of Zion came forth the Torah" is one of the phrases we repeat and reinforce each time we return the Torah, and it obviously isn't trying to be pinpointing a specific place. Zion *IS* the first part of "Zionism" which includes being supportive of having a Jewish homeland -- ideally in the Biblical Promised Land. Knowing what we do about the history of the congregation, the founders of this congregation were probably not thinking about Zionism when they chose the name. Let me know what you think is a good way to explain what "Zion" means.

While studying Torah every Saturday we never come upon the phrase "B'nai Zion." However, in the books of Joel, Psalms, and Lamentation, we do find it. In Psalms 149:2, it says, "let the children of Zion be joyful in their Sovereign." In Lamentations 4:2, it says, "The precious children of Zion, comparable to fine gold, how are they considered as earthen pitchers, the work of the hands of the potter!"

My favorite source for the name of the Congregation is from the Prophet Joel, where it says, "And Children of Zion: rejoice and be glad in Adonai, y'all's God." I love the fact that the Children of Zion are joyful and glad. I think that our Congregation is definitely a joyful congregation. The most exciting part to me about that quote as a source of inspiration about our Congregation isn't just how well it represents us, but how well we represent it. Let me explain... We have been talking for more than a year about the possibility of renovating the sanctuary. Our new millennium "bottoms" could use some new millennium chair bottoms; the lighting needs to be updated; the acoustics could use a lot of help -- and possibly we could modify our pulpit and our Ark to reflect our Spiritual needs today. In thinking about what would be a spiritually inspiring Ark, we looked at the Ark in the old B'nai Zion temple building on Cotton. The current Ark says in Hebrew above the doors: "Know before Whom you stand," which is lovely and inspirational. The old Ark said: "Rejoice and be glad in Adonai." Hopefully by now you recognize that quote as referring specifically to B'nai Zion (the Children of Zion -- **us**).

I still wonder what kind of design we would use on a new ark to be both spiritually inspiring and reflecting of our values as a congregation. Recently people seem to especially like the idea of a Tree of Life. Perhaps we should go back to our "roots" and include the Biblical quote about B'nai Zion being joyous and glad in Adonai. Whether it says it on the Ark, I still believe that being joyful and rejoicing truly represents this Congregation, which obviously truly represents the joyful B'nai Zion: "Children of Zion."

From our President, Fred Kent

What a year! As I look back it was exciting from start to finish. I attribute the success to our dedicated Rabbi. Rabbi Jana does such a good job with all of our members and truly cares. She works with our children of all ages, including fun Tot Shabbat experiences, training for Bar and Bat Mitzvah, and Confirmation -- changing their lives. She will sacrifice to do whatever it takes to accomplish the task at hand. I am so proud of her and our congregation.

I could also not have made it without our Board, and especially my Vice President, Mitch Newstadt, who has the experience and tenacity to work on all of the small details that keep things running smoothly.

Some of the people who work tirelessly behind the scenes are: Bethany Sorkey, who leads our Sisterhood and all of the beautiful work that they do; Harriet Glazer, who has made our Shabbat blessings and Oneg Shabbat radiate with our members; David Brainis, who has made our 50-year-old facility work with by giving it a little TLC; Todd Muslow, who oversees our accounting with the hard work of Ardis Robison; and Brotherhood president, Joe Badt Jr. for leading our kitchen crew on what seems to be a monthly basis.

For more than half of the years that we have been in this building, our Religious School program has been led with the devotion and dedication of Helaine Braunig. This year she was responsible for 66 students in our program, plus organizing social events for the pre-school children and their parents.

Our leaders of yesterday were thinking of us today. Our traditions are so beautiful and have been time tested.

Our goals and priorities are:

- ✧ Maintaining a well-rounded Jewish environment for our children and adult members.
- ✧ Providing Sabbath and holiday services that inspire the soul.
- ✧ Providing life cycle ceremonies to nurture the spirit.
- ✧ Providing Jewish community events to bring our congregation closer.
- ✧ Educating and motivating our children and adults in order to continue to preserve the values we cherish and embrace.

Our economic picture is strong with a number of our members raising their dues in a tough economic time. Our Board of Directors increased their dues by an average of 56%, while we have eight families investing over \$5,000 annually. This has made the difference in our current survival. The prediction is that our membership will decrease from 200 families to 130 over the next 10 years. If we are not prepared, then B'nai Zion will only be a memory. My goal for 2009 is not to take one dollar from the Endowment Fund in order to allow it to recover and then grow to protect our financial future.

At this time we want to thank our Board members for their service to B'nai Zion. Their work and dedication has been an inspiration to the entire congregation. The array of service, programs and events that we provide is due to the devotion and the time that all of these people give to make it happen. It is our volunteers who work so hard. They truly have a sense of purpose and I thank you all for everything you do for our congregation.

From our Educator, Helaine Braunig

I'm so delighted to tell you that twenty-one (at last count) of our children and teenagers will spend a part of the summer at Henry S. Jacobs Camp. In addition, I know of one student who will attend Blue Star in North Carolina, and we have a group of very young children who will get their first taste of Jewish summer camp by attending Camp Chai in our own community. What could be better than knowing that our kids will continue to learn about and experience Judaism through Jewish camping? Research tells us that kids who attend Jewish summer camps are more likely than others to assume positions of leadership in synagogues, federations, and other Jewish organizations when they reach adulthood.

At the end of June Judith Grunes will represent our faculty at the conference on Jewish Education sponsored by the Institute of Southern Jewish Life. We are so fortunate to retain Judith on our faculty year after year; when she attends conferences, not only does she bring back the latest ideas for Religious School teaching, but also she shares the wisdom that she has accumulated in her more than 25 years of teaching.

Hope your summer includes a Jewish book, a Jewish film, a visit to a spot of Jewish interest, or even just a moment to relish Shabbat with your family. Religious School classes will resume in August – see you then, if not before!


Rabbi Representing B'nai Zion in the Community




CAMP CHAI



Learn Hebrew with Rabbi Jana

Learn or review the Aleph Bet by examining the first day of Creation from the Book of Genesis and the Decalogue from the Book of Exodus. Insights from Hebrew Scriptures that can never be seen in English translations will be learned while looking at shapes and sounds of Hebrew letters, and examining sentence and grammatical structure. No previous knowledge of Hebrew is required, but it is a great introduction for being able to read along with the prayer book, or for further Biblical, Liturgical, or Modern Hebrew studies. 
