The Time of Singing Has Come

"The winter is past, the rain is over and gone, the flowers appear on the earth, the time of singing has come." This month marks the official end of winter. I am not

convinced that the rain is over, however I like thinking that the time of singing has come. It is no secret that I like to sing, and that I love when people sing with me. That is part of why I like to do a singing parody version of the Megillah for Purim, and why I love when people sing with me during the Passover Seder.

The word "megillah" means "scroll." The Purim Megillah (also known as The Book of Esther) is not the only scroll we have in Hebrew Scriptures. In fact, the tradition on Passover is to read the scroll where we find the above quote. That quote is from Song of Songs, which is also considered a megillah.

This month we celebrate Purim and prepare for Passover. I love these holidays, not just because we get to sing together, but because we get to remember success over hardship in our history, which renews appreciation of our current achievements, and our hope to overcome obstacles. Jewish observance always gives us opportunities to feel connected to our past, and guidance and hope for a better future.

There are some moments in our past that I am not proud of – I don't like how much we complained when we left Egypt. I don't want to be seen as complainers or argumentative. We went through one of the most miraculous moments in history – being freed from slavery, and heading to our promised land -- and most of what is heard from us are complaints. We were hungry. We were thirsty. We even wished we were back in Egypt. We seemed so childish and ungrateful.

I would like to suggest that we look at these complaints in a new way. When we were slaves, complaining would have gotten us punished or killed. Now that we were free, we were also free to say out loud that we are thirsty – because we really were very thirsty. And God didn't yell at us, or zap us – God gave us water. So we stopped saying that we were thirsty. Then we were hungry. We tested our voices again, and said that we were hungry – and God fed us. God heard us and helped us. Sometimes when Moses heard us, he complained – because sometimes he thought we were annoying.

I think we need to realize how important it is to raise our voices when we have basic needs that aren't being met. I also think that we need to find the right way to voice our frustrations. I don't understand why it took many years of slavery before God heard our cries and saved us. Maybe it was the way we were complaining. I don't mean to say that terrible things happen in the world because we didn't say the right words for God to be listening. I do believe, however, that when terrible things are happening in the world, we need to find our voice, and find a way to speak up and improve things for ourselves and for others.

The Purim story is a great example of finding the right voice, and the right time to speak out. Esther (which means "hidden") was protective of her identity and didn't want the king to know she was Jewish when she married him. I am sure it was even harder for her to reveal her identity after the people of the land were given a mandate to kill the Jews. We celebrate that she found her voice.

The events of Passover remind us what it is like to be oppressed and what it is like to be free. Each year we have a new opportunity to find ways in our lives to be free, and find times in our world where our voices can help to free ourselves and help others.

Sometimes it takes one voice to make a change – like Esther or Moses. Sometimes we need to make a lot of noise to make a change—like when we are blotting out the evil that Haman represents. Find your voice. Sing out loud (I won't complain.) The time of singing has come. Let us join together and let our voices be heard...

The Winter solstice has passed. Days are getting longer. That can only mean that spring is around the corner and, of course, Passover and Seder. We also begin our "spring cleaning." Jewish law requires that all unleavened bread and all materials and products associated with it (chametz) be removed from our homes before Passover.

What a perfect way to end the long dreary months of winter and celebrate the beginning of spring. Of course, if you choose not to comply with the act of physically cleaning your home, you can ""sell" your chametz to the rabbi and she will dispose of it - symbolically, of course.

I wish all of you a clean home, a clean mind and hope many of you will join us for our B'nai Zion Seder.

From our Educator

Purim is here, and while many adults think of the holiday as just a carnival time for children, it raises serious questions about masking and unmasking our identity. It's easy enough in today's world to hide who we are. It's easy to blend in to a secular world, to assimilate and do what everyone else does. However, Queen Esther's courage in going before Ahasuerus to proclaim her Jewishness and to expose Haman's hidden plot to kill the Jews of Shushan has lessons for us as parents and as teachers.

Every one of us has multiple identities. We are children of our parents, parents of our children. We are spouses, friends, and professionals. We are confident at times, vulnerable at others. We are sometimes independent, and at other times in need of help. We are sometimes full of vigor and enthusiasm for life, sometimes lonely and hesitant to join in. Purim

teaches me to recognize my various roles and my various feelings.



Purim reminds me that I need to be conscious of who I am even when I may, for one reason or another, choose to mask myself in front of others. For children, Purim is about dressing up, about wearing a mask to hide who they are. Adults are supposed to join in the same merriment, but I fear that all too often we wear our masks in everyday life. Purim reminds me to uncover the fear of failure that makes me avoid risk. Purim reminds me to uncover the lethargy that blocks my creativity.

Purim reminds me to uncover the selfishness that keeps me from doing for others. When we teach our children about Purim, we need to model the unmasking as well as the masking.

Perhaps between Purim and Passover, we can talk honestly with our children about who we are, what we are proud of, what we are trying to improve. Then we re-tell our Passover story, we can talk about throwing off the shackles that enslave us so that we can embrace the freedom and responsibility that we accepted at Sinai. When we have such conversations, then our holidays are not just Biblical history. They are not just stories about Mordechai and Esther, Moses and Pharoah. They are holidays that help us see who we are as people and as Jews.

Please don't forget our author talk Monday, March 9 at 7 p.m. This adult event, just a few days after Purim, will give us yet another opportunity to consider the masking and unmasking of identity. Mike Rubin is smart, funny, and totally engaging. Come and meet him and bring your non-Jewish friends for an hour of Southern history, Southern charm, and Southern hospitality.



Tot Shabbat



Mi SheBerach / May the One Who Blesses...



The Mi Sheberach prayer gets its name from its first two words. It is a prayer said on behalf of those who are ill or recuperating. With a holistic view of humankind, it prays for physical cure as well as spiritual healing, asking for blessing, compassion, restoration, and strength, within the community of others facing illness as well as all Jews, all human beings. At B'nai Zion we traditionally say it at every Shabbat or holy day service. When we are aware of someone in our community or someone connected to our community who might benefit from a prayer for healing, we include them in our list. Sometimes people request that names be included for prayer, but not read aloud. If you contact the Rabbi or the office to request

that we include a name, please also inform them when they have recuperated or no longer require the prayer. Jewish tradition encourages giving *tzedakah* (making a donation) on behalf of one who is ill or recuperating as well. B'nai Zion tries to be a caring community. Remember to let Rabbi Jana know if you are in the hospital or recuperating.

Be Happy It's Adar

The Talmud tells us that "when the month of Adar arrives, we "increase in joy" to welcome a season of miracles. Accordingly, the Talmud tells us that this month is fortuitous for the Jewish people. B'nai Zion has many happy things planned this month.



B'nai Zion Foundation Dues

Dear B'nai Zion Foundation Members and Prospective Foundation Members,

The B'nai Zion Foundation was established to ensure that future congregants would not be burdened with the rising cost of capital improvements necessary to maintain our temple facilities. Foundation Dues and Annual Pledges to B'nai Zion Congregation are totally separate from each other. Each is maintained in separate accounts with oversight from their own Board of Directors.

Some of the expenditures paid in 2014 by the Foundation included a new compressor for an air conditioner in Lefkowitz Hall, repaving the back parking lot, and a new heating/air conditioner unit for the sanctuary. We urge all Foundation members to renew their membership at no less than their previous levels. As always, a higher donation is appreciated. All Congregation members who are not currently members of the Foundation are encouraged to become members of the Foundation at any one of the four levels listed below. New Members of B'nai Zion Congregation are obligated to pay an initial amount of \$500 to the Foundation. This is typically paid \$100 per year for the first five years of their membership.

The 2015 annual dues for The B'NAI ZION FOUNDATION are now due. The membership levels for 2015 are as follows:



Passover (Pesach in Hebrew) is known as the "holiday of freedom," commemorating the Jewish Exodus from Egypt following 210 years of slavery. Passover is regarded as the "birth" of the Jewish nation, and its lessons of struggle and identity continue to form the basis of Jewish consciousness 3,300 years after the event. (from Aish.com)

 \Box Start counting the Omer beginning Saturday night, April 4. Continue counting for seven times seven weeks (49 days) until we arrive at the holiday of Shavuot.

The seventh day of Passover we will have morning services which will include Yizkor / Memorial service. The worship will begin at 10 a.m. Friday April 10. We will use the Memorial Books that were prepared for 5775 that we began using on Yom Kippur this year, and all Memorial plaques will be lit.

DELEGATION OF POWER OF ATTORNEY FOR SALE OF CHAMETZ

KNOW YE that I, the undersigned, fully empower and permit Rabbi Jana De Benedetti to act in my place and stead, and in my behalf to sell all CHAMETZ possessed by me (knowingly or unknowingly) defined as claimed by The Torah and Rabbinic Law (e.g. Chametz, doubt of Chametz, and all kinds of Chametz mixtures), as well as Chametz that tends to harden and to adhere to a surface of inside of pans, pots and cooking and usable utensils, and all kinds of live animals that have been eating Chametz or mixtures thereof, and to lease all places wherein the Chametz owned by me may be found, especially in the premises indicated below and elsewhere.

Rabbi Jana De Benedetti has the full right to sell and to lease by transactions, as she deems fit and proper and for such time which she believes necessary in accordance with all terms detailed in the general authorization contract which is in the possession of Rabbi Jana De Benedetti authorizing her to sell Chametz; on behalf of others. (Submit at least three days before Passover. It is customary to include a tzedakah donation with the form).


anniversaries in March. Join us for a special Oneg Shabbat, following services.
