Our member's average increase this past year was 21% with our board of directors leading by increasing over 56%. This has prevented B'nai Zion from being in a financial crisis and giving us the opportunity to plan for our future. Our long term dilemma is our aging congregation that will change our revenue dramatically in 10 years. Our only way to survive is to increase our endowment to a 4 million dollar level to generate a 5% annual distribution to stabilize our future dues loss.

I ask that you consider making an Endowment gift to ensure that B'nai Zion is here not only today but we also intend to have it here for our children and grandchildren. We have a long history and a tradition that is vital to our community.

Our annual investments keep the B'nai Zion process running all year, from Worship services to Religious Education, administrative and building operations. The Endowment fund ensures that B'nai Zion will continue to be a strong Jewish presence as we grow older, and allows the next generations to appreciate the Congregation that those who came before us established. As we end the Holy Days and approach a new fiscal year, please recognize that our needs and responsibilities grow as time passes. Your contributions are vital to us.

From our Educator

What a great beginning to the Religious School year! We've seen fifty kids ranging in age from three to fourteen. In addition, because we hosted a Preschool Parent Breakfast and Play Group, we've actually seen seven more who are under the age of three. That doesn't count the three teenagers who have helped us in classrooms on Sunday mornings, so now we're up to sixty kids from B'nai Zion and Agudath Achim who have begun a year of Jewish education and Jewish friendships. Not bad for a small Jewish community! We are especially glad to welcome to Shreveport Vanessa and Andrew Schachtel and their children, five year old Adyn and two year old Adysn.

Our year has started with so much activity. Adam Miller's 8th and 9th grade class has been totally rejuvenated by their young, energetic teacher. Though their field trip to visit Oakland Cemetery (the oldest burial place for Jews in Shreveport) and to clean up Greenwood Cemetery prior to the High Holy Days was canceled due to rain, they have been busy in the classroom talking about what it means to be Jewish and planning a year which will include visits to houses of worship for Christians, Muslims, and Hindus.

Barbara Joseph's 6th and 7th graders have already been to the beautiful Right-to-Play playground established by Karen Gordon so that children with disabilities can play alongside their non-disabled friends. There they learned that dreams become realities only through determination and hard work—and they also helped with some gardening and cleanup of the play area. Judith Grunes' 4th and 5th graders, along with some of their parents, experienced the first-ever Rosh Hashanah Seder to take place at B'nai Zion. The Seder is a recently-reinvented ceremony based on a Talmudic practice of eating certain fruits and vegetables at the Rosh Hashanah meal. That event could not have taken place were it not for the efforts of Rabbi Jana, Bill Braunig, Yehudit Platt, and Alison Bath. That same group of students also baked beautiful round challot for the New Year, thanks to the culinary expertise of Mrs. Grunes and Rebecca Austin, who made the delicious challah dough. Jodi Vosburg's 2nd and 3rd graders and Kris Haas' K-5 and 1st graders have been learning about Jewish holidays, visiting the Art Room, where Katherine Mahler is already doing her magic, and singing their hearts out with our newest, guitar-playing teacher, Isaac Haas. Bethany Sorkey's 3 and 4 year olds have been learning about Judaism as they play and eat and sing as only young preschoolers can. Leigh Anne Evensky and Delaney Lake are Bethany's helpers, and they are fabulous with the children.

October's first event will be the decoration of the Sukkah and the Sukkot Family Night service on Friday, October 2. Reservations are required for the dinner, but you may join us for decorating and praying at no cost! Our Sukkot dinner is one of the year's most popular: baked potatoes with lots of toppings, a generous salad bar, and yummy ice cream sundaes for dessert. Hope you'll be there to join us.

On October 9 we'll have Consecration of our K-5 class: Arden Brainis, Ryan Dalto, Jacob Garfunkel, Lila Mahler, Milena Murov, Maddy Myers, and Adyn Schachtel. Please join us as we hear these sweet young voices recite the Shema as they stand beneath a tallit during our Simchat Torah service.

We have so much to be grateful for—dedicated teachers, committed parents, and energetic children and young adults—all with a desire to experience Judaism on Sundays, on Shabbat, and throughout the weekdays. May it be a wonderful year of growth for all of us.


Winter Family Camp

Special Sukkot Torah Study: Ecclesiastes Saturday, October 3 9:45 AM

Sukkot is a Hebrew word which means "booths" or "huts" like the ones that the Brotherhood has built for us behind B'nai Zion and on the Bimah. It is also the name of the Jewish Festival that comes five days after Yom Kippur. One Mitzvah (Commandment) for Sukkot is "Leshev BaSukkah." Some people understand this to mean that they should "dwell in the Sukkah," and actually sleep in theirs. The Rabbis tell us that just eating a small amount in a Sukkah will fulfill the Mitzvah.

During the week of Sukkot, please come, bring a meal and eat in the Sukkah whenever you want. Our Brotherhood builds the Sukkah so that the whole congregation can use it during the holiday.

We also have sets of Lulav (myrtle, palm, willow and etrog) at B'nai Zion for you to shake in order to fulfill the Mitzvah of the Lulav. If you don't know how, or have never done it before, just ask. We are happy to show you what to do.

There is a tradition to read the Book of Ecclesiastes on Sukkot, so our Torah Study beginning at 9:45 on Saturday, October 3 will be filled with words of wisdom and discussions based on the book known as Kohelet in Hebrew. The Torah Study will be followed by special Sukkot morning services from Mishkan Tefillah beginning around 11:00 AM.

Simchat Torah / Shabbat (includes Yizkor and Consecration)
Evening Service: Friday, October 9 6:00 PM
Tot Shabbat Service: Saturday, October 10 9:00 AM



We read through the entire cycle of Torah portions every year. We read the last section of Deuteronomy and then immediately read the first portion of Genesis to show the continuity of the Torah. This is celebrated at Simchat Torah -- which means "Joy of Torah." Simchat Torah falls at the end of Sukkot. We take out the Torah scrolls and march and dance and sing with them to show our joy. Since it is the last day of a Biblically ordained Festival, we will remember those who have died (Yizkor) as part of the service.

As is the custom in many congregations, we also have a Consecration ceremony for our new Kindergarten students. It is important to come and celebrate Simchat Torah and show our young families our support and pride in their commitment to Jewish learning. We hope you will be celebrating with us.

Before our 9:45 AM Torah Study and 11:00 AM Simchat Torah morning service (with Yizkor again), we will be worshipping in a service geared toward our youngest members and their families. Tot Shabbat service will be from 9:00 - 9:30 AM on Saturday, October 10. It will give our youngest children a chance to end the festival of Sukkot by shaking the lulay, and celebrate Simchat Torah by dancing with the Torah. Rabbi Jana will lead the festivities and worship.
