Next Step

I was truly inspired by the holy days last month. It was wonderful to see so many people – old friends, family, new faces, young and old, locals and visitors. It is a powerful and awesome month. I appreciate the time for introspection that all of the services provide. I still hear the holiday melodies echoing, and can feel the impact of the words we encounter only

at this time of year.

I do have to be honest that I have been looking forward to October and Cheshvan. Some Jews call this Jewish month "Mar Cheshvan," adding the word "Mar," which means "bitter," since there are no extra holidays for rejoicing this month. I love rejoicing but I also appreciate a month when the only Jewish holiday is Shabbat and the opportunity it provides for resting and catching our breath (what I call refreshing and "re-Jew-venating").

So what do we do with all this inspiration? How do we ensure that our clean slate is used to make ourselves and our world better than last year? How do we do more, give more, try more, learn more – all the things we truly feel compelled to do?

I am going to try to take a step... One step beyond where I am, and see where I wind up. I want to try to reach out to new things... experience what comes next... I am also going to try to step back – to try to make sure I make time for people and study and taking care of things.

The hard part is finding time beyond what I feel I have to do – especially when I know that what I have been doing works. Also, finding time for that next step seems difficult when what I am doing now is already so time-consuming. That is why I am allowing myself to try to take just one step more. I certainly can find time for just one more step.

I want to suggest trying to take a step toward creatively expressing what you think about something meaningful. I have recently discovered creative projects for self expression. For example, since we are at the beginning of the new cycle of Torah readings back at Genesis, I would like to try some of the clever ways of explaining what the text means. I like to think of it as our story for the beginning of life, so my inclination is to use multiples of 18, but so far I have found various numbers to limit how we express ourselves. Let me explain... Can you give a synopsis of the Torah portion, or your view about Shabbat, or how you feel about a beautiful new day in just the 17 syllables of a haiku (I wonder if there is an 18 syllable haiku)? Here is one about Yom Kippur by Ed Nickow who has a HaikuTorah website:

What was your fast like? / Did you think "I'm so hungry?" / Or, "How will I change?"

Can you give a synopsis of your opinion in 140 characters (the length of a Tweet or instant message)? How would you word your synopsis of Judaism, or a holiday, or your attitude toward prayer, or write your own prayer – using no more than 140 characters (including spaces and punctuation – or perhaps 180 characters)? Here's my attempt at tersely defining Judaism:

God created the world and us in it. Take care of each other. Take care of the world. Connect to history & future. Find meaning in life.

There are many other ways of creatively expressing yourself: take photos; create videos; write songs or even parodies. I am going to keep taking steps by trying to see what I can do with these things. I don't know if what I create will be worth sharing. I would love you to share your creative attempts or other creative suggestions that you think I might like to try. Perhaps the best way to take the next step is together. See you soon.

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From our Educator

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services afford us an opportunity to view the wide landscape of congregational membership as well as the interest in Judaism that is indicated by the presence of non-Jews in our midst. I saw faces that have been familiar to me for more than 50 years and faces that I did not recognize. I wish I could say that I got around to saying hello to everyone, but I did not. However, as the New Year begins, my resolve is to meet more newcomers and visitors and to spend more in-depth conversation time with those whom I know. I don't mean just Religious School parents; I want to connect with congregants of all ages because everyone has a story, and if we can listen to each other's



stories, we will all grow wiser. I'm not sure what the format should be for real conversations to occur. Maybe we need something like a conversation corner, a place where a few chairs are gathered and a person can sit down and invite someone else to join him or her for five to seven minutes. Perhaps the conversation would just flow, or perhaps we'd need some "conversation starter" questions — When and where did you grow up? How did that place or time shape you? What's your favorite holiday and why? What are some of your favorite books, movies, songs? Whom do you admire? What do feel passionate about?

What famous (or not so famous) person would you like to talk to? What would you say or ask? Does anyone reading this think this project might be interesting? Would you sit down with me? Would you invite someone to sit down with you? This could happen anytime you're in the building – just me and you – call me, email me, tell me when you stop by the office. I have no ulterior purpose in mind. I'd just like to see more people talking to each other, and the ISJL Conference in June and a book I've read recently have both made me aware of the fact that we shouldn't miss opportunities to engage with people.

When I introduced the faculty last month, I did not know that the faculty was still growing! In fact, Max and Ron De Benedetti have joined their "ima" (mother) in teaching the 7th grade. We are also thrilled to welcome back our art teacher, Rachel Stuart-Haas, and the kids look forward to cooking with Marla Hyman, Alison Bath, and Karen Warren. Last, but not least, we are happy to have classroom assistance from youth group members Leah Sorkey, Claire Meyer, and Morgan Walker, along with college student Laura Sorkey. We also have lots of involved parents and friends. A special shout-out goes to Christina Muslow and Delaney Lake who have made my husband's classroom a warm and inviting place. Bill said he would teach again but he drew the line at having to decorate a classroom!

With the fall holiday cycle—and a successful food drive for the food bank—completed by the end of September, we look ahead to October and November with an emphasis on "Making a Difference" in the lives of residents of Providence House. They are in particular need of 13 gallon trash bags, paper towels, and toilet paper. Instead of monetary tzedakah contributions for the next two months, I ask parents of students to take their kids shopping for these items and bring them in on Sunday mornings. I also invite participation from the rest of the congregation. Let's see how much we can collect for women who are trying to turn their lives around by gaining education, job skills, and independent living skills.

Finally, mark your calendars for the "Adopt-a-Pup Pop Up Shop" on Sunday, November 3 from noon to 5:00 p.m. This is Susan Gross's pet project for animal welfare, and she needs your help even if you aren't able to adopt a dog. If you're an animal lover, get in touch with Susan to see how you can help.


Simcha Shabbat


brief service, blessing, and "Meet and Greet." If you can't bring your pet, bring a photo, and we can still bless it.

It's listed as a spellbinding thriller. It is available on Kindle and other formats. The next book, for the **December 10** meeting, will be *A Guide for the Perplexed* by Dara Horn (not Maimonides). We have really enjoyed Dara Horn's other books. This one is brand new.

While we don't have a date for the Book Club after that, we do have the title: *The Innocents* by Francesca Segal. She won the \$100,000 prize for debut fiction for 2012 from the Jewish Book Council's National Jewish Book Awards. A Month of Holy Days at B'nai Zion

We Won't See This Again

Next year features an anomaly for American Jews – The first day of Hanukkah coincides with Thanksgiving, on November 28, 2013 (meaning the first night of Hanukkah is actually the night

before Thanksgiving). I was curious how often this happens. It turns out that it has happened once before — in 1881 — and it will never happen again.

Thanksgiving is set as the fourth Thursday in November, meaning the latest it can be is November 28. November 28 is also the earliest Hanukkah can be. The Jewish calendar repeats on a 19 year cycle, and Thanksgiving repeats on a seven year cycle. You would therefore expect them to coincide roughly every 19x7 = 133 years. Looking back, this is approximately correct – the last time it would have happened is 1861. However, Thanksgiving was only formally established by President Lincoln in 1863. So, it has never happened before. Why won't it ever happen again?





The reason is because the Jewish calendar is very slowly getting out of sync with the solar calendar, at a rate of four days per 1000 years (not bad for a many centuries old calendar!) This means that while presently Hanukkah can be as early as November 28, over the years the calendar will drift forward, such that the earliest Hanukkah can be is November 29. The last time Hanukkah falls on November 28 is 2146 (which happens to be a Monday). Therefore, 2013 is the only time Hanukkah will ever overlap with Thanksgiving. You can see the start date of Hanukkah as a function of time in the attached plots. In the long timescale plot, the drift forward is clear.

Of course, if the Jewish calendar is never modified in any way, then it will slowly move forward through the Gregorian calendar, until it loops all the way back to where it is now. So, Hanukkah will again fall on Thursday, November 28 — in the year 79811.






