

It's About Time



We are working hard to try to find something that interests everyone: new worship experiences, learning opportunities, events geared toward all ages, events geared to specific age groups, socializing opportunities, social action opportunities, and so much more. Please let me or a Board member know which of our offerings you are grateful to have, and what other kinds of opportunities you would like to see us offer.

Sometimes I hear people say that they want to participate, but don't have the time. Believe me, I understand about having an over-booked schedule. What I don't understand is the concept of not having enough time to do Jewish things. I always understood that being Jewish is a lifestyle, not something to schedule into a calendar. Recently one of my pre-Bar Mitzvah students was trying to explain that being Jewish interferes with sports practice. I explained that even when they practice a sport, they should be practicing Judaism. It is not something we do when we are not doing other things. It is who we are all the time. He can be a Jewish soccer / baseball / basketball / tennis (you name it) player.

When we get together with other Jews for any kind of event, it helps to reinforce our choice to be Jewish, and gives us moments in time to grow, and understand, and find connection with others and with the ideals we treasure.

When we celebrate Jewish moments in time – like Shabbat, holidays, and other special occasions – it also brings us into moments that help to remind us how wonderful it is to be connected. This month I have scheduled a Rosh Chodesh lunch for the ladies. This month our holidays also include Tu BiSh'vat when we appreciate being connected to trees and nature. Acknowledging the awesome world around us, and our responsibility to take care of our world are some of the most important aspects of practicing Judaism. Knowing that when we celebrate something like a new year for trees, we are connecting ourselves not only to the trees and the environment, but to Jews throughout history. We also connect to Jews who are looking only at leafless winter trees covered in snow and people who are looking at newly sprouting baby trees in fertile warm areas.

At Tu BiSh'vat especially, while I was growing up in cold New York state, I loved feeling like I was living in an Israeli time frame. Trees were being planted at a time

when my ground was frozen. This year we connect to our trees by giving them a year of Shabbat. It reminds me how much we need to take a break too.

We don't take a break from our Judaism. Our Judaism helps us to take meaningful, refreshing breaks. It's about time.

I've recently started reading posts online from an organization called Big Tent Judaism. As you might guess, it's about the need for Judaism to be inclusive of all kinds of people. Not everyone shares the same family demographic or the same theology and practice. Not everyone identifies with a "brand" of Judaism or has a Jewish heritage that goes back for generations. There are people who are new to Judaism, and there are people who live in homes where some people are Jewish and some are not. The same is true for most congregations and for most Religious Schools. Nonetheless, as we learned from our patriarch Abraham, the tent door must be open. If Abraham's tent had not been open, he might not have received the visitors who told him that he and Sarah would have a child.



We never know what important information we might gain or what whether interested in learning about Judaism, Jews who visit from other cities, Jews who visit from Jewish organizations. This month we will enjoy a visit from the Education Department of our partner the Institute of Southern Jewish Life, and recently we had a visit from the Community Engagement department of the same organization. Tot Shabbat






People of the Book Club

I am sure you are all well aware of the terror attacks that recently took place in Paris. Although the weekly satirical news magazine, Charlie Hebdo, was the initial locus of the terrorist activity, once the violence began to spiral, it ultimately resulted in a deadly siege at a kosher supermarket and its surrounding area. As the investigation into this atrocity continues, it is becoming quite evident that those involved are well funded and tied to the precise networks that seek to repress free thought and supplant it with a state of pervasive fear.

The attacks come amidst a continued spike in anti-Semitism in the region and, unfortunately, bespeak of the era in which we find ourselves immersed. It is against this backdrop that I now request your assistance. As the President of our Federation, I have received communications from our parent organization, JFNA, soliciting our collective support in terms of forwarding expressions of solidarity and, moreover, in terms of providing philanthropic support to the French Jewish community.



Mike Rubin: Author Visits B'nai Zion



Michael H. Rubin is an author of both fiction and non-fiction books, an attorney, a law professor, a former radio and television announcer, and a jazz pianist.

Although he has published many professional works, he recently published his first fiction novel: *The Cottoncrest Curse*.

Two decades after the Civil War, elderly Colonel Augustine Chastaine brutally slit the throat of his beautiful young wife and then fatally shot himself. The death of Chastaine, however, was not the first suicide of an owner of Cottoncrest Plantation, and it was not to be the last. But was it

really a suicide, or was it a double homicide?

Tu BiSh'vat: Celebrating Trees by Letting Them Rest

Resting is very important to God. God command humans to rest every seven days and required us

to even let our animals rest on Shabbat. God also commanded that every seven years our trees and crops need to rest. In the Land of Israel we are supposed to keep the commandment by not planting trees or harvesting their produce for sale. We are allowed to eat what is on the trees, and let animals eat what is already on the trees for the whole year.

Tu B'Sh'vat has been, for millemia, an opportunity for Jews to appreciate trees and all the ways we use them and need them to enhance our life and the wellbeing of our world. They provide food, shelter, oxygen, and are components of so many things we use every day from paper and pencils to musical instruments, and furniture and

building materials. We appreciate their shade, enjoy their fruit and nuts.

In a Sh'mita year — every seventh year — we give the trees a rest. Even if we do not live in Israel, even if we don't have trees to harvest, it makes us appreciate the trees even more. In Israel, when they can't plant trees or harvest them, they focus on other things like research about water. The orthodox Rabbis in Israel have deemed that plants grown in hydroponic environments can be harvested, so many religious farmers have increased their hydroponic crops.

At B'nai Zion, our observance of Tu B'Sh'vat will be influenced by the Shmittah year. In the Torah, in addition to giving the trees a rest every seven years, people's debts were erased during the seventh year. It isn't always practical or possible to keep these commandments, but it is always interesting to be aware of them, and study them. Remember the trees, especially on their birthday, which falls February 4 this year, and help us celebrate them during evening service on February 6.



ISJL Education Fellow Weekend Visit

Our Goldring Wolenberg Institute of Southern Jewish Life Education Fellow, Abby Klionsky will join us February 20-22. She will lead Shabbat services and Torah study, do workshops with our teens, meet with our teachers for curriculum enhancement, and work with our students during Religious School.

The Shreveport Jewish Community Religious School uses the ISJL curriculum, which focuses on ten key content areas: Community, Culture and Symbols, God, Hebrew and Prayer, Israel, Jewish History, Jewish Holidays, Jewish Lifecycle Events, Mitzvot and Jewish Values, and Tanach (Torah, Prophets, and



Writings). The Education Fellows are well trained, enthusiastic proponents of Jewish learning and Jewish identity.

Please join Abby at Shabbat services and Torah study, and you will understand not only why we love the ISJL curriculum so much, but you will be "re-Jew-venated" by her enthusiasm and knowledge.

Rosh Chodesh: Ladies' Lunch at Eleven



There is a tradition that the beginning of the Jewish month, (called "Rosh Chodesh") is a special day for women to celebrate. Some women don't do any housework on Rosh Chodesh (yes, sometimes it pays to be a traditional Jew). The tradition is seen as a reward because women refused to contribute their gold to the building of the Golden Calf in the wilderness. Reform women may not be able to abstain from all work on Rosh Chodesh,

but it would be really nice to mark one day a month as a special time to recognize our connection with the moon, the women who came before us, and to set the day apart as an inspiration.

Ladies, bring your own lunch (even if that means a little extra work) to B'nai Zion for **lunch with the Rabbi at 11 a.m. on Rosh Chodesh Sh'vat**, which falls on **February 19**. Just watch for the new moon...

Judaism On One Foot*

*One of the famous accounts in the Talmud (Shabbat 31a) tells about a gentile who wanted to convert to



Judaism. This happened not infrequently, and this individual stated that he would accept Judaism only if a rabbi would teach him the entire Torah while he, the prospective convert, stood on one foot. First he went to Shammai, who, insulted by this ridiculous request, threw him out of the house. The man did not give up and went to Hillel. This gentle sage accepted the challenge, and said:

"What is hateful to you, do not do to your neighbor. That is the whole Torah; the rest is the explanation of this--go and study it!"

Rabbi Jana will teach the explanations in brief lessons — but students can sit.
