From our Rabbi

We are entering a momentous month for our congregation. We celebrate Defining Moments birthdays and anniversaries. We end our school year. We honor graduates.

We continue counting until we reach Shavuot when we celebrate the receiving of the Torah with our Confirmands, and we remember those whom we loved and are no longer with us.

This May we also begin renovation of our sanctuary. It is an awesome thing to create our own sacred space. We are very pleased that the congregation came to see the new designs and the vast majority really found the ideas inspiring and lovely. We are anticipating the construction work to be completed by the end of summer. How exciting it is to imagine worshipping in a new sacred space for Rosh HaShanah, the beginning of the New Year.

There is still one aspect of the project that really needs your input – the design of the Ark. The Holy Ark is the focal point of the sanctuary and the source of inspiration. We have been thinking about this a long time, but have not yet heard from enough of you to finalize a design. What picture or word or design would you find the most inspiring? What element or elements of Judaism do you find are the core of what represents us?

What would you like to see as we worship together when you come to our sanctuary? Some of the ideas we feel strongly about are: ☐Burning Bush; \square Creation (six days); Decalogue (Ten Commandments); ☐Tree of Life; ☐ Holiday symbols (specify); ☐ Life Cycle symbols (specify); □ your thoughts.... We also have to decide on a quote above the Ark that inspires us. Our previous building said, \(\sigma''\)B'nai Zion rejoice and be happy in Adonai Your God." The old Ark spoke to us as a group, in the plural. Our current Ark says, \(\sigma^{\circ}\)Know before whom you stand." The current Ark is written in the masculine singular command form. We may want to use either of those again, but perhaps we want to choose something else, like: □Ki MiTzion Tetzeh Torah / For Out of Zion Goes Forth the Torah (Since "B'nai Zion" means "Children of Zion") □ Ivdu et HaShem B'Simcha, Bo'u L'fanav Birnana / Worship God in Joy, Come Before God with Joyous Song (Which can be thought to tie our previous two quotes together). UV'Asu Li Mikdash V'Shachanti B'tocham / "And let them build Me a sanctuary that I may dwell in their midst."

Please help us decide. Please use this page and submit it to the office as your ballot, call or email the office, or vote online at the B'nai Zion website where we have a special form you can use. We need to hear your request before the Annual Meeting so that we can announce the decision. You may only have this one chance to help define a Sacred space. Please choose wisely, and let us know your choices by May 10.

From our Educator

How can it be May already? The last weeks of Religious School follow a very successful Mitzvah Day that brought more than 100 members of the Jewish community together to engage in projects that touched—or will touch—the lives of many adults and children in the Shreveport community. Unfortunately, not all Religious School families were able to participate; fortunately, mitzvah work is a year-around responsibility so the opportunities were not limited to one Sunday in April. All that needs to happen is that your family identify a problem that concerns you—homelessness, hunger, illiteracy, animals without homes, children and adults who cannot swim—the list is endless. Once you have found something that really troubles you, you can brainstorm for ways to help. Let's make the summer of 2013 one in which every family does more than relax and travel. Let's make the summer of 2013 a "mitzvah summer" — why not try to do a family mitzvah in each of the summer months? If you need ideas, just let me know, and I will point you toward projects, resources, and opportunities.

May 12 is the date for our Annual Mother's Day Tea. It's not just for Religious School moms and grandmothers. It's for everyone who is a mother, who remembers a mother, who hopes to be a mother, who has been "like a mother" to someone. As the year draws to a close, I'm excited to think about a summer that will include the ISJL Conference in Jackson, the NewCAJE Conference in Massachusetts, and lots of time to evaluate what we have done and plan for the future. As the renovation of our sanctuary takes place, I'll be concentrating not only on sacred space, but also on sacred time. If we can provide ways to unite our physical space with our temporal practices (holidays and life-cycle events), and if we can enhance opportunities for B'nai Zion to meet our emotional, spiritual, intellectual, and yes, our physical needs, we can return in September with renewed energy to make Judaism a central part of who we are, not just a religious "box to check" when we are asked to identify ourselves.

We have a rich tradition, and we will have a rich future only if we live Jewishly in the present. Let's use our summer for relaxation, but also for growth. We will have chances to gather for learning and for fun, so watch for your June/July and August bulletins. Do not assume that because school is out, our synagogue is closed. May Holidays

YOM YERUSHALAYIM / JERUSALEM DAY

The most recent addition to the Hebrew calendar... Yom Yerushalayim is celebrated on the 28th day of Iyar (six weeks after the Passover seder, one week before the eve of Shavuot). Although Jerusalem has been considered the capital city of the Jewish people since the time of King David--who conquered it and built it as the seat of his monarchy in approximately 1000 B.C.E.--there has never been a special day in honor of the city until the Israeli army took over the ancient, eastern part of the city on the third day of the Six-Day War in June 1967.

Shortly after the Six Day War, "a municipal unification" of the two sections of the city took place, ending 19 years of separation between predominantly Arab and Jewish suburbs of Jerusalem, following the War of Independence in 1948. This year Yom Yerushalayim falls on May 8.

SHAVUOT

Shavuot, like so many other Jewish holidays began as an ancient agricultural festival, marking the end of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest. Shavuot was distinguished in ancient times by bringing crop offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem.

The holiday, also known as the Festival of the Giving of the Torah, dates from biblical times, and helps to explain the holiday's name, "Weeks." The Torah tells us it took precisely forty-nine days (seven weeks) for our ancestors to travel from Egypt to the foot of Mount Sinai (the same number of days as the Counting of the Omer) where they were to receive the Torah. Thus, Leviticus 23:21 commands: "And you shall proclaim that day (the fiftieth day) to be a holy convocation." The name Shavuot, "Weeks," then symbolizes the completion of a seven-week journey.

Special customs on Shavuot include the reading of the Book of Ruth, which reminds us that we too can find a continual source of blessing in our tradition. Another tradition includes staying up all night to study Torah and Mishnah, a custom called *Tikkun Leil Shavuot*, which symbolizes our commitment to the Torah, and that we are always ready and awake to receive the Torah. Traditionally, dairy dishes are served on this holiday to symbolize the sweetness of the Torah, as well as the "land of milk and honey." Memorial candles are lit before holiday candles in the evening as the holiday starts, and we have a Yizkor service.

Other Shavuot traditions at B'nai Zion and many other congregations is to wear white and decorate the bimah and Torah scrolls in white. We also remember those who have gone before us with a Memorial / Yizkor service, and light all of the memorial plaques by the sanctuary. B'nai Zion has a precious tradition to celebrate Confirmation on Shavuot. Walking through the hall with all the pictures of all the previous Confirmation classes is a walk through our history. Worship with this year's Confirmands and their families as they take their place in the B'nai Zion history.



Rabbi's Basic Judaism ~ Intensive Learning Classes

Rabbi Jana will teach core concepts of Judaism in intensive three-hour classes. Usually these classes spread over many weeks, but this year you can refresh or begin your Jewish studies in intensive weekend afternoons. (You can register to take one, two, or all of these classes.)

These classes are designed to increase your knowledge about essential Jewish things. They are for anyone who wants to enrich their knowledge of Judaism, are just curious, or are considering becoming Jewish. One class will be teaching how to read anything in Hebrew. Another class will teach about Jewish Life Cycle events, and the final class this month will be about the Jewish calendar and holidays. We will also be discussing Jewish theology, philosophy, ritual and observance. Unlike previous classes that continued over many weeks, each class will be held for three hours on a single day.

Aleph-Bet in One Day: Learn all of the letters of the Aleph-Bet, so that you can read anything in Hebrew. Rabbi Jana teaches the letters in a fun way that makes it easy to remember each sound. Take advantage of some of the latest multi-media technologies to learn and reinforce what you learn. Contact the office so that you can receive information about how to access the online tools and other materials. **2:00-5:00 PM Sunday, May 5**

Jewish Life Cycle: In time for Mother's Day, learn all about the Jewish family, and Jewish Life Cycle events from birth and baby naming through Bar/Bat Mitzvah, Confirmation, and weddings—to death and mourning customs. 12:30-3:30 PM Saturday, May 11.

Jewish Calendar: Understand the history and observance of the holidays in a Jewish year. Learn how the Jewish calendar blends aspects of lunar /solar; historical/religious; food/music; in every holiday during the year. **12:30-3:30 PM Saturday, May 18.** Join us for Torah Study, worship, and learning.

On Saturdays, you should try to join us for Torah Study at 9:45, worship at 11:00, and learning. Consider bringing a dairy or vegetarian lunch on Shabbat.


