

### From our Educator

The recent Torah portion in which Jacob wrestled with a man/angel has always been one of my favorites. I was always puzzled by who that divine being was until I read the interpretation that identified the battle as one *within* Jacob. Jacob, who had stolen the birthright and blessing from his brother Esau, could not be the link from Abraham to us until he acknowledged his guilt and became a new person—a better person—a person who cared about his brother and a person who had wrestled with the important questions in life: Who am I? What is really important to me? What are my responsibilities to myself? What are my responsibilities to those I love? While most of us have not, hopefully, stolen from our siblings, we are all



sometimes guilty of not living up to all that we can be. After celebrating both Thanksgiving and Chanukah at the same time this year, I am reminded of the need to be both more thankful for all of the ways in which I am blessed, but also of the need to dedicate myself to activities that benefit others. During the past year, with the help of Malkie Schwartz at the Institute of Southern Jewish Life, I identified at least one new way that I can serve others.

I am happy to tell you that, as a Jewish community, we have finally begun our new literacy project, Read, Lead, Succeed. Our first step is a small one—tutoring just two first-graders from Stoner Hill Lab School at the Valencia Community Center on Viking Drive. Nonetheless, it marks a beginning, and as soon as the city of Shreveport completes background checks on additional volunteers, we will expand to reach eight children, tutoring them four days a week after school. We have purchased the reading materials, but we will need to acquire more advanced books as the children progress. For a donation of \$ 36.00 you can provide a set of books, so please let me know if you are interested in supporting our project in that way. Not everyone can be available after school to read with the children, but many can offer monetary support. This project will be a true Jewish community project when people realize that they can do something to help. We also provided some gloves and hats to the children during the cold weather of the past week, and we will soon be collecting jackets as well – new or gently used.

I invite each of you to join me in wrestling, as Jacob did, with the important questions in life. As a starting point we can look at the questions posed 2,000 years in the Mishnah and then expanded upon by Dr. Ron Wolfson in *The Seven Questions You're Asked in Heaven*. These questions help us to examine our lives and to take steps toward linking ourselves to our ancestors and to the Eternal (notes about these questions can be found at Rabbi Jana's website from her class about the soul and afterlife, at the Life Cycle Resources link at wwwlHebrewDoc.com):

Were you honest?

Did you leave a legacy?

Did you set a time to study?

Did you have hope in your heart?

Did you get your priorities straight?

Did you enjoy this world?

Were you the best you you could be?

Our tasks are to figure out *how* to be more honest in our business lives, in our relationships, and with ourselves, *how* to make a difference, *how* to become a worthy ancestor, *how* to learn from everyone and every experience, *how* in times of trouble to believe that better times are ahead, *how* to prioritize our time and our efforts, *how* to enjoy the beauty and blessings of God's creation, *how* to fulfill our unique and divine potential. If not now, when?

### Make and Take to Bake Challah

Challah making has been very successful. People are appreciating learning how to make challah, and spend time with others. We will continue to make challah the third Wednesday of the month, alternating day and evening times. In December, please join us Wwdnesday, **December 18 at 6:00 PM**. Novices and experts alike are invited to join us. You will make dough, learn interesting things about challah, braid challah, and take it home to bake.



The cost is \$3.00 per challah. Reservations are required by December 16.

Space is limited. Please pay the office to make a reservation. We are also happy to accept donations for challah, to defray the cost of the dough we use for B'nai Zion's use.

### Bethany's Challah Recipe

3 cups bread flour 2 t rapid rise or bread machine yeast Heaping 1/4 cup sugar


(1/4 cup dry milk)

3/4 cup hot (not boiling) water

6T butter or margarine, or 1/2 cup oil (if using oil, add 1 t salt)

2 large eggs

Egg wash – beat one of the eggs and reserve a small amount. You may one part water to two parts egg if desired. If making several loaves, you may want to use both eggs in the dough and a separate egg for the wash.



Make a well in the center of the mixture for the butter, margarine, or oil, and pour on hot water.

Add eggs and mix well. As liquid is absorbed and dough is formed, use hands to knead. You may need to add more flour to get a satiny smooth texture. Be careful not to add too much flour or your bread will be dry. Oil bowl and let dough rise in a warm place for about 20 minutes. You may then shape dough, let rise until light and airy and about double in size, and bake at 325 for 25 minutes, shape dough, and freeze, or put dough in oiled zip lock bag and refrigerate or freeze. Let dough come to room temperature before shaping, and then let rise in and bake, or if shaped loaf has been frozen, let thaw and rise before baking.

In recent years our fundraisers have been delicious steak and potato dinners, sometimes with entertainment and lovely decorations. We were hoping to do something different this year. However, we wound up getting caught up in the renovation of the sanctuary, and having our holidays falling earlier than usual, which kept us from our fundraiser.

We rely on the money brought in by the fundraiser to meet our annual budget. Next year we still hope to do something different, but this year we suggest a "Just for fun, fundraiser."

This entails not doing any program – no dinner, no entertainment, no silent auction, etc. The fun part is that you still get to participate, by sending the donations you would have sent if we did a program. Hopefully you will find it fun to use your time in other ways, but let us use the funds to support B'nai Zion. 

### **Contribute to Renovations**

Construction is getting closer to completion for the new Sanctuary wing at B'nai Zion. December should see delivery and installation of the Jerusalem stone on the Ark wall, the rows of seats in the sanctuary, the installation of the stained glass in the foyer, and other elements completed. Everyone who has seen the progress is excited about getting to worship and celebrate in the new space. The floors, walls and ceilings in the halls near the office are all beautiful. Ceiling lights, and sound system have been installed in the sanctuary. The rest of the electrical elements are in the building and need to be installed. The stained glass for the ark should be finished soon.

We are still waiting to set the date for the dedication of the new space, but it is very obviously getting close. If you have been waiting to contribute to the renovation process, now is the time to help. Opportunities to be a part of this dream come true exist at every financial level. Some of the parts cost more than originally anticipated and a few additional aspects had to be added to our original designs (such as replacing the floors and ceiling in the hall by the office.) Any financial contribution will secure your role in creating the sacred space that will be a blessing for many generations.

Speak with Craig Toys, Fred Kent, or Mitch Newstadt to discuss particular options, or for a tour of the current renovation status.

During construction, please check signs on the doors or call the office to see which entrances are safe. Evening services will be held in Lefkowitz Hall, and morning Torah Study and services will continue to be held in the Parlor.



The newest design in our renovation plan is for a special wall with plaques to honor donors who contribute \$180 or more. We are calling the contributors: Builders of Zion—Bonai Zion. There will be a donor wall near the stairs that lead from the office hallway to the sanctuary foyer. It will incorporate parts of the old ark from the sanctuary, including the marble and the mosaic Star of David doors.

When you make your contribution to be a Builder of Zion, consider if you would like your plaque to show that your donation was made in memory of special loved ones, or in honor of special people. We are trying to be able to accommodate these requests.

It is a mitzvah for us to celebrate together.


Please make sure that the office knows your birthday and anniversary dates. If you are not on our birthday and anniversary list in the bulletin, it means we do not have your information.

# **New Jewish War Veterans Post**

Barry Schneider, the Commander of the Jewish War Veterans Department of Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana and Oklahoma visited Shreveport recently. He joined us for services at both B'nai Zion and Agudath Achim, and had a meeting Sunday morning as well. The primary purpose of his visit was to discuss the possibility of starting a Jewish War Veterans' post in Shreveport. Only 10 members are required to form a post, and it looks like we have enough Jewish men and women who qualify, so we hope to be starting a post soon.



Shreveport is part of the regional department of Jewish War Veterans that includes Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana. Information about our regional department can be found online at www.dtalojwv.net/

Organized in 1896 by Jewish Veterans of the Civil War, JWV is the oldest active national Veterans service organization in America. Today, the JWV combats anti-Semitism and bigotry throughout the world. We assist the Office of Special Investigation in pursuing Nazi war criminals, support American youth through scouting, scholarships and anti-drug programs, and assist oppressed Jews worldwide. The organization also supports strong U.S.-Israeli relations by sponsoring two Allied Veterans Missions to Israel each year.

Any Jewish man and woman who is a citizen of the United States of America, who was regularly enlisted, drafted, inducted or commissioned, and who was accepted for, and assigned to, active duty in the armed forces of the United States of America (including the National Guard and Reserves or other persons or as may be set forth in organizations the Bylaws, is eligible for membership. A "Patron" membership may be awarded to those who are not active duty or former military service members but subscribe to, pursue or reflect the purpose, policies and aims of the Jewish War Veterans of the United States of America.

If you do not meet the requirements to be an official member, you can still be a supporting member, but not hold a leadership position.

Annual dues are \$50, or a lifetime membership is \$500.
