

From our Rabbi

You Can't Be Serious New research suggests that the best way to stay healthy and happy is not to participate in organized religion. After all these years of people

suggesting that organized religion is the source of all hatred and destruction in the world, researchers have finally agreed that if we avoid religion and religious observance, the world would be a happier, healthier place.

As you can imagine, the Reform Movement is one of the first to jump on this new attitude. After all, for 200 years we have been fighting with people to attend services, and we have been allowing congregants to get away with as little Jewish observance as possible in order to be happy. From the beginning,

Reform Judaism has been all about avoiding traditions, so this move fits in well with a reforming philosophy.

Obviously, in addition, by not supporting organized religion, we all keep more money for ourselves, and that makes us much happier. It doesn't take a genius to realize that focusing on our own desires, instead of the needs of others around us, is the best way to be happy.

When I presented these studies to our Board, they were thrilled. They realized that people don't like to come to services anyway. The Board decided to meet less often, since a reduction in organized religion meant fewer financial worries and fewer programs and events for the congregation. The best decision they ever made was to choose to give everyone more time to do all the other things that they wanted, and not have calendars full of B'nai Zion obligations.

How will these new changes affect each individual congregant? Time will tell, but for now, children don't need to learn about the history of Judaism, and certainly don't need to reinforce ways to use Jewish values in their lives. No one needs to attend services, because there are so many other more meaningful ways to get together with each other – or even to avoid each other altogether. And the most important way to be happy is to avoid Purim services and the

Purim carnival. Organized religion should never have scheduled a time to focus on unbridled happiness. Judaism should never have taught us to be so happy that we can't tell the difference between blessing Mordechai and cursing Haman, or seeing the difference between being silly and being real. After all, Judaism couldn't have survived for thousands of years if we allowed ourselves to be ridiculous sometimes.

Judaism has long taught that doing things to make us happy is the key to our survival. Look it up: in our Scriptures, thousands of years ago (in the Book of Proverbs) it says:

"A joyful heart is good medicine, but a broken spirit dries up the bones." (Proverbs 17:22)

So remember to be joyful, and to get silly, and trust the lessons that we have learned from Judaism.

From our Educator

Stumbling is something I fear. Whether I'm out running or working on a project, I don't want to fall down. Nonetheless, it happens. Sometimes it's just a plain old accident, the unavoidable toe-in-the-sidewalk-crack or the choice of a wrong meeting time or place that results in poor attendance at a critical meeting. Sometimes it happens when I take my eye off the target, whether that's the next mile marker at a race (and I look instead at the bands playing music or the cheering supporters) or the timeline of a program or project. Just the momentary focus on other things, and then I'm down. However, if it's a race, I jump right



up, figure out if anything other than my pride is hurt (usually not), and resume running. I've stumbled recently, but not while running. I've stumbled in my effort to partner with ISJL on a project called "Repair the World." I let my focus move to other things. Some — like the Community Chanukah Party — or the visits of my grandchildren—really needed my attention. You might even concur that things like cleaning my office really needed my attention. However it happened, I put on hold our community's involvement with a pilot project for ISJL that I am really excited about.

Stumbling is something I fear, but I always get up. Now is the time to re-group and return to our task. We got off to a great start with a visit from Malkie Schwartz, ISJL's director of community engagement. We had a good turnout for a first meeting. It was informative and inspiring, and we had teens as well as their parents, plus a few others of various ages. We decided that we could make a difference in Shreveport in the field of education—if we took the next step and interviewed people who work with kids to find out what Shreveport is NOT doing to help children succeed in school. We were even lucky enough to get a commitment from Jodi Hyman to be part of a leadership team for the project.

And that's where I stumbled. I couldn't find the right time for the next meeting, and I wasn't sure I was targeting the right people to get involved. I thought it might be a good project for young congregants, those in their 20s and 30s, but I discovered that their work schedules and obligations to their young families made it hard for them to commit to bi-monthly meetings and occasional webinars. I wasn't sure which age group within our community might have both time and interest in social action, so I just took my eye off the ball, and I stayed busy with other things.

When January arrived, I, like all the rest of you, made a few resolutions. One of them was to get back on track with "Repair the World" because I know that we are God's partners, I know Shreveport has significant problems that we can help solve, I know we have Jodi's enthusiasm and our rabbi's support, and finally, I know I like Malkie. Now it's time to turn our attention away from our congregation's operation (the Purim Carnival is in the capable hands of Melissa Gillum, Kathy Plante, and the rest of you who will come forward to help) so that we can—in February—work through the process of choosing a direction for "repairing the world." How will we do it? I moved this project to the top of my list, and I am asking you to help me so that we can all become God's partners.

February is here, and Purim isn't until the end of the month. Let's get back on track by getting together on Sunday, Feb.3 at 9:45 AM at B'nai Zion. Yes, it's Super Bowl Sunday, but we can't lose our focus. Make your party food ahead of time! We need people of all ages to join us as we tap the networks of people we know who can help us identify needs. We will readjust our timeline, and we will take the next steps. We will "repair the world." It's our sacred mission.

Buy a Mezuzah, (available in the gift shop and online). It's fun. And it's a mitzvah!






Are We Up for the Challenge?





Getting the News to You

We get many compliments on the bulletin -- especially now that it is in full-color. The bulletin comes out once a month. We often have important news to relay or reminders to announce in the middle of the month. We announce major events during services, but if you miss services you will miss the announcements.



Sometimes there are events that come up beyond the time it becomes practical to put the information in the bulletin or during announcements at services -- for example when someone dies during the week, the death and burial may both occur between Shabbats. The Board suggests that we join the practice of most other Reform congregations and send you important information by email.

We also now have the ability to send you donation information, yahrzeit reminders, even dues statements by email. This can be an advantage to the office for many reasons: speed: no need to stuff and stamp and sort envelopes; cost: the price of mailing is increasing again, and the postal service is requiring that we use specialized technology to print and label outgoing mail. These are only a few of the reasons we would like to increase our use of technology to keep you informed.

Please send us an email to confirm that you have changed our address in your contact list and so that we can be sure that we have your email address. You can indicate if you would like to help us reduce our time and costs by receiving notifications, bills, and donations via email.



We also try to post news online at our website, www.BnaiZionCongregation.org and on our Facebook pages.



Of course, if you do not have ways to connect with us "electronically," we will be happy to continue to send you bulletins, and all statements by mail. Please let us know if you want phone calls concerning important events, and if you would be willing to be part of a phone squad. We are not planning to eliminate mail versions, but we do hope to significantly reduce the amount of mail that we send out and be more efficient. Let us know if this will work for you.







People of The Book Club

There will be no meeting of The People of the Book club in February. The next meeting will be Tuesday, March 12, 7 PM. We will discuss *When General Grant Expelled the Jews* by Jonathan Sarna. This is non-fiction, by a preeminent Jewish historian - Professor Sarna teaches at Brandeis. The book has 224 pages and is available in paperback and e-reader editions. This is a compelling, even inspiring, tale of redemption. "Akin to the biblical seer Balaam," Sarna remarks, "[Grant] had been expected to curse the Jews and ended up blessing them." This fine work is a heartening reminder that even politicians are sometimes touched by the better angels of their nature, and a welcome revision to the 18th president's place in American and Jewish history.

There will be no meeting in April. The meeting Tuesday, May 7 will discuss *A Tale of Love and Darkness* by Amos Oz - a memoir by one of Israel's most respected contemporary authors.
